(Continued from page 1) tax rate for the year 1955 to provide for the total amount of money which must be raised by taxation for the coming school year.

1. ADMINISTRATION. With a new building to be ready for occupancy in the fall, it will be necessary for the supervisor of buildings to devote his entire time to supervisory work of the four schools...

School has been a teaching principal and his salary was included in the item of teachers' salaries. With the opening of the new school, his duties will be entirely supervisory and his salary must therefore be included under principals' salaries.

3. INSTRUCTION - PROPER. This is the largest item in the budget, including as it does teachers' salaries, textbooks, and supplies. A large part of the increase in this classification is explained by the need for seven or eight additional teachers for the coming year...

4. OPERATION. The employment of two new men for the new school, together with additional requirements for fuel, light, power, etc., account for the increase in this classification.

5. COORDINATED ACTIVITIES. There is very little change here. This item represents the cost of the medical and dental services provided in the school program...

6. AUXILIARY AGENCIES. Due to the efficient operation of our lunch room, provision for possible operating deficit has been reduced from \$2,000 to \$500. The only material increase is in the item of transportation to other districts...

very high cost of arranging for private transportation, it is planned to purchase a station wagon, which will take care of this responsibility and will also be useful in many other ways.

7. FIXED CHARGES. The additional amount under the heading of tuition is due to the required program for trainable children mentioned above. The increase in pensions is due to anticipated new Social Security provisions...

8. Maintenance. Very little change is shown in this item. The largest sum in this classification is that for maintenance of buildings. In order to protect the town's investment in the school system, it is essential to provide for keeping the buildings in good repair...

9. DEBT SERVICE. The increase here represents the cost of financing the construction of the new school.

10. CAPITAL OUTLAY. This classification shows a substantial reduction. Last year's budget provided funds for the construction of a garage on the grounds of the Gaudineer School...

vided funds for the construction of a garage on the grounds of the Gaudineer School, which has proved to be a most useful and economical addition to our system since it accommodates the school bus, jeep and other equipment and also has storage space and a shop area for making repairs.

The Board of Education believes the proposed budget is adequate to take care of the requirements of the school system for the coming year. Springfield has shown an increasing interest in its schools and the Board appreciates the support it has received in the past in its efforts to maintain a high educational standard...

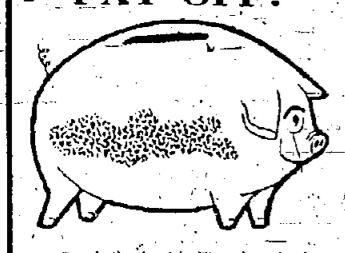

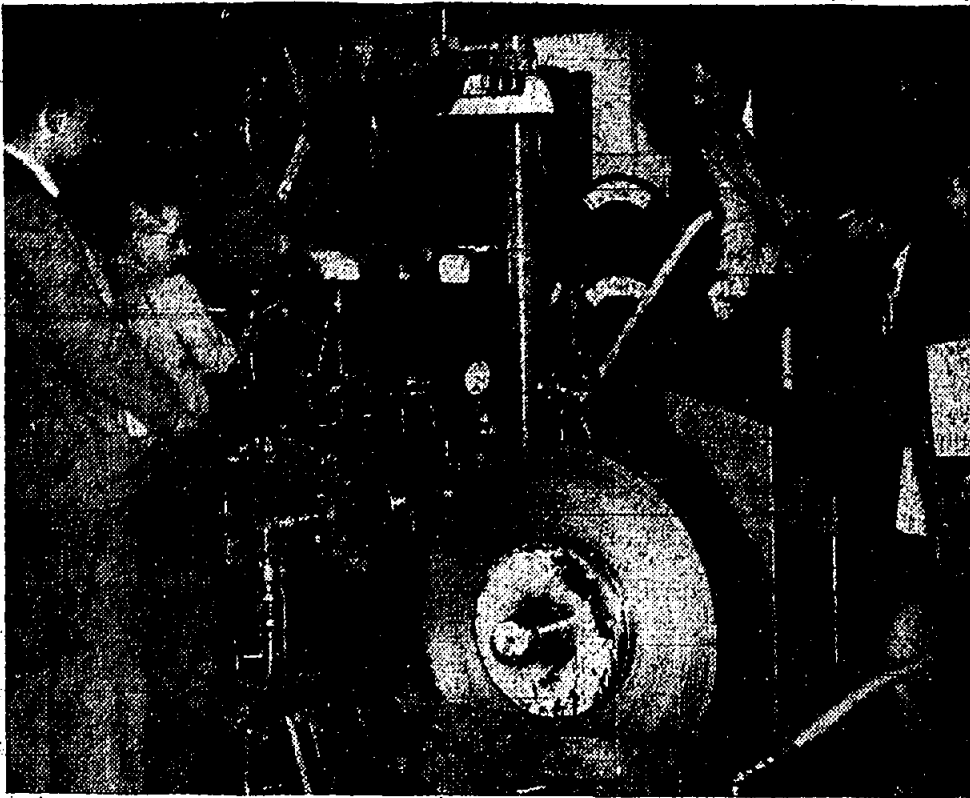
