## Post Office Hikes Box Rent 50 P.C.

A 50 per cent increase in post office box rents will go into effect July 1. Postmaster George Turk announced today. The cost of submitting bills in advance for each three-month period will be continued, he said. Approximately 135 box holders will be billed at the new rates June 16 for the "Quarter" comprising July, August and September.

The new regulation requires postmasters to adjust box rate schedules July 1 of each year, based on gross postal receipts for the preceding calendar year.

This means that with the new increase, boxholders who were renting the smallest box of \$75, will now be paying \$110; the \$100 rental will now be \$150 and the largest, which used to get \$150 quarterly, will be raised to \$225.

## Regional School Group Begins Expansion Plans

A resolution approving purchase of a 25-acre tract on Westfield avenue in Clark and the construction of a new school there has been adopted by the board of education of Regional High School.

Also contained in the resolution is authority to purchase a 25-acre site in Kenilworth and the relocation of sites in Mountainside and Berkeley Heights.

According to a study made by former board members, Richard N. Southgate, it was estimated that Regional's total enrollment will increase from 1,223 this year to an approximate 3,200 in 1958.

It further predicted that during this period, Clark Township residents will increase from 223 to 400, Garwood from 181 to 303,

There is no definite information as to the number of units being planned by the developers for this apartment house since the entire matter depends on whether or not the Planning Board approves the request for rezoning the property and then some official action by the Township Committee.

The youth of Springfield on parade has been a highlight of the program for the last several years and has enjoyed an increasing popularity both for entrants and onlookers.

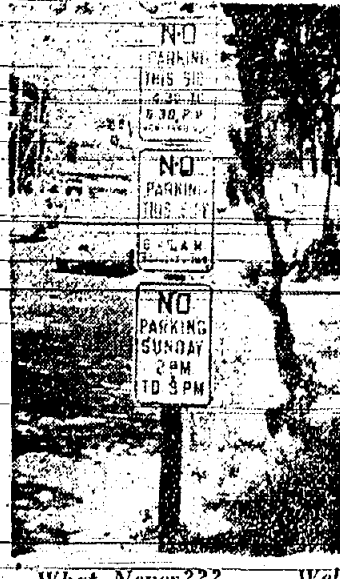

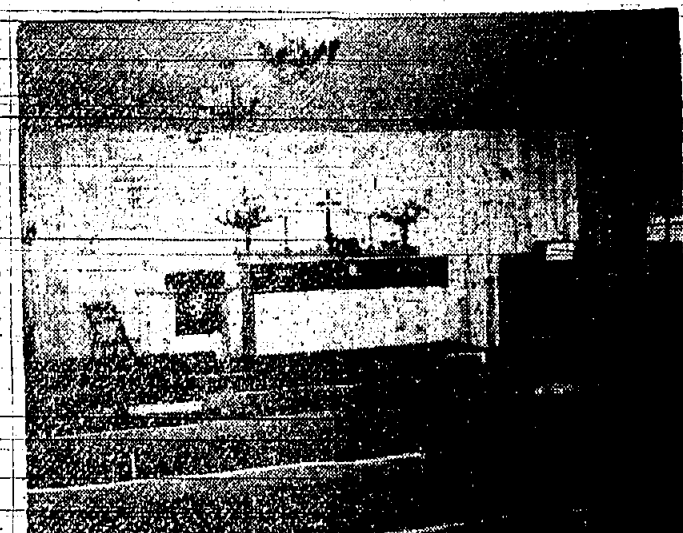

Lutheran residents and members of the community are invited to attend the elaborate ceremonies arranged for the dedication of the new Holy Cross Lutheran Church building on Edifice Street and actually built by the members of the church. Rev. Eric Rieker and his communicant members pooled their skills and construction talents and transformed a one story elder block building at 639 Mountain avenue into a fine sanctuary.

