

It starts with a letter sent to every dealer in the-area, requesting-the-proprietor, through his own interest in the moral welfare of the young, to stop the display and sale of all objectionable literature, especially in the form of comics, maga zines, and pocket-size books. Shortly after receiving the letter the dealer. is visited by two committee workers who discuss the whole matter with him. If the dealer agrees to cooperate, a certificate is presented which he displays in his establishement. At the same time he is supplied with the current list of approved publications issued by the National-Organization for Decent Literature.
