PROCLAMATION

Mayor Albert G. Binder today proclaimed the week o May 2-10 8 as Mental Health Week. The week will be so ob served in thousands of cities and towns throughout the country In releasing the text of his proclamation, the mayor also

made a special appeal for support of the Montal Health Fund drive, which is to begin May 16 for the benefit of the Union County, N. J., Association for Mental Health, the New Jersey Association for Mental Health and the National Association for Mental Health.

The proclamation pointed out that mental illness is our number one health problem, and stated that more than 9,000,000 Americans are suffering today from mental disorders.

"The-mayor asked for general participation in the observance of Mental Health Week and declared that it was the responsibility of every citizen of this community to join in combating the problem of mental illness. He asked the head of every household_to_take steps to protect his family against mental-illness by supporting preventive, treatment, research and educational programs through the Mental-Health Fund The text of the proclamation-follows:

WHEREAS, mental illness is our nation's Number 1 health, problem, accounting for more hospitalized patients

today than all other illnesses combined, and -"WHEREAS, more than 9,000,000 people -- or one out of every 16 -- are suffering from mental and emotional disorders. and

"WHEREAS, mental illness manifests itself," also, in physical illnesses, delinquency, crime, school fallure, job failure and alcoholism, and

"WHEREAS, the offects of mental-illness-are-folt-in-thiscommunity no less than in other parts of the country, and


"WHEREAS, it is the responsibility of every community and every eitizen in the community to combat mental illness through support of measures for prevention, improved treatment, research and education and through the personal application of sound mental health principles,

"THEREFORE, I, Albert G. Binder, Mayor of Springfield, do hereby proclaim the week of May 2 to 8 as Mental Health Week, and call upon the citizens of Springfield to participate in the observance of this occasion, thus better acquainting themselves with the facts about mental illness and mental health, and with their responsibilities in maintaining good mental health in this community, and

"FURTHERMORE, I call upon the citizens-of this community to give generously to the Mental Health Fund to support research, prevention and improve treatment of mental




