





For the second time in recent years the township will face an election in November with an independent-fusion slate competing for two seats on the Township Committee with the regular Republican and Democratic tickets. The independent candidates will be Fire Commissioner Walter W. Baldwin and former Township Committeeman Francis J. Keane. Baldwin is a Republican and

Keane is one of two Democrats who have been elected to the governing board in recent years. Their-principal opponents are expected to be Finance Commissioner Frederick A. Handville and Charles A. Remlinger, who will be the Republican candidates. The local Democratic organization walted until tonight to file its ticket. Deadline for filling is at midnight.
