way for those speeding through Springfield on their way to Summit and Morristown. Nor should the merchant lose business because of the no parking ordinance on Morris Avenue.

"There's nothing I could do as the lone member on the Township Committee," continued Mr. Bonadies, "against that powerful, well entrenched majority. Give me Keane and Weinberg, and we'll give Springfield a business-like administration without any unholy string pulling."

Invited to Trenton To prepare for the proper municipal legislation, Bonadies also released a letter yesterday in which he accepts an invitation to him from both Governor Robert B. Meyner and State Highway Commissioner Dwight R. G. Palmer to come to Trenton and discuss the matter of "resurfacing Route 24 (Morris Avenue) and the general traffic problems in Springfield." Bonadies says he plans to make the trip to Trenton in the next few days.

Following is Bonadies' letter to Highway Commissioner Palmer which not only calls for the lifting of the no-parking ban on Morris Avenue but also asks for immediate widening of Morris Avenue and the eventual construction of a bypass highway that should relieve traffic congestion on Morris Avenue:

Hon. Dwight R. G. Palmer, Commissioner State Highway Department Trenton, New Jersey

Dear Sir: I wish to acknowledge with thanks your kind invitation to meet with you in Trenton on the subject of Route 24 resurfacing through the Township of Springfield. It was also quite gratifying to have received a similar invitation from Governor Meyner who recently apprised me of his interest and your report to him on

this subject. Recent publicity dealing with the Highway Department budget and plans for 1956 has indicated your desire to deal with the proposed Route 24 by-pass as an entire project rather than make piecemeal effort at local solution to traffic problems. This is no doubt a wise and commendable decision, but Springfield, because of its unique geographic position, can no longer be a part of a long range program.

Immediate relief is imperative. As I outlined to you previously, our problem is not one really of resurfacing a main artery but one of diverting the through traffic of three counties directly and possibly six additional counties feeding the adjacent areas. This traffic has strangled and stymied our business to a point where it has begun to take on the appearance of a ghost town.

At the risk of repetition, I wish to reiterate my belief that immediate consideration should be given to the six points that were outlined in my letter of July 27th, namely:

1. Immediate widening of Morris Ave. by 3 and 1/2 feet on each side. Extending from the intersection of Meisel Ave. (Springfield Ave.) to the intersection of Millburn Ave. and Morris Ave. This will mean a three-lane traffic with the center lane reversible with peak traffic.
2. Resurfacing of the entire width of Morris Ave. as indicated in No. 1.
3. Lift all existing parking bans on Morris Ave. from intersection of Meisel Ave. and Morris Ave. to intersection of Millburn Ave. and Morris Ave.
4. Divert by a by-pass (new road) all traffic from Essex County coming up Springfield Ave. This by-pass to start at a point approximately where Maple Ave. meets Springfield Ave., and to travel parallel to Morris Ave. in a westerly direction to meet Morris Ave. approximately at the junction of Morristown Rd.

and Morris Ave. Traffic from Union can also be diverted through this new by-pass. Develop Summit Rd. as a by-pass from Route 22 to Route 24 easing Springfield's cross town traffic jams.

Join with Springfield in obtaining Federal funds to make possible the above program in the interest of National Defense and Civil Defense, since Morris Ave. and Route 22 are integral parts of our Civil Defense Highway Network.

In the near future, I shall be in contact with your office for an appointment, at which time, with your indulgence I should like to go into the above matter further. I sincerely trust that from this meeting will come at least information that will be transferred to my constituents giving them hope for a solution in the not-too distant future.

Sukkoth Holiday Is Observed Here

Last Friday night, the Jewish Community Center of Springfield, together with those of Jewish faith everywhere, began the observance of the eight day Festival of Tabernacles.

Known as Sukkoth in Hebrew, the holiday is a harvest festival. It derives the name Tabernacles from the custom of building a rustic hut or booth decorated with branches, fruits and vegetables, in honor of the observance. This hut or Sukkah is also associated with the temporary dwellings used by the ancient Hebrews in their encampments on their forty-year journey from Egypt to the Promised Land after the Exodus.

The members of the Center have erected a Sukkah which can be seen on the Center grounds. It was made large enough to accommodate all the children of the Religious School during the current observances.

Sukkoth is essentially the same as the American Thanksgiving in spirit and meaning. It is generally agreed that the Pilgrim Fathers, when instituting Thanksgiving, were guided by the influence of the Old Testament, where the original harvest festival of Tabernacles is described.

Following Sukkoth by one day is the holiday of SIMHAT TORAH. It means "rejoicing of the Law". It celebrates the fact that over the course of the year the Torah scrolls, containing the Five Books of Moses and read on Sabbath in the Synagogue, has been completed.

Not only does Simhat Torah mark the completion of the Torah reading, but it is the occasion for beginning the cycle of readings again for the coming year. During the observance the scrolls of which most synagogues have three or more, are carried in procession to the accompaniment of joyful singing by the congregation. The festivity of the occasion is based on the great love and reverence the Jewish people have for the Torah. It expresses their appreciation for the Divine Word and Moral Law which has become the inheritance of all Bible-reading peoples.

Simhat Torah will be observed

at the Jewish Community Center on Saturday night, October 8th, when a special service for children will be held at 7 p.m. There will also be a regular service on Sunday morning, October 9th, at 10 a.m., Rabbi Reuben R. Levine conducting.
