

## Plan Formal Opening Soon Of Crestmont

Preparations are already being made for a formal opening of the new home of the Springfield office of the Crestmont Savings and Loan Association—since the alterations to the thirty-year-old building, formerly the St. James Catholic Church on Morris avenue, are coming close to completion.

And, those who have been watching the progress, freely admit that this will be the finest looking building in Springfield—remodeled to the Williamsburg Colonial period, using "Glen Gery" Colonial brick for the exterior with traditional jointing, wood windows, cornices and cupola. The Colonial design is to carry out the expressed wish of the Crestmont officers to adhere, as much as possible, to the established style trend of Springfield which is strongly Colonial.

Much of the credit for the beauty of the new Crestmont home can be attributed to Alfred O. Pollitt of Maplewood, who, as the architect, not only designed the building but is supervising the job personally. Mr. Pollitt also supervised the construction of the comparatively new main office building of the Crestmont Savings and Loan in Maplewood.

The new Springfield office of the Association is located on a plot of 128 feet on Morris avenue and 260 feet deep on Linden. The interior will be Colonial and completely air conditioned. There will be ample parking space and provisions have been made for future safety deposit department booths and office area.

The date for the formal opening will be some time in October, the exact day depending on how rapidly the finishing touches can be made by the various contractors.

## Kravis Plans For Office Building

Herman Kravis, proprietor of the Springfield Wine and Liquor Store at 276 Morris avenue, will appear before the Springfield Board of Adjustment at its next regular meeting, September 23, with a revamped set of plans and specifications for his proposed office building to be constructed at the corner of Morris and Balmoral avenues and he is quite confident that he will be given approval and authority to proceed.

Mr. Kravis and his attorney appeared before the Board of Adjustment last Thursday for an exception to the Zoning Ordinance concerning his property which is to be the site for the new office building, but he was asked to submit more detailed plans of the structure with the suggestion that the modified Colonial design be carried out on the building.

## Women Voters League Plan Candidates Night

Even though there has been a self-imposed moratorium on politics during the Summer, the silence has been broken this week with the announcement from the League of Women Voters of Springfield—that a "Local Candidates meeting will be held at the James Caldwell School" on Thursday evening, October 28.

This is a formula followed by League of Women Voters groups throughout the State and the meeting of the two local candidates—Vincent J. Bonadies and Robert W. Marshall—on the same platform should be interesting.

Neither Bonadies nor Marshall have started their campaign for election to the Township Committee but both of them are "oiling the artillery" for the opening gun right after Labor Day.

Marshall defeated Harold G. Neminger for the Republican nomination in April in one of the bitterest primary campaigns held in Springfield for years. Neminger was backed by the Springfield Republican organization while Marshall ran as an Independent Republican. Marshall's victory left the organization far from united and very little has been done to heal the wounds since the primary. The former Mayor was called upon to prove charges he made against his former colleague during his primary campaign but the matter was dropped when Marshall failed to respond to several invitations to attend the Township Committee meetings and prove his accusations.

The "Local Candidates Night" arranged by the League of Women Voters for October 28 should come at the height of the campaign and provide a platform where both Bonadies and Marshall will be given an opportunity to "sell a bill of goods" to the voters in Springfield.

