

## Parade Leads Memorial Day Observances

Herb Fay, President of the Springfield Volunteer Fire Department, will be the Grand Marshal and leader of the Memorial Day parade Monday morning. Fay will lead 12 Springfield groups on the traditional route from the Town Hall Square over to Millburn and back. Homage will be paid at four cemeteries in Millburn and Springfield before the parade returns to Town Hall for concluding ceremonies by Mayor Binder and other civic officials.

The Springfield units of the parade will assemble at 9:00 a. m. behind the Municipal Building. With the Harmony Pipe and Drum Corps from Boonton setting the rhythmic pace, the marchers will head for Taylor Park, Millburn, to join the Millburn division. The Springfield order of march is:

First, Grand Marshal, Herb Fay, then the Police Department, invited service men and women, the band, Fire Department, American Legion, V.F.W., Legion Auxiliary, First Aid Squad, D.A.R., Red Cross, Boy and Girl Scouts, Cubs and Brownies.

After short ceremonies in Taylor Park, the combined Springfield-Millburn contingent will march north on Whittingham Terrace, turn west on Millburn avenue and proceed to St. Rose of Lima's and St. Stephen's cemeteries. Piping squads, buglers and delegations of each group will hold memorial services in the cemeteries. Then the parade will march south down Short Hills avenue to Morris avenue. The entire parade will then march up Morris avenue to Main street, where services will be held in the Presbyterian and Methodist cemeteries.

After these ceremonies, the Millburn contingent will return to Taylor Park, and the Springfield marchers will return to the Town Hall Square. Mayor Albert G. Binder will deliver the address of the day there. Other Memorial Day ceremonies will follow. The V.F.W. has announced that they will hold open house after the parade at the Post Home on Morrison road. Commander Cardinal says that the refreshments will be on the house.

## President Eisenhower's Wire Highlights 175th Celebration

### Board of Health Condemns Property

The Springfield Board of Health has condemned the property at 52 and 54 Main street as being unfit for occupancy and the owners have been notified to move the tenants out of the building within ten days according to an announcement made yesterday by the Health Board authorities.

The ten day notices to clear out the properties point out that a thorough inspection had been made of the two addresses and found to be unfit. The properties may be improved and, if found in compliance with the sanitary and health requirements of the Health Board, may again be occupied by tenants.

An executive meeting of the Board of Health has been called by Township Committee and Chairman of the Board for next Tuesday evening to discuss plans for providing nurse services to the St. James Parochial School children. A request to furnish such nursing services was voted down by the Health Board last February but further study has been made of health services in other communities.

President Eisenhower's telegram, congratulating Springfield on its celebration commemorating the 175th anniversary of the historic battle of Springfield and a proclamation by the New Jersey State Legislature, designating June 23 as the "Battle of Springfield Day," highlighted this week's regular session of the general committee on arrangements for the big event.

Reports of the various working committees were very encouraging and so much interest is being generated that indications point to many thousands of visitors for the pageant on June 23 and the big parade on Saturday, June 25.

"Bill" Jensen in Colonial costume, who has been "alerting the entire countryside" in his job as "town crier" will visit Summit and Millburn during the week to let the people know of the plans for the celebration.

Representatives from Summit, Millburn and Menlo Park attended Monday night's regular committee meeting and promised participation by their communities in publishing the anniversary next month. Millburn will be decorated for the event and schools have been notified and invited to witness the parade and other celebration events.

Postmaster Abel V. Del Vecchio and his workers are making a house-to-house solicitation of Springfield, distributing tags and collecting funds needed to meet the costs of staging the celebration.

The Cannon Ball House, one of Springfield's authentic historic spots, will be the information center during the celebration and will be staffed by members of the committee starting with June 5.

The interior has been renovated and furnished. Post cards especially made for the celebration and a book giving full information on the history of Springfield and the famous battle will be for sale at the Cannon Ball House.

Replies are beginning to come in from some of the dignitaries invited to attend the celebration events. Congressman Harrison A. Williams Jr., representative from the Sixth District (Union County) and Admiral Smith notified the committee this week that they have accepted the invitation and will attend.

### Lyons Named President of Jewish Group

The statement is in the form of a letter signed by Francis J. Keane and Irwin Weinberg and, according to the latter, "this is only the kick off, the beginning of a continuing barrage against the local administration until we have smoked out some of the answers."

"This open letter to the people of Springfield," said Weinberg in a telephone conversation yesterday, "speaks for itself but there is a great deal more we haven't said, a great many more questions we'd like to have answered all in the best interests of our Township."

"Our letter mentions that Springfield is now involved in many law suits and we make the observation that law suits cost money. The important thing is that every law suit, every bit of litigation means that additional fees must be paid by the taxpayers to the town attorney for the defense on behalf of Springfield. There are now four suits pending against the Township and rumors have it that several more threatened."

