Town Hall, the open forum of public opinion-that good, old fashioned sounding board in the American way of life, came to Springfield Monday evening in the form of-a public hearing on a new proposed zoning ordinance at the Florence M. Gaudineer School.

It was a refreshing and exhilarating experience for those who came just to "see Democracy at work" but for those who registered objections-sincere, synthetic or imaginary—it appeared to be the most crucial moment in the history of very historic Springfield. Tonsils and vocal chords that have been "skipping rope and taking only light exercise" since the late lamented All-State Insurance debacle were given another chance to "flex their muscles" and those extended index fingers of warning and dire threats again stirred up the air in the school gymanasium.

None of this is being written in a derogatory sense, nor do we find any fault with those who see changes in the new ordinance too drastic for the "picture of ranguillity" --- the oasis of jangled nerves as-conjured up and made-part of the ranch house developers sales. literature. We're not questioning the sincerity of those who want changes-but there was a great deal left to be desired Monday evening as far as decorum and respect for town officials are concerned.

Preparing this ordinance—sitting long weary hours in consultation with the engineers and the master planners-was a tiring chore for members of the Planning Board. The cause of the objectors was hardly enhanced by the aggressiveness and table pounding of some of the articulate residents who shouted, interrupted, offered\_snide\_remarks\_and,-otherwise,-made\_it\_appear that the Planning Board and the Township Committee had wrapped up a diabolical plan, with the connivance of the Baltusrol Golf Club and Daystrom, Inc., to "sel Springfield down the river."


At this point we would like to make our position very clear. The Springfield Sun doesn't have to offer this explanation but the yackety-yackers have been spreading some gossip that we were part and parcel of a scheme to "put something over" on the residents in this area because nothing appeared in the Springfield Sun in the last issue concerning Daystrom.

The SUN "goes to bed" Wednesday night and prints with Thursday's date line. Last week's issue carried a Page One story in which we hoped to turn the spotlight on the public hearing by announcing 'a large crowd of interested citizens was that anticipated, etc."

The alleged option for the Baltusrol Golf Club property was announced as having been signed on Friday according to the Sunday newspaper account. We had heard rumors-and we have been sitting on a flock of rumors for months-but, as far as we knew, there was nothing on which to base any facts. Cartons of corrugated or solid fiberboard or kraftboard are commonly used and have proven to be best suited for parcel post mailings. A good used corrugated fiberboard box such as is-available at grocery or drug stores makes an excellent shipping con-

tainer for parcels. These containers must be covered with brown wrapping paper and securely tied. Parcels addressed to distant-points receive more handling and therefore require stronger containers. Sufficient internal cushioning material should surround the article to be

mailed to protect it from outside

The packages you mail are valuable to you and the recipient. Protect them by proper packaging and insure them against loss or damage at a small additional fee. It is also suggested the use of a return receipt would alleviate any doubts as to whether or not the person for whom the parcol was intended for had received it. Ask the parcel post clerks about the insurance and return receipt services they have to offor your protection and con-

venience Parcels mailed under the fourth class rate may-not-be-sealed unless they bear a printed or written endorsement on the address side reading-"May-be-opened-for postal-inspection.'

-Mail vour-Christmas-parcols early,-Please-remember-it-isbetter that your gift is received a week before the holiday and under the Christmas tree rather than being in transit because of late mailing. Holiday parcels may be endorsed "Do not open until Christmas."

Your attention is invited to the fact that the employees of the local post office are well versed in the entire operation of the Postal Service and they are available to answer all questions., If you have any doubts about the mailability of any item, consult them beforehand to eliminate inconvenience, delay or damage to your mail. It is the desire of all the post office employees and the postmaster to give the best postal service at all times.

Those who raised their voices in protest and objection\_Monday\_evening-had a perfect right under our system of permitting all to be heard-but no decisions, no changes could be made according to legal opinion. After next Monday's public hearing, the Planning Board will drag itself off to some quiet corner of the Township Hall, carefully consider all the suggestions; and proposed changes. Then their recommendation will be relayed to the first team, the Township Committee, and the march toward the goal will start all over again.

Mayor Albert G. Binder and Frank M. Kerr, chairman of the Planning Board, are to be commended for "cooling off" some of mob psychology by controlling their own tempers despite some of the abuse aimed directly at the town officials. Most of the speakers against the zoning ordinance presented calm and sound objections and requested the Planning Board to consider making those suggested changes when the recommendations are presented to the Township Committee.
