ON THE SUNNY SIDE

Those "smoke-filled-room" conferences and the "hush-hush political deals" have fizzled and blown themselves out to sea along with the last threatening hurricane. Which leaves Springfield with six candidates for the two jobs to be filled on the Township Committee instead of a slambang battle between the organization selections and the much discussed coalition ticket.

While the political scrap is right back where it started—the coalition proposal was given serious consideration by the independent and Democratic candidates—and, for a time, looked as if there might be a formal announcement that the four men had agreed to pool their voting strength in behalf of just two. But, yesterday, everybody was ready to admit that there will be no deals and that it will be a free for all.

Just what strings were pulled—what off the record understandings there are—no one appears to be willing or ready to volunteer any information. But it is crystal clear today that Police Commissioner Albert G. Binder, president incumbent, and Eugene Donnelly, who won in the primary contest, will find the going a little easier now that this threat of fusion has been removed.

The last statement isn't based on any prejudiced appraisal of the individual candidates—but it's an old political trick to unite the forces of those opposed to the strong ticket, in order to bring victory. Despite the optimism of the independents or the backers of the Democratic candidates, the signs right now point to victory for the organization's fair haired boys. Of course, if the independent candidates, "Tom" Argyris and Francis J. Keatie, really put on a good show, ring door bells, shake hands with all the newcomers to Springfield, and do a lot of old fashioned campaigning, it may still be an extra inning battle.

Somewhere in this political picture, is the quiet hand of Mayor "Bob" Marshall. The story is that the pipe of peace has been passed around which means, no doubt, that there will be none of the election fireworks some people might have expected from that quarter.

During the hot spell only recently ended—political rumors have a way of being repeated so often that, even some of the most ridiculous situations appear to be plausible and one soon begins to find some truth in everything he hears.

Among the juiciest and choicest bits of news whispers had it that there was an undated but signed resignation ready to be submitted—that a fifth independent candidate was toying with the idea of getting on the ballot in November—that one of the present Township Committeemen has already been given the nod to take over the office of Mayor.

Representatives of several big corporations have been visiting Springfield in the past few weeks, making an exhaustive survey of the township facilities in anticipation of taking space in the General-Greene Shopping Center. One report they took back to their home office which may help them decide, came from the Grand Union people who are more enthusiastic about Springfield, according to one of these representatives, than they have been about any location for one of their supermarkets. Grand Union likes Springfield so much, said this one informant, that they have increased their space in the new shopping center by more than 25 per cent.

The operators of the shopping center have promised to make public the names of several new firms that have signed leases in the next few days.

With the coming of frost the concentration of pollens in the air will diminish. Sufferers from pollen allergy will thus be freed from the effects of air-borne irritants. Unfortunately, they then become subject to attack on another front. It has been estimated that no less than fifteen million persons in the United States suffer from some forms of asthma, rhinitis, sinusitis, and several types of allergic distress which originate in the atmosphere within the house itself. They are the victims of house-dust allergy.

House-dust is derived from decaying animal and vegetable materials used to make the interior of our homes more comfortable and attractive. Bedclothes, pillows, mattresses, rugs, and draperies are potential contributors to the discomfort of sensitive individuals. When the heat is turned on, the increased circulation of the warmed air through the house guarantees a wider distribution of the offending dust elements. Allergic persons then develop nose-block, sneezing, watery nasal discharge, cough, and—in some cases—certain types of skin involvements and headache.

These facts indicate the need for a thorough fall cleaning similar to the customary spring cleaning. Authorities recommend the treatment of beds, bedding, and fabrics with chemicals specially compounded for the purpose. Other recommended precautions include dust-proof covers for mattresses, elimination of comforters and pillows filled with decaying feathers, and frequently thorough cleaning of walls and floor surfaces to keep all dust at a minimum. This all means more work but increased comfort.

That cold you have may not be the result of germs or viruses. Instead it may be a house-dust allergy.

September is the best month for starting a new lawn. Planting at this season and observing a few rules will give good results, according to Eric H. Peterson, Jr., Union County Agricultural Agent.

Most soils should be treated with 75 pounds of ground limestone per 1,000 square feet when preparing the seed-bed, he says. In addition, apply 35 to 50 pounds of a 5-10-5 or similar fertilizer per 1,000 square feet. Thoroughly mix the lime and fertilizer with the soil.