"We intend to explore some matters which have evidently been settled in quiet caucus or 'star chamber' sessions. We will try to dig out the real reason for this sudden romance, this sizzling love affair with Nicholas Angleton who had apparently been the villain if several local pieces in the past. We will try to inform the taxpayers of the Township why Angleton's race-trimmed proposal to construct 35 or 40 acres of apartment houses on the quarry property was given the official wink-of-approval and jet-propelled into acceptance within a very short time. All this speed while owners of other properties, with proposals to bring some very fine raffles here, are still kicking their heels in the outer chambers and are no closer to an 'o.k.' than they were months ago."

## Ordinance to Rezone Quarry Introduced

An ordinance re-zoning the Jersey Quarry property from its present residential zone into part apartment house and part limited business was introduced at a regular meeting of the Township Committee last night.

The quarry property which was recently purchased by Nicolas Angleton, calls for re-zoning a 40-acre portion of the 75-acre land from "S-120 district" into an "M District" (Apartment houses or garden apartment type.)

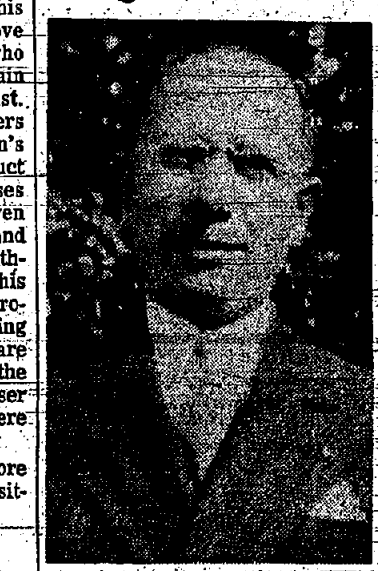
The remaining 35 acres to be changed are classified as S-120 and S-75 residential districts and the ordinance provides for land use to permit limited business.

A public hearing will be held on this ordinance before final passage on June 8 at the Town Hall.

An appropriation by ordinance was introduced in the amount of \$325,000 for the alteration, enlargement and expansion of the existing municipal building, municipal garage and modernization of the Free Public Library.

One of the many features of the coming celebration here commemorating the 175th anniversary of the historic Battle of Springfield, will be the pageant to be staged on the campus of the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School on the evening of Thursday, June 23. The title of "A Miracle at Springfield," has been given the pageant and the response for places in the cast has been gratifying to those preparing this event.

"We still need more Springfield residents to portray Minute Men," said Ralph Feldman who is handling this phase of the celebration. "There are no lines to recite, nothing to do except stand where the stage director, Earl Lawit, places them and lend color to the show. There will be a narrator, who will speak all the lines. We need, at least, ten more Minute Men."

AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND AN ORDINANCE ENTITLED "AN ORDINANCE LIMITING AND RESTRICTING TO SPECIFIED DISTRICTS AND REGULATING THE USE OF BUILDINGS AND STRUCTURES ACCORDING TO THEIR CONSTRUCTION AND THE NATURE AND EXTENT OF THEIR USE AND THE NATURE AND EXTENT OF THE USE OF LAND IN THE TOWNSHIP OF SPRINGFIELD IN THE COUNTY OF UNION AND STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AND PROVIDING FOR THE ADMINISTRATION AND ENFORCEMENT OF THE PROVISIONS THEREIN CONTAINED AND FIXING PENALTIES FOR VIOLATION THEREOF," WHICH ORDINANCE IS ALSO KNOWN AS "THE ZONING ORDINANCE OF SPRINGFIELD, ADOPTED APRIL 13, 1955."

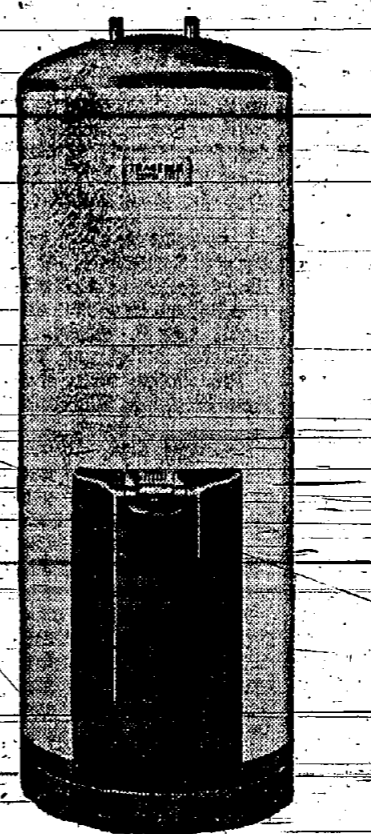


