459 Kids Here Will Be Given Polio Vaccine

Springfield will waste no time and is ready to start the Salk vaccine inoculations next Wednesday, April 20, with 459 first and second grade children from James Caldwell, Raymond Chisholm and St. James School to receive the anti-polio shots.

Home Building Projects OK'd By Plan Board

Preliminary plans for three proposed home-building projects were approved by the Township Planning Board at last Thursday's regular meeting and actual work is expected to start as soon as final maps are accepted. Complete final plans, showing location of all the utilities, streets and other required information, will be presented to the Planning Board at its next regular meeting, scheduled for May 5. As soon as these final plans are approved, construction permits will then be issued and actual work on the projects ready to start.

The largest of the developments will be the Fisher Construction Company project on the 60 acres of the former Flermer property, running along Milltown Road and Meisel Avenue. This firm, with David and William Fisher appearing before the Planning Board last Thursday to present their plans, received the approval of a preliminary program showing 198 homes to be constructed on this property. Four type houses will be built, according to Mr. Fisher, with prices ranging from \$18,000 to \$23,000. The entire building project will be divided into three sections, that part of the property where the Flermer buildings are now located to be used for the last of the homes. The part of the property along Meisel Avenue will be the site for the first homes. The development by the Fishers will be known as the Woodside Homes. Approval was also given New Brook Estates, with John A. Celentano, a Clifton builder, as head of the organization, to construct 55 one-family split level homes on the 17 acre tract of land known as the Haselmann property in South Springfield Avenue. Final plans for this development will be presented to the Planning Board at its May 5 meeting for final approval and issuance of building permits.

Arrange For Dinner

Participants in the Senior mixed bowling league will hold their dinner and award night on April 30 at the Club Diana, Springfield. Reservations can be made no later than April 17 with John O'Connor, president of the league.

Consent cards were sent to the parents of the 487 school children enrolled, and 459 were returned "requesting" that the vaccine inoculations be administered. Mrs. Eleanor H. Worthington, as secretary of the Board of Health, said yesterday that these cards actually request the inoculation instead of just giving permission.

The plan is to start the vaccine shots at St. James and James Caldwell School next Wednesday with two more dates to follow, April 27 and May 25. Raymond Chisholm School will take care of the program on next Thursday, April 21 with the two additional dates, April 26 and May 26. Dr. N. F. Vogel, acting school physician, will have charge of the medical staff administering the vaccine at James Caldwell and Raymond Chisholm schools. Dr. John V. Triolo and Dr. A. Albert Sabatino will be in charge of the program at St. James.

Nurses and other volunteers will aid in the immunization program at all of Springfield schools. The local project has been in charge of a committee headed by School Superintendent B. F. Newslinger.

Zoning Ordinance Finally Adopted

The new Springfield zoning ordinance, under consideration since a year ago February, was adopted last night by the Township Committee on its final reading. Objections to the final passage of the ordinance were heard and assurances given that consideration would be given the proposed exceptions at a later date.

Resignation of Police Sgt. A. Nelson Stiles, a member of the local department for 26 years, was accepted with regret at last night's meeting to take effect in August. He requested immediate acceptance so that his application for retirement may be processed by August.

Springfield is in the happy position of solving two problems with a single decision if the very ambitious building program as announced by Nicholas Angleton yesterday for a "more than ten million dollar project in the Township" become a reality.

Mr. Angleton, who has given Springfield Short Hills Village and General Green Village, both very attractive villages, announced yesterday that he has purchased the more than 80 acres known as the North Jersey Quarry Co. and plans the last word in garden apartments on half of the property and "limited business enterprises such as modern office buildings and laboratories" on the other 40 acres.

Preliminary discussions were held Tuesday night with Mr. Angleton presenting his ambitious plan to a joint meeting of the Planning Board and the Township Committee. According to reports, the reception to Angleton's plan was very gratifying to him and the machinery will start immediately to make application for the necessary variances and exceptions in zoning needed to launch the big project.

Approval of Mr. Angleton's proposal would not only give Springfield much desired increased taxables and additional taxes, said one Township official, "but it will also eliminate what has been increasing as an eye-sore, a stony piece of property with a lot of abandoned holes because the quarry company has long since quit work on this side of Shunpike Road."