Choose a New Jersey lawn seed mixture or similar formula that is best adapted to the conditions of shade and soil fertility of the lawn area. Prepare a good seedbed and spread the seed uniformly at the rate of 3 to 4 pounds per 1,000 square feet.

After seeding, use a steel or wooden rake to cover the seed by stirring the soil very lightly. Usually, a good stand of grass can be obtained without watering. If you plan to water, use a fine mist to keep the surface of the soil moist at all times. After the grass seedlings emerge, discontinue watering unless prolonged drought should occur.

After the lawn has been established it is important to set the mower to cut no shorter than 1 1/2 inches and to fertilize the lawn regularly in early spring and in September

of each year. Without good maintenance the work at planting may be lost.

The increasing number of deaths from cancer in New Jersey, plus the recent death of Ohio Senator Robert A. Taft from the disease, has led to a greater interest in the fight against cancer by friends of those who have died. More than \$500 has been received by the American Cancer Society, New Jersey Division, from friends of the late Senator and during the past 12 months a total of \$6,428.55 has been received and acknowledgments sent to the families.

For several years now the New Jersey Division has been encouraging contributions as a memorial to those who died so that other lives might be saved. Each year the amount has been growing as more and more realize that the only hope of conquering cancer is to find the cause and in educating the people to the fact that cancer can be cured if caught in time.

Many, too, have been bequeathing funds for use in the crusade against cancer and in the fiscal year just completed, the New Jersey Division has received some \$27,000 in this manner. Where specified the money will be used in the county designated, otherwise it will be a part of the overall national and state campaign. As an incorporated agency, the New Jersey Division has the right to accept such gifts.

Nielsen Family Thrilled by Big Celebration in Denmark

Mr. and Mrs. Hans Nielsen and children Diane, Eric and Ellen of 36 Clinton Avenue had the great privilege while in Denmark this summer of being present at the American Independence Day celebration which took place in the Danish American Rebild-National Park near Aalborg in Jutland and was attended by King Frederik IX and Queen Ingrid of Denmark.

The main American speaker was Paul G. Hoffman, former E. C. A. Administrator and President of the Ford Foundation, now Chairman of the Board of the Studenter Corporation. This is the first time that an American industrialist has addressed these celebrations which, except for the war years, have been held every 4th of July since the park was dedicated in 1912.

American Marines from Bremen, Germany, hoisted the Stars and Stripes and Danish Marines from the Frederikshavn Command hoisted the Danish Dannebrog whereupon the singing of the National anthems of the two nations preceded the holding of the 48 American State Flags which formed a colorful avenue leading to the speakers' platform around which the heather-clad hills of Rebild form a natural amphitheatre. The celebration closed with a dinner in nearby Aalborg and a festival in the evening.

The following article reprinted from the Danish Brotherhood Magazine vividly describes the origin of the Rebild National Park and the yearly festival:

"The Rebild National Park was dedicated in 1912 by the late King Christian X of Denmark in the presence of the then American Minister to Denmark, Dr. Maurice Francis Egan, and high Danish Government officials.

"In a desire to promote international understanding, friendship and cultural exchange, and in gratitude to the United States where hundreds of thousands of Danish immigrants found friendly hospitality and prosperity, Americans of Danish birth acquired several hundred acres of the beautiful heather covered Rebild hills in North Jutland. Led by the late Dr. Max Helms of Chicago and a committee of Danish-born men and women, including representatives of Danish churches and societies, this tract of land was deeded to Denmark and became known as the Rebild National Park. A provision was that it should be reserved for an American Independence Day celebration every 4th of July. And these festivals have been held ever since 1912, except for the war years. They are usually attended by upwards of some 30,000 to 40,000 people.

"In 1951 was dedicated a 'Lindholm Log Cabin,' built with logs from trees cut in American forests by Danish immigrants or their sons. It houses a pioneer museum.

"The Rebild National Park Board is an Illinois non-profit organization. The president is Holger Bladt of Aalborg; vice-president is Jean Hersholt of Beverly Hills, Calif., and secretary is Berge Rosing of Huntington, West Virginia. Of the remaining board members, two are in the United