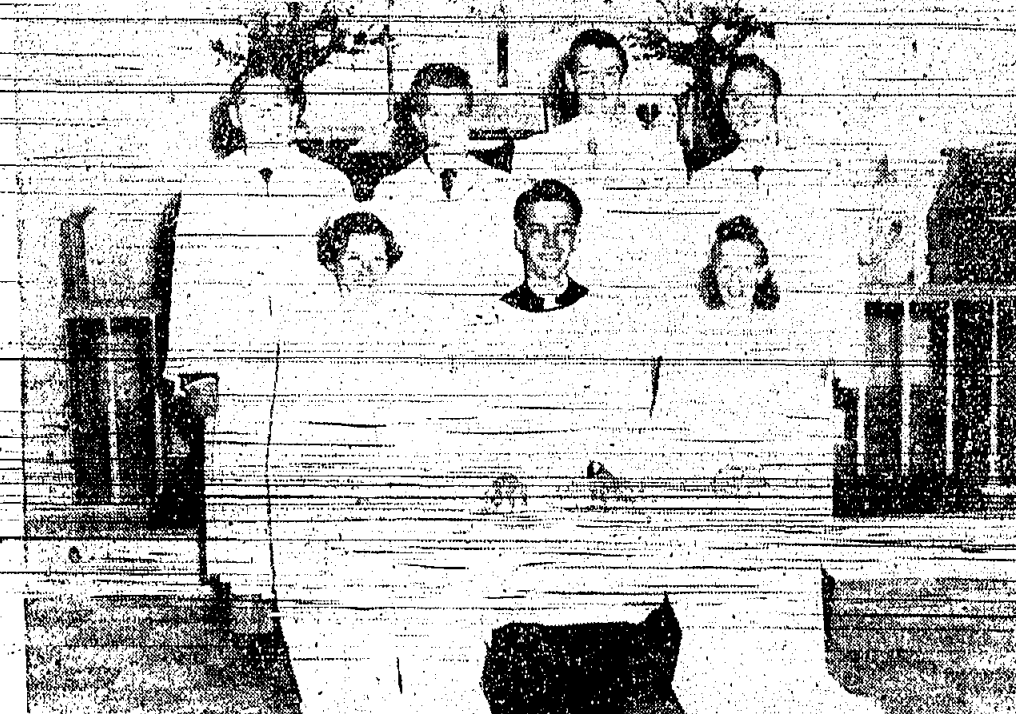
The interior of the building is finished in knotty pine and will accommodate about 120 persons. Actual work on remodeling the former machine shop started in October and the church people used every spare moment in the construction job. Rev. Rieker and his church members are very proud of the finished job and at 10 o'clock this Sunday the ceremonies for the dedication of the building will start.

The congregation will assemble outside the church. A short ceremony shall take place at the church door. The boys will be headed by the pastor, Reverend Eric H. Rieker by Paul Lacey, the contractor who supervised the building of the church. The pastor will unlock the door and it will then be opened by Victor Rieker, the President of the Church Council. The pastor shall then enter the church followed by the church council carrying the Bible and the sacred vessels.

When they reach the sanctuary the Church Council shall give the Bible and the sacred vessels into the hands of the Minister who shall put them in their proper places.

The sermon will be delivered by the Reverend Victor Alberts who is the Assistant Executive Secretary of the Atlantic District of the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod. 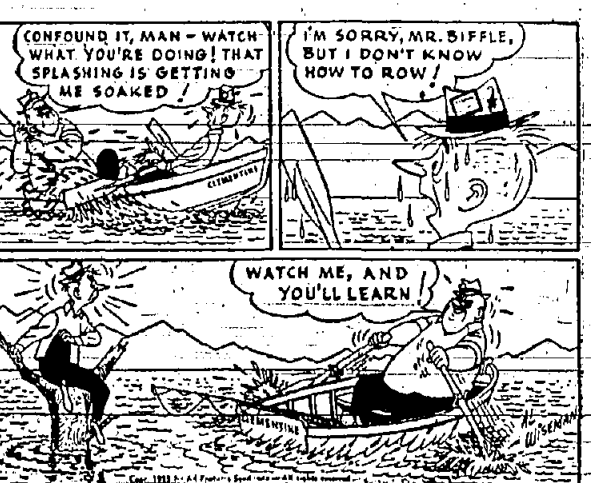
