## Wrangle Causes Insurance Firm To Withdraw Bid

### Allstate Company Pulls Out After 4-Hour Dispute

The Allstate Insurance Company, a subsidiary of Sears Roebuck, last night withdrew its application for a zone change to erect a \$1,250,000 office building on an 18-acre plot at Shunpike road and Baltusrol way, undeveloped lands now owned by Baltusrol Golf Club.

Announcement of the withdrawal was made shortly after midnight by Henry M. Mereness, resident vice-president and eastern zone manager for Allstate, following more than four hours of vigorous protests against the proposition at that location by nearly 150 angry property owners who jammed the town hall to the rafters.

Although Mereness, a resident of Westfield, indicated after the session to a Sun representative that another Springfield site, together with several others elsewhere were under consideration, it is generally believed Springfield has seen the last of Allstate. Company representatives made it clear originally that it wanted to come to town without controversy and as a welcome addition to a growing community or would find a location elsewhere. Springfield, according to authorities, will lose \$30,000 a year in taxes as a result of last night's action.

Controversy featured the subject from the moment a Planning Board recommendation for rejection of the site was presented last night. In order to reject that recommendation it would have been necessary for four out of five members of the Township Committee to cast affirmative votes. Only Walter W. Baldwin, a member of the Planning Board, was known to oppose the site. Fred Brown's stand was unknown. Mayor Robert Marshall and Commissioner Binder and Handville were said to favor the proposition.

Baldwin became Public Hero No. 1 with the crowd when he read a prepared statement opposing the Shunpike road location. "The issue is whether we shall uphold the ordinance of this town," he declared. "To arbitrarily select a prime piece of land and change the zone is shortsighted, probably illegal and could be considered spot zoning," he added. Baldwin further declared that it wasn't worth the gain in taxables to "sell out our home owners." He predicted relief from the high tax rate was well underway as a result of the growth of the Route 29 industrial area.

Proceeds from the dance will be allocated to the Post Home Building Fund. The post home, which is now under construction on Morrison road, will be completed this year if funds are available.

## Regional Bd. Names Asst. School Aide

### Dr. I. E. Culver Gets New Post; Salary Guide Set

A Pennsylvania educator was named assistant principal of the Regional High School Tuesday night by the Regional Board of Education. He is Dr. I. E. Culver, of Media, Pa. Currently he is administrative assistant at Upper Darby, Pa., Senior High School. He will receive \$5,600 a year.

Dr. Culver was chosen from a field of thirty-four applicants. He has sixteen years experience teaching in rural consolidated and suburban junior and senior high schools. He is 37 years old and married.

The new assistant principal received his bachelor's degree from Washington College, Chestertown, Md., and his master's and doctorate at the University of Pennsylvania in secondary school education. He is a past president of the Delaware Science Teachers' Association. In addition to his academic activities Dr. Culver has directed a school band and coached varsity basketball, track and football.

The board also engaged Miss Martha Umbeck of 1922 Morrison avenue, Union, to teach English next year. She will graduate in June from the New Jersey College for Women with Phi Beta Kappa honors. She was a practice teacher at Regional.

Mrs. Edith Deronde of this township was appointed a library clerk. The board also adopted a new teachers' salary guide which provides annual increases of \$300 to each teacher. This is the second increase of that size voted this year. The new guide effective next fall increases the minimum \$100 to \$2,700 for teachers with four years' college education. The maximum for this group is \$4,900.

The annual increases for the first twelve years will be \$150 and \$100 thereafter to sixteen years. A teacher receiving his master's degree will be given an additional \$300 yearly up to a \$5,100 maximum. A teacher completing thirty graduate work beyond his master's degree will receive \$100 additional with a \$5,400 maximum.

## Women Will Lead Political Parties

For the first time in the political history of Springfield, women head both Republican and Democratic Municipal Committees here. Elected Monday evening to serve for the next twelve months were Mrs. Amy Baudomer, by the GOP, and Mrs. Ann Turk, by the Democrats.

Mrs. Baudomer was chosen at the annual meeting held at the home of Tax Assessor Wilbert W. Layne, 25 Lyon place. She replaces Layne. Mrs. Baudomer has been a Republican leader for many years. She recently was elected an alternate delegate to the Republican National Convention in Chicago.

Other officers named were: Vice-chairman, Robert Anderson; secretary, Eugene Donnelly; treasurer, Arthur Marshall and executive members, Mrs. Baudomer, Mrs. Turk, who also will be one of the Democratic candidates for the Township Committee, and Mrs. E. M. Cunningham in 1955 sought to succeed her late husband as a member of the governing board seats they will face successfully.

Mrs. Turk received ten votes and Moran received five.

