Local Building Boom Rises Through 1954

Building permits issued during 1954 authorized construction valued at \$2,926,856, an increase of \$732,000 over 1953, according to Reuben H. Marsh, retiring building inspector.

In 1954, building permits authorized construction of 158 one-family homes valued at \$1,924,000, a jump of \$473,000 and 30 homes over the previous year. Last year's industrial and business units totaled \$865,000 and those for 1953, \$504,000. There was an increase of \$28,705 for alterations and repairs in 1954.

Marsh's resignation as building inspector was accepted Saturday by the Township Committee at its organization meeting. He had served for 24 years.

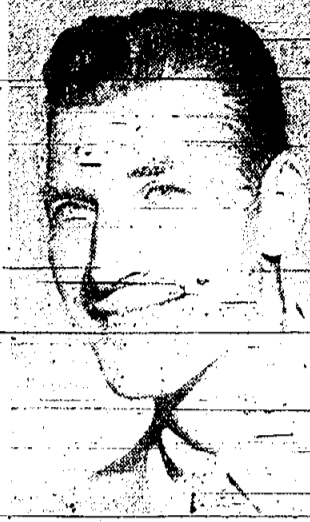

Binder Named Mayor; Sets Up New Departments

Township To Join SPCA Shelter Plan

Mayor Albert G. Binder was given authorization by the Township Committee to enroll Springfield in the SPCA regional dog shelter plan, under which animals from the township will be cared for at a shelter in Rahway.

Funds were set aside in last year's budget for the township's participation in the scheme, but it was not until recently that facilities to handle animals from here were made available. A number of other county municipalities are enrolled in the plan.

The annual cost to the township of the regional system is about \$2,200. An initial fee of about \$1,000, Springfield's share in the cost of the building and truck, will also be paid.

Mayor Binder said the step is an important one in providing "the most modern answer known to an age-old problem." He estimated the dog population of Springfield at about 1,000 and said local facilities were "entirely inadequate" to handle the situation.

The shelter which is located at 90 St. George Avenue in Rahway will be charged with the responsibility of impounding stray dogs. Any unlicensed dog will be picked up by the pound and owners will be charged a \$2.00 fee to recover them plus housing and feeding costs. Any information regarding dogs can be obtained from the local police department.

Highlights of the 1955 organization meeting of the Springfield Township Committee was the nomination of Albert G. Binder to be mayor again for this year and the formation of two departments—a consolidation of the police and fire departments into a department of public safety, chaired by Frederick A. Handville—and the formation of a public affairs department headed by Vincent J. Bonadies.

Summit Puts Thumbs Down Marmon Tract

The chances of a proposed 15-acre shopping center on the Marmon property, which borders on the Springfield Summit line, looked very dim with the announcement of the Summit planning board that it would not recommend a change to a business zone.

In a letter to the Summit council, the planning board did advise rezoning the land to a classification which would allow limited business, but would prohibit retail stores and professional services.

Early in last year, the Springfield Township Committee upon recommendation from their planning board, changed that portion of Marmon's property in Springfield to a limited business zone, anticipating the proposed shopping center. However, according to P. T. McCroskey, planning board consultant, the Summit section of the tract differs considerably with the Springfield section in that it does not face any developed retail business property such as the Safeway market and the Huffman-Boyle furniture store.

Most of the Summit land in question has many single family dwellings fronting the Broad street side of the tract and according to McCroskey, "should not be back against retail stores, with deliveries of fresh foods and removal of waste foods." He further stated that the granting of this rezoning request would be "entirely improper and would be subject to almost certain court reversal," if appealed by nearby residents.

Mayor Outlines Plans For The Coming Year

In a far-reaching, bold message, Mayor Albert G. Binder told the residents of Springfield at the organization meeting of the Township Committee that an ambitious program has been planned to meet the ever increasing problems of our fast growing community. The Mayor presented his program to a packed committee room which included friends and relatives of the newly sworn-in governing body and interested residents who came to wish the Township Committee good luck in the coming year.

Mayor Binder's comprehensive program reflects the experience and knowledge which he has accumulated in his past years of service:

"On behalf of the members of the Governing Body, I extend to each and every resident of Springfield, and especially to those who have honored us with their presence here this morning, a most happy and prosperous New Year. The trials and tribulations, and the joys and sorrows of the past year have only served to strengthen our faith in God and our fellow man and I am likewise sure that this New Year will bring his many new problems and decisions, heartaches and headaches, but I am confident that we will meet the challenge and endeavor to administer the affairs of our town in such a manner that will reflect sincerity, integrity and understanding of our common goal. "I cannot let this opportunity go by without publicly acknowledging and commending the many faithful men and women on the various boards and committees in our Municipal Government, who have labored long and hard in the interests of Springfield. The majority of whom serve without compensation and who often feel the ire of their fellow citizens for decisions that may affect the few,

in the welfare of the many." The Mayor then reflected on 1954: "What kind of a year has 1954 been? It has been a year of continued growth in Springfield. Many new residential areas have been opened and developed. Large tracts of land are continuing to be opened, and still larger areas are scheduled for home building in the near future. In the past year we have issued approximately 200 home building permits and I venture to estimate there will be an additional 400-500 permits issued for home owners in the year of 1955. This all adds up to a terrific impact on our municipal and educational facilities and its related financial requirements.

I am not advocating a tax per capita policy but I do want to point out the effect of this continued growth on our town. To offset this dilemma we must increase our ratables thru selected industrial and business developments. I am well aware of the position I place myself in the eyes of those who feel that I am advocating widespread influx of factories and business houses. However, such is definitely not my thought but I do believe the time has come to balance our economic position with suitable and well placed

Three School Board Seats Sought By Four Candidates

Reports received from the Springfield Board of Education office yesterday revealed that two new candidates, Mrs. Kenneth Gibbons of 541 South Springfield Avenue and C. Roderic Gibbins of 10 Park Lane, have filed their petitions to run in the local school board elections on February 8.

Along with this, came the announcement that Thomas F. Doherty, long-time resident and school board member has declined to run for re-election. Doherty's decision is the second received from an incumbent, since George D. Harrison Jr. last week disclosed his decision not to seek re-election. It is rumored that the third incumbent, Howard S. Smith would probably file his petition today.

If Smith does file, four candidates will be on the ballot on February 8: Smith, Loran Skousen, Mrs. Bandomer and Gibbons.

Mrs. Bandomer has been a resident of Springfield for 10 years, an organizer of the Springfield Woman's Club, and active in the Girl Scouts. She served on the Citizens Advisory Committee, participated in many fund drives and is a member of the P.T.A. Board.

"To enable us to expand in an orderly, efficient, and economical sound basis we have taken two important steps during the last year. The first of these was to place a full time engineer on our staff. The second has been the completion of a new zoning plan. This ordinance plans for the present as well as the future and affords a restrictive control for orderly development and economic stability in the years to come. Many other creditable achievements can be found in the record for 1954, fact that they were possible is to no one, individuals credit, but to the board as a whole.

"But what about the year that lies ahead? There is hard work to be done if we are to keep abreast of our responsibilities.

"The new shopping center is bound to have a beneficial effect for both merchants and shoppers. Public and private parking facilities will be expanded. Increased traffic will necessitate revised regulations and controls. Major improvements for new and existing roadways are contemplated and will be diligently pursued."

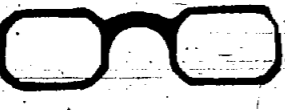
