Property For Girl Scouts Is Not Available

The dream of the Springfield Girl Scout organization to have a home of its own—one to be used as a Community House—had a rude awakening Tuesday night when the Township authorities informed their representatives that "there was no short cut to acquiring the municipal owned property in the Academy and Black's Lane area" where they had planned to move the building now situated on the corner of Morris and Springfield avenues.

John Bullock, who plans to build the Sip and Sup on this corner, offered the building to the Girl Scouts on condition they move it to some other property. Mr. Bullock "even agreed" to contribute what it might have cost him to demolish the building towards the cost of moving it to another site.

Tuesday evening the Girl Scout representatives were told that legal difficulties would not permit the immediate transfer of township held property. In fact, they were further informed that there would have to be a public sale of the property and that others in the neighborhood were free to submit bids and would, probably, do so.

The Girl Scouts, confident that the property would be made available, went to the trouble of getting several bids from home movers and moving concerns, the cost of moving utility wires out of the way while the building was being moved down Morris avenue and into Main street.

However, the Girl Scouts have several other sites under consideration and hope to have a location for the house before the new owners start demolishing the building now on that corner.

Haselmann believes that Springfield deserves a high class bakery and hopes to recapture some of the shoppers who have been going out of town for the cakes, pies, home made breads and other products now to be found in his establishment. Special products for different days of the week will be announced later by the new bakery proprietor.

Work Started On New 20 Family Garden Apartment

Springfield's building boom gained momentum this week with the announcement by Elmer L. Walker, local builder and developer, that work has already started on the new twenty family Garden type apartment house to be constructed on Mountain avenue, opposite Edgewood avenue.

Walker is a builder of very excellent reputation and his operation of Walker Court at 45 Morris avenue assures the Township authorities that this new project will comply with every regulation.

A building permit for this apartment has already been issued by Springfield Township.

As Walker did with the Morris avenue apartment, the new building in Mountain avenue will be set back 92 feet with plenty of room for landscaping. Sewer extensions have been practically completed and actual building work will be started as soon as other utilities such as gas, water and electric, have been installed. The apartment is being constructed on a plot of ground with 218 feet on Mountain avenue and 400 feet in depth.

Walker's plans call for eight five room apartments, four of 4 1/2 rooms and eight will be 3 1/2 rooms. There will also be one five room apartment for the superintendent. Every modern convenience will go into this new structure and Walker, whose long experience in building homes in Short Hills, Summit and Orange has convinced him that garden apartments are also homes, announces that only the best of materials and workmanship will be used. Chief Sorge Happy With Job Done Over Week End

Springfield has none of the "after the 4th of July miseries" this year. Police Chief Albert A. Sorge announcing that "there were only three slight accidents over the holiday week-end and we're all very fortunate that Springfield went through all that period without anything serious to report."

There were no arrests for illegal possession of fireworks although Chief Sorge said some harmless, but still classified as banded, fireworks were taken from some kids.

The local department kept kids moving all through the holiday week end, and only during the peak of the crowd watching the spectacular display on the high school grounds, was there any serious congestion.

"For about a half hour," said Chief Sorge, "we had quite a time trying to straighten out traffic with everybody wanting to drive their cars as close as possible to the scene of the show, some of them stopping without any regard for cars trying to get by. However, we finally diverted much of the traffic away from Mountain avenue and the traffic snarl was soon over."

There were slight delays after the end of the fireworks show with pedestrians and autoists trying to get away but the police soon had everything under control and the area was cleared without a single mishap.

Police Chief Sorge also wishes to remind Springfield residents who are bound for a summer of fun to leave their homes as "break fast" as possible during their absence. "Burglars don't take vacations," advised Chief Sorge, "and vacationers should make their absence as inconspicuous as possible. Stop deliveries of newspapers, milk, bread and other items so that they won't collect on the front porch.

Civic Groups Form Alliance In Town

Plan to coordinate the various civic organizations in Springfield into a town-wide alliance has made considerable progress. The second meeting of the newly formed Springfield Civic Alliance was held at the home of Dr. Stanley K. Freeman, Thursday evening of last week. The organization is comprised of Baltusrol, Colfax, Country Oaks, Heathcote, Hawthorne, Shumpick, and South Springfield civic groups and represents 450 families. The list is not a final one, for it is planned to add new associations as they are formed.

The purposes of the Springfield Civic Alliance are, in essence, to act in unison on matters pertinent to the township's welfare without encroaching upon the independence of the local civic groups, and to serve as a clearing house for information and ideas beneficial to the individual groups. The SCA will be definitely non-political and non-profit in nature.

Membership is open to any active civic association located in our town, and meeting nights have been selected to fall on the fourth Tuesday of alternate months commencing with September, exclusive of June, July and August. Special meetings may be called by a member of the Council. Each civic group is represented by its elected president and a delegate at large.

The September meeting will take place at the home of David Stammelman, president of the Baltusrol Civic Association.