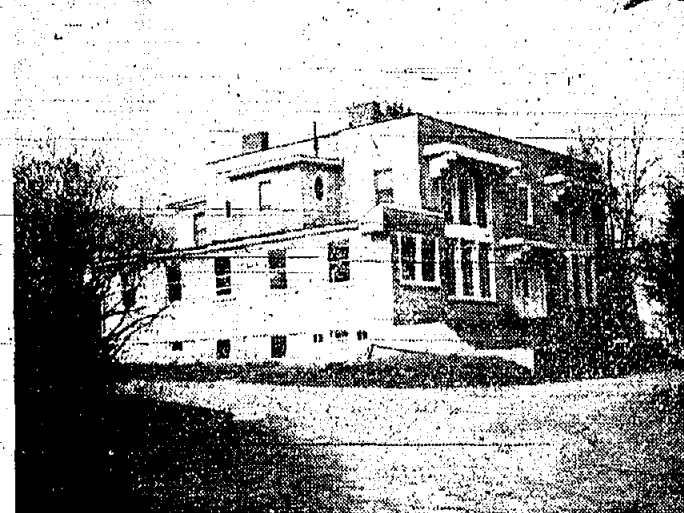

## Jewish Community Members Hard At Work On New Home

The Chateau Balmoral on Linden avenue, recently acquired by the Springfield Jewish Community group is undergoing a thorough face lifting job. Over 45 volunteers—all members of the group—under the chairmanship of the Freedman and Danny Gerber, have been working feverishly during the past few week ends, repairing, redecorating, the skilled and qualified electricians of the local group taking care of all new wiring, the carpenters in the job while all the others pitch in and help wherever there is some work to be done.

The plans for converting the building into a Jewish Community Center are well under way and will be ready in time for observance and services for the High Holy days.

Some of the major changes in the building include a large exhaust fan in the ceiling of the main hall, the construction of a stage, installation of a complete and new lighting system, additional exits, and complete redecoration of both the exterior and interior of the building. The response of volunteers for work on the building includes accountants, stenographers, lawyers, teachers, engineers, and business men as well as the members skilled in various trades, welding, hammers, saws, brooms, electrical tools and paint brushes, performing all the tasks necessary for such a project.

The Freedman, who is more than satisfied with the progress being made but who still needs more help, announces that he will be glad to see more members or prospective members of the group, willing to lend a skilled hand in the work. He invites those members to see him at the Chateau Balmoral for assignment.

"On behalf of the entire Jewish Community Group," said Mr. Freedman after a file of his enthusiasm cooled off, "we want to express our grateful appreciation to the many volunteers, both men and women, who have generously given of their time and skill. Without their enthusiastic cooperation—and this refers to the ladies, too—this important project could not have been undertaken and accomplished."

Freedman also pointed out that a great deal of the material needed in the alteration and redecoration work has been donated to the Jewish Community Group for which he and the entire membership is very grateful. There is still considerable work to be done—and a great deal more material for the job needed—but Freedman and his committee feel confident the center will be ready in time for the holidays, the latter part of September.

## War Dept. Reports Son Out Of Danger

Congressman Williams contacted his office in Washington and Mrs. Woznicki received two telegrams from the Sixth District Representative, the latest one giving the news that the boy "was out of danger, in good condition and would probably be out of the hospital in three weeks."

Mrs. Woznicki was told in her home for the comforting messages received from both Cong. Williams and the War Department. "They were wonderful at the War Department."

## High Class Tea Room Will Open In New Center

Announcement was made yesterday by Max J. Levine, the developer of the General Greene Shopping Center at the corner of Morris and Main, that one of the tenants, already signed on a long term lease, will be a tea room and restaurant. The tea room will be run by the Louis J. Orban, one of New Jersey's well known organizations in this field, and the report has it that one of the newest type establishment will be ready for the shoppers.

Work on the shopping center is progressing rapidly and there is little doubt that the contractor will be able to maintain the schedule on the construction work.

Other construction work in Springfield finds the bulldozers and scrapers leveling off the property at the corner of Morris and Springfield avenues where the new Sip and Sup restaurant is to be constructed. The old buildings have been dismantled and removed and, yesterday, equipment was brought in to start scraping and getting ready for the actual start of the construction.

The work on the Union Coal and Lumber Company executive offices on Mountain avenue is now continued to the interior and the entire job, should be completed on schedule.

## Concrete Co. Truck Damages Two Cars

A three car crash, involving a truck of the Commonwealth Concrete Company of Bound Brook and two other vehicles waiting in line for the light to change on Morris avenue, near the corner of Main, Friday afternoon sent one woman to the Overlook Hospital and damaged the two automobiles.

The last car in line going west on Morris avenue and waiting for the traffic lights to change, he longed to go and was being driven by Paul Druback of Bayonne. The heavy concrete truck, driven by Julius Poli, 30, of Summit, according to the police report, plowed into the standing line, sending the Druback car into the vehicle directly in front, owned by Gabriel Bleskberg, 54, of Hillside.