Complete details of Mr. Angleton's program for the property will be presented to the Planning Board as soon as maps can be prepared, showing what the terrain will need in the way of sewers and proper drainage.

The quarry property was purchased, according to an announcement from Mr. Angleton's office by Troy Village, Inc., which he heads. It has a 2,000 foot frontage along Shunpike Road and extends from Briant's Pond at the Summit line down towards Baltusrol Way.

The new Zoning Ordinance, passed last night, has this property restricted for residential but the proposal is so attractive to Springfield that request for exceptions and changes will, no doubt, be quickly approved. The building code also calls for 10 families per acre in a garden apartment which indicates that Mr. Angleton's plan for such a development should result in the finest type of building. The garden apartments, said Mr. Angleton, will be built in stages.

Donna, The Duck, Is Still Pet Of The Totten Tots

Easter gift—Mrs. and Mrs. H. B. Totten of 23 Warner Avenue gave a duck to their pet-loving children which actually answers to the name of Donna and has become a part of the neighborhood.

As a matter of fact, the Totten kids, daughter, Carol, age 13, and a son, Robert who is all of 10 this month, named the duck Donald when they first made it part of their pet parade but, one day the duck laid an egg and the name was immediately changed to "Donna."

The fact that Donna is still one of the favorites of Carol and Robert establishes some kind of a longevity record since ducks are not supposed to live as many years as this one has been with the Totten family. But Donna not only has lived six years but she justifies her existence by laying eggs every spring and summer since she was three years old.

Donna is one of the favorites of the Totten pets. All the kids in the neighborhood play with Donna. Even the Totten dog, named Lizzie, is having quite an affair with the duck, residents having very often seen Lizzie scratching the duck's head while Donna repays the favor by scratching Lizzie under her chin.

Carol and Robert feed Donna once a day but if Donna has found fault with the service or quantity of food, the duck informs the kids in well understood quack language that she wants, at least, another helping. During good weather Donna gets her own exercise by wandering all over the neighborhood, visiting other kids in nearby homes. When she finds the day too exerting and tiring, Donna just quits and sits down in the middle of the street. The honking of auto horns by motorists who discover her sitting on the roadway in the path of traffic means nothing to Donna. Strangers in the area will honk their horns until a neighbor picks Donna up but those who know, just stop their cars, step out and move the duck to one side so that the car can pass.

Donna is no timid duck and often twaddles under a neighbor's window and honks for bread, preferring the homogenized, Hollywood diet sliced brand.

The six year old duck is seldom lonesome with Carol and Robert in the Totten home. In addition to Lizzie, the dog, the family has a parakeet, all kinds of fish, two turtles and other kids' pets.

There was also a cat but tabby didn't move fast enough, while crossing Morris Avenue traffic a few weeks ago. Carol and Robert have already a promise from mom and pop to have another one become part of the family.





c. Costs of issuing obligations authorized for such purpose including printing and advertising of said obligations, notices of sale, and legal expenses.
3. The following matters are hereby determined as provided in E.S. 40-11 etc.:
a. The bonds or bond-anticipation notes of the Township of Springfield shall be authorized to be issued in an amount not to exceed \$17,000.00 for the purposes herein expressed.
b. The maximum rate of interest which such bonds or bond-anticipation notes shall not exceed six per cent (6%) per annum.
c. The period of usefulness of said improvements for which said bonds or bond-anticipation notes are issued is ten years.
d. The supplemental data required by E.S. 40-11 etc. has been duly made and filed in the Office of the Township Clerk, and the said statement shows that the gross debt of the Township is increased by this Ordinance to the extent of \$3,150.00, and that the obligations authorized by this Ordinance will be within the legal limitations prescribed by the Local Bond Law.
e. So much of the cost of said improvements as will equal the amount of benefits actually accrued by land or lands as may be necessary thereon shall be assessed against the property thus specially benefited, and the difference between the total cost of said improvements and the total of said assessments, if there be any difference, shall be paid by

general taxation at large.
Special Assessments for benefits against the property benefited hereby shall be paid in three annual installments from the date of confirmation of said special assessments.
6. This Ordinance shall take effect ninety (90) days after final passage and publication thereof as provided by law.
