



An intensive educational-program,-having-for its-purpose the reaching of the greatest number of volunteers of the American Cancer Society in the state, will be inaugurated in March by the New Jersey Division, it was announced-today.--Seven sectional training schools will be held at which the programs and policies of the society will-be-explained so that those working as educational service or campaign volunteers will obtain firsthand information which they can passen-to-others.

In making-known-the-programs, Dr.-Vincent-P.-Butler, of Jersey City, chairman of the State Education Committee, stated that the sectional-training schools will augment the annual leadership conference held each October and will give participants in the conference a chance to act as leaders. It is felt that they have the training and ability to carry-on-the-necessary-programs with the assistance of the state service department staff.

Details for the meetings are now being arranged. They will be one-day affairs, held at convenient locations, and the attendance of all interested in the fight against cancer. will be sought. In this way those unable to attend the October conferences can obtain needed knowledge while the leaders gain desired experience.

For the young wife with heart disease, the question almost always uppermost in her mind is, "Can I have a baby safely?". Thanks to advances made by medical research, much of it financed by contributions to the annual Heart Fund appeal, the answer nowadays is usually "Yes."

The most important rule for such young women is to consult with their doctors. Only the doctor can tell whether or not pregnancy is likely to hold any danger for them. and whether or not they are up to the additional physical strain of caring for a family.

The doctor, of course, will only advise." The final decision of whether or not to have a child is up to the woman and her husband.

Any young woman with heart disease who decides to have a baby should plan to see her doctor regularly throughout her pregnancy. Studies show that women with heart disease who get into serious trouble are usually those who postpone going to doctors or clinics until the pregnancy is nearly over.