Mrs. Adele Druback, sitting in the rear of her car, received the direct impact of the crash, and was rushed to Overlook Hospital by the Springfield First Aid Squad. The Druback car was badly damaged and towed away. The Bleskberg car was slightly damaged but driven away by the owner after police and bystanders helped clear the bumpers. Patrolman E. Roesser reported the accident to headquarters.

Two other car accidents were reported to the police but no one was hurt in either one. Bumpers caught when cars driven by William C. Cosgrove or 115 South Maple street and Roberta Walker of 3 Dundar road attempted to park on Morris avenue, about 8:40 p.m., Tuesday evening.

Another involved Anthony Zarrella, 28, of 15 Pitt road, whose car is reported to have struck another being driven by Edwin Simmon Rubin of Miami, Florida, at Morris and Springfield avenues. Zarrella's car is said to have made a turn onto Morris avenue and struck the Rubin car, coming out of the gas station and going west. The Florida auto was damaged on the right-side while the local car's left bumper was pulled away from its moorings.

## Youngsters' Crime Wave Ends; Leader To Enlist

Frank H. Wynkoop, an eighteen-year-old "mixed up kid" living at 130 Bloomfield avenue, Hoboken, can thank his lucky stars that Magistrate Henry C. McMullen only handed him a good, old-fashioned tongue lashing and a suspended sentence after pleading guilty to a charge of petty larceny in Springfield Municipal Court Tuesday.

The Hoboken youngster, with two other juveniles, launched a little crime wave of their own which came to an abrupt end in Springfield shortly after he picked up a pocketbook off the counter at the Gibson Diner, Morris avenue. The boys were apprehended in Westfield where they attempted to pick up a purse, according to the police report, and when arraigned there, the authorities were informed that the three boys were also wanted in Springfield.

The pocketbook, taken by the kids in Springfield, belonged to Mrs. Mary Gibson, owner of the diner.

The eighteen-year-old was brought to Springfield and appeared before Magistrate McMullen on a charge of petty larceny. There were no records of previous arrests, according to the report, and the heart-broken parents of the Wynkoop boy, who appeared in the local court, stated that the boy had been a good son and was planning to enlist in the United States Army.

The Wynkoop boy pleaded guilty to the Springfield charge and Magistrate McMullen suspended sentence, after delivering a lecture on juvenile delinquency, with the understanding that the boy would go into the service. The Westfield charge was also suspended, according to the report, but he is still wanted in Belleville, the police say, on a similar charge.

The prisoners, now at the Plainfield City Jail, will be arraigned today before Magistrate Henry W. Clement.

Department," said Mrs. Woznicki, "and I received seven telegrams since getting the news that Gordon was hurt—in addition to the two messages from Congressman Williams. Mr. Williams' telegrams gave us the good news and the one announcing that my boy was out of danger came three hours ahead of the War Department wire. I am very thankful to Congressman Williams and to those in the War Department who kept me informed about Gordon."
Just how the accident occurred is not clear except that some chemicals exploded in the area where the Marine was assigned to duty and he suffered severe burns. One of the telegrams informed Mrs. Woznicki that Gordon had been asked to write immediately to his mother to reassure her that he is out of danger. She received a letter a few days ago, written before the accident.

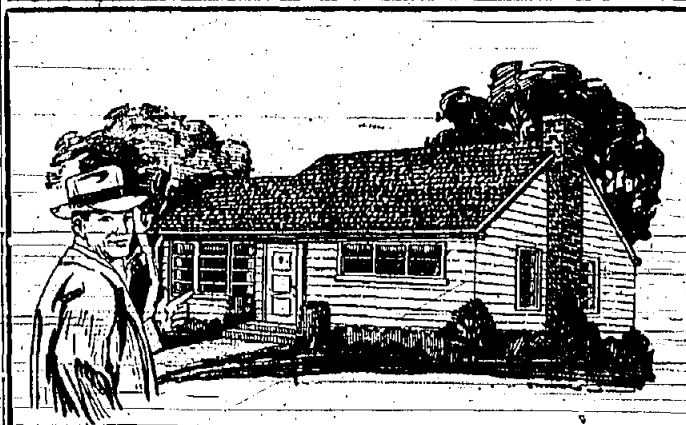