## Mrs. Turk and Moran Enter 3-Way Battle for Town Bd.

A three-way fight for two seats on the Township Committee was assured this week with notification by Mrs. Ann Turk and J. Leo Moran that they have accepted nominations as Democratic candidates. Both were nominated last week by write-in votes.

The names of Turk will be no novelty to Springfield voters who have seen it on ballots for township committee posts for several years. Mrs. Turk's husband was a township committee candidate on a number of occasions, once successfully. Probably no person in recent township political history was a candidate more often.

Entrance of a woman into the local political arena is expected to add zest to the full political campaign which will be further embellished by a Presidential, U. S. Senate and Congressional contest. Indications are that there will be many split tickets with letters pouring into the Sun urging republication of both Handville and Baldwin in order to put new members on the governing board.

## Scout Camporee Set for District

Plans have been well formulated and committees are already hard at work in preparation for the 1952 Jumbo Camporee of the Northern District, Union Council, Boy Scouts of America. Again this year, the Jumbo Camporee will be held at Surprise Lake in the Watchung Reservation; the dates will be May 22, 23, 24 and 25. It is expected that Scouts from the 26 units in the Northern District which includes Springfield, Union and Hillsdale, will participate in this year's program.

The theme of this year's Jumbo Camporee will be "Forward on Liberty's Team." The program will include exhibits, displays, campfires, rally competition, stunts and parades for Cub Scouts, Boy Scouts and Explorer Scouts. ## Springfield Man To Succeed Horace Baker

Charles F. Beardsley, of 163 Tooker avenue, was elected chairman of the Republican County Committee at the annual meeting Tuesday at the Elizabeth Carter Hotel, Elizabeth. His selection marked the first time that a township resident has been chosen to head either major political party in Union County.

Beardsley, who was supported by the faction of the party headed by Freeholder Albert J. Benninger, of Mountlake, defeated Mayor F. Edward Blertumpfel, of Union Township. The final vote was 108-105. It was a secret ballot.

Mayor Blertumpfel had conceded the preceding day that he had little chance of winning the chairmanship. The actual vote was somewhat closer than preliminary estimates had indicated.

Demise of the "Old Guard" faction of the Republican party was seen in the balloting. The Benninger faction took over the other party offices, ousting Mayor Blertumpfel from his post as first vice-chairman and replacing him with Michael F. Kealy of Railway, chief State boxing inspector, and one of Benninger's right hand men. To make the disfigurement of the Old Guard complete the dominant faction also dumped County Clerk Henry G. Nulton from the post of treasurer and replaced him with Assemblyman Donald A. Mackley of Plainfield.

In view of the tribute paid Springfield by election of Beardsley to the chairmanship, Mrs. Amy Baudomer did not seek the post of fourth vice-chairwoman, which she previously held. Mrs. Evelyn Carey, of Hillsdale, Courthouse Hillarian, was named to succeed her.

In his acceptance speech Beardsley said he would seek the advice and counsel of other committee members. He pledged his efforts to obtain election of the entire Republican slate in November.

The new chairman is a native of the Finger Lakes section of New York State. He had been a resident of New Jersey for nearly twenty-five years and has lived in Springfield for the past decade.

Beardsley first became active politically when he came here. He served seven years as municipal chairman, being succeeded by Wilbert W. Layne a year ago.

In 1951 he directed the Springfield campaign of Freeholders Nelson L. Carr and Mrs. Elsie L. Scheldler. In that campaign he worked against the then Freeholder Lee F. Rigby, of Springfield, who was defeated in his bid for reelection.

The tall chairman—he is six feet five inches—is an assistant supervisor of recordings for the National Broadcasting Company. He has served as president of the Springfield Republican Club. He attended Cooper-Union College. He is 45 years old.

He and Mrs. Beardsley are members of the Presbyterian Church. She has been active in the Springfield Chapter, American Red Cross, the Springfield Woman's Club and the American Cancer Society.

General expectation is that there now will be a complete "new deal" in Union County's Republican affairs. Benninger and his leaders are expected to make the decision and such leaders as Mayor Blertumpfel, Roy Carey and Roy E. Kitchell of Union; Freeholders John H. M. Dudley and Charles L. Bauer, Elizabeth, George Herlich, Hillsdale, and other Old Guard members henceforth will be on the outside looking in.

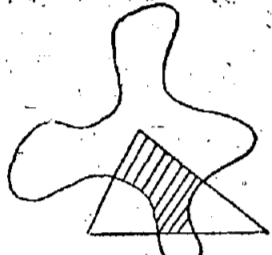

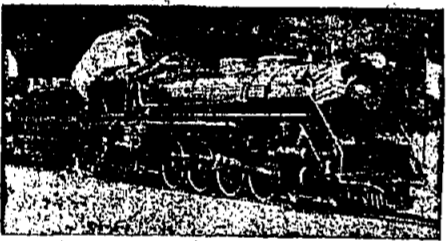
