

The Republican organizaon in Springfield, retained its four to one majority on he Township Committee Tuesday by electing incumbent Frederick A. Handville and Raymond W. Forbes in very interesting and close contest, over Francis J. Keane and Irwin Weinberg. the two Democratic aspirants. Keane came close to taking one . of the places on the governing body, losing to Handville by only 83 votes in the entire Township

ote. With five of the districts re ported and only the third to bring n its figures. Keane was about 200 votes behind Handville. The Democratic_workers_saw_victory for Keane since the Third District had given them a margin of 295 votes last year and indications pointed to an even better majority this year. However, both Forbes and Handville ran very well in this supposedly heavy Democratic stronghold, Keane winning by only-

Forbes piled up a commanding lead with the report of early returns and held it all the way with Handville, his running mate, sticking very close. The Second, Fourth and Fifth Districts practically swamped the Democratic candidates but both Keane and Weinberg attracted many ballots in the First and Sixth.

Forbes was high man with 2088 which includes 5 absentee ballots with Handville second, polling 1972 with the same five absentee votes. Keane was right at the heels of Handville with 1889 which includes six-absentee-ballots-and-Weinher was fourth with 1725.







The SPRINGFIELD SUN joins in congratulating Ray mond W. Forbes and Frederick A. Handville as victors in Tuesday's rather acrimonious election to fill the two vacancies in the local governing body at the end of this year.

The addition of Forbes to the Township Committe will give Springfield the services of a man whose experience, as head of the Regional Board of Education and other civic causes, should help the Township Committee resolve a great many of the problems now facing our rapidly growing community. Handville, with his years of actual experience, is returning-to-the Township Committee to round out a well working four to one majority with Mayor Albert G. Binderand Township Committeeman Eugene F. Donnelly, as the other members of the Republican team. The result is a mandate from the electorate, from the





a disaffection being repeated often enough to qualify almost as a trend.

"It is not enough that the Republican County and State tickets have again carried. The towns are pulling away! And Florence P. Dwyer clears the high obstacle of being one candidate in a field of eight to attract greater-individual approval than her party's State Senator, with only a single opponent to share his vote.

"Such results should project no problems that the Republican leadership can miss noting. Normally Republican, Union County may not yet be of a mind to accept a Democratic ticket, save in the face of some particularly evident blunder, such as that one which sent Harrison A. Williams Ir. to-Congress.

"But, they have shown by the rising crescendo in their pproval of Mrs. Dwyer that more and more they are placing the accent on aggressive, single-minded representation-and Republican towns are slipping into Democratic brackets! Could a mandate be more obvious, or more pointed than that? "Even as the tellers were counting votes the electorate was stuffing Senator Hand's knapsack with marching-orders. The time for sweetness and light and the time for kissing or being kissed by babies is passed. The Senator is now-confronted-with the cold, exacting assignment of proving that his newly-discovered personality is an awakening of a fighting spirit rather than a convenient means of attracting votes. In his representation of Union County the Senator can lose to the unseen government of the State House cellar and beforgiven. But, it is unlikely that he will continue to be forgiven for failure to go down fighting; not to lose and stop fighting, mind, but go down "bloodied and unbowed."

"The days intervening between now and the next general election for State and County office can be a period of severe trial for the Republican party. There is an almost sure-fire sales-closer used especially insurance men which has become a cliche and goes about as follows: "May you never need it-but, if you need it, may you definitely have it."

This little observation was inspired by "another job well done" by the Springfield First Aid Squad members last week and their immediate response to the call of an emergency has added a great number of new friends to the already large list of boosters and supporters.