4 Vets Apply For 1 Opening On Local Force

Police Chief Albert A. Sorge who has only one more vacancy to fill on the Springfield police department—and even that can wait until the end of the year, he says—finds himself in a dilemma with applications from four candidates, all of them veterans, and only room for one more.

One of these includes Philip N. Latora, Springfield's returned prisoner of war, who was recently discharged from the Marine Corps. Another of the war veterans seeking a place on the local department is Arthur Howard of 919 Mountain avenue, who served in the United States Army from 1947 to 1950 and specialized in radio work.

Joseph Roessler, of 50 Battle Hill avenue, is serving as a new special officer and is anxious to get a permanent place in the department. Another candidate is Charles Brunner who served in the U. S. Army Medical Corps from 1952 to 1954, is 22 years old, stands over 6 feet and weighs 210.

Chief Sorge is anxious to maintain and even build up the efficiency of the police department and wants to fill vacancies with the best qualified candidates. "Springfield is growing rapidly," said Chief Sorge, "and more men will be needed as the population increases. We are happy to have applications from our veterans and, as soon as there is a need to fill the single vacancy or when there is an increase in personnel of the department, we will be glad to give these men consideration. We want good men and the information on the applications now on hand show that we have some of the best in Springfield ready to take their places on the force."

A statement that ground will be broken for the shopping center at the corner of Flermer and Morris avenues within three weeks comes with the announcement that control of the General Greene Shopping Center, Inc., has passed out of the hands of Nicholas Angleton.

Lyons' Arcade Excavating Is Now Finished

When announcement was made last week by Tom and Russell Lyons—that work would start in a few days on the new arcade shopping center off Center street, it was read with "tongue in cheek." But, they made good their promise with a bang and, by Tuesday, practically all the excavation work was completed and the contractors were making ready to start actual construction.

Shovels were on the property on Thursday with trucks hauling the excavated dirt and the cellar work ready to start. October 1 has been set as the target for completion of the job with four stores in the unit planned for the present.

The arcade is being constructed on the Lyons property, just off Center street. Four stores will face towards Morris avenue with ample space for shoppers to drive in their cars, make their purchases and drive off. There will also be walks available for pedestrians since it is planned to rebuild the rear of the present Lyons' Building so that entrances and store fronts will match those on Morris avenue.

Work has been completed on the paving of the municipal parking lot running from Flermer avenue to Center street. The contractor, J. Pastore & Son, of Union, did a fast and efficient job.

A summer overhauling job—by carpentry and painting—is being done on the interior of the First Presbyterian Church.

Considerable progress has been made in the rebuilding of the former St. James Church on Morris avenue which is to be the new home of the Springfield division of the Crestmont Savings and Loan Association. Only the shell of the former building remained after the contractor completed the demolition part of the job and it's beginning to take on the form of the architect's drawing displayed on a sign board on the property.

Papers Signed; Work To Start On Restaurant

Necessary legal papers were signed Monday for the Sip and Sup, the new eating place to be constructed on the corner of Morris and Springfield avenues, and actual start of the work now depends on whether the building, now occupying the site, is demolished or moved to another location. The Springfield Girl Scouts have been offered the building by the owners.

John Bullock, a Summit resident, who will supervise the operation of the Sip and Sup said yesterday he was confident that construction should start no later than August 15.

"We should be ready for our opening about three months after actual work is started," said Bullock in discussing the local venture. "We have offered the building now on the property to the local Girl Scouts and will give them every opportunity to find a piece of land because we feel such a civic endeavor should be encouraged and aided as much as possible. We will even contribute whatever it would cost us to demolish the present structure.

Bullock and his associates are very enthused over the prospects of locating in Springfield, the first of several such establishments throughout this area. The Springfield Sip and Sup, stated Bullock, will be the show place and testing ground for a chain of such eating places and every good feature of similar spots throughout the far west will be incorporated in the local establishment.

Once the building has been demolished or moved away, work will start immediately, said Bullock. The property will be graded down and every effort made to save all trees and bushes now on the property. The parking lot will have room for, at least, 80 cars and there will be a patio where customers may be served. There will be an entrance on Morris avenue and a very large entrance and exit—over 66 feet—on the Springfield avenue side.

SAILS FOR EUROPE

Nicholas Angleton, who has been head of the corporation handling the building of the General Greene shopping center, and this week resigned as president, sailed yesterday on the SS Independence for a visit to Greece and other European countries.

His office said that he would be away for, at least, two months.

Mr. Levine, in discussing plans for the shopping center with the SUN yesterday, said work on the project will now move forward rapidly and conferences already being held with contractors and sub-contractors indicate that actual ground breaking will take place within three weeks and "full speed ahead" will be the order of the day.

There are no changes in the leases, stated Mr. Levine, and Grand Union, J. J. Newberry and the other tenants of the local center, already announced, are pleased with the promises of action given by the new group in control of the center.

The development of the local shopping center, under Angleton's supervision, has been held up for months, the first sign on the property early in 1953 announcing "leases available for full occupancy." A new and larger sign board was constructed this past winter with the announcement that "it would be ready 'for summer occupancy.'" Springfield has already granted a building permit but there were no ground-breaking ceremonies and the permit was renewed for another sixty days.

No one in authority would make any statement as to what caused the delay in starting the construction but the new head of the enterprise, Mr. Levine, assured the SUN yesterday, that "all the loose ends are being picked up and the actual job of construction should start shortly."

All they had to work on was this letter from the Michigan City family received July 10:

"We returned from a European trip on May 1st. On shipboard we became acquainted with a couple whom we promised to get in touch with. Unfortunately, we have forgotten their name. They are German immigrants and have a boy about 3 or 4 years old. The husband speaks no English but the wife, a little. They were met and called for at the dock in New York by a relative who lives in Springfield, New Jersey, and taken to the 'latters' home there.

It occurs to us that possibly you might be able to get us in touch with them. If so, my wife and I will be extremely grateful.

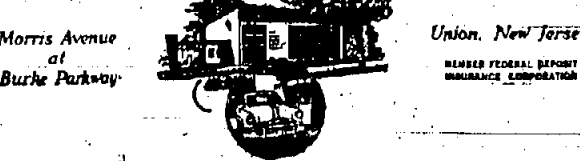

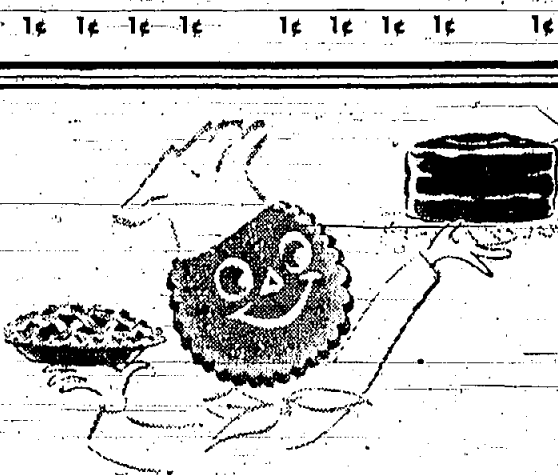

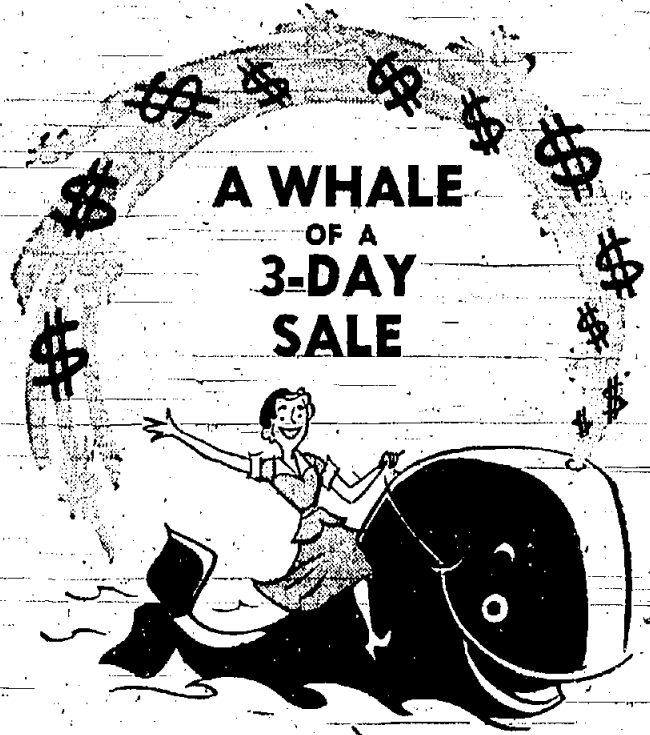

In no case shall the equipment use in excess of one and one-half (1 1/2) gallons per minute per ton capacity. (c) If two or more units, which in the aggregate total to three tons or over, are installed to serve the same building or premises, said units or units shall be subject to the same requirements applicable to a unit or equipment of three tons or over, as in this ordinance. Section 4. Each direct water connection to a refrigeration unit, air conditioning unit, or refrigeration and air conditioning unit, water-repelling purposes and which is connected with the public water supply system shall be equipped with a vacuum breaker, except in installations where the water supply piping has in contact with the refrigerant. This will be the responsibility of the contractor and independent water thickness and independent water thickness of metal piping the refrigerant from the public water system. Section 5. Refrigerating units, air conditioning units, or refrigeration and air conditioning units with a capacity of more than twenty pounds of refrigerant shall be provided with a relief valve installed on the outside of the vacuum breaker of the water supply connection, such relief valve being set at five pounds above the maximum water pressure at the point of installation.
