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### Congratulations!

The SPRINGFIELD SUN joins in congratulating Raymond W. Forbes and Frederick A. Handville as victors in Tuesday's rather acrimonious election to fill the two vacancies in the local governing body at the end of this year.

The addition of Forbes to the Township Committee will give Springfield the services of a man whose experience, as head of the Regional Board of Education and other civic causes, should help the Township Committee resolve a great many of the problems now facing our rapidly growing community. Handville, with his years of actual experience, is returning to the Township Committee to round out a well working four to one majority with Mayor Albert G. Binder and Township Committeeman Eugene F. Donnelly, as the other members of the Republican team.

The result is a mandate from the electorate, from the people of Springfield and all residents should forget the momentum and bitterness of the campaign, and help the town officials tackle the many problems on the agenda for next year and the years to come.

However, it was no landslide victory for the two Republican candidates, and the splendid showing of the Democratic color bearers, Francis J. Keane and Irwin Weinberg, places Springfield in the category of a militant, two-party political community. Even as losers, these two men and their supporters are to be commended for the effort which fell short by very few votes but certainly not because of any lack of aggressiveness or the will to win.

Congratulations to the winners—from everybody!

The ELIZABETH DAILY JOURNAL published an editorial in yesterday's issue commenting on the election of Tuesday which makes very interesting reading. Under the heading of "Mene, Mene, Tekel, Upharsin," the editorial is as follows:

"As Elizabeth, Hillside, Linden, Rahway have gone, now goes Kenilworth and Roselle, and a woman dominates the political scene in Union County! For the first time in 23 years, Kenilworth has gone Democratic. For the first time in all the years of the borough's long, long history, Roselle has elected a Democrat to hold the office of Mayor. 'Mene, mene, Tekel, Upharsin.'"

When those four words appeared on the wall of his banquet hall, Belsazzar, son of Nabonidus and last crown prince of Babylon, called in Daniel to interpret their meaning. And Daniel told this Belsazzar "They mean—'He has counted, counted, weighed and they divide.' Will the Republicans pause after their first flush of victory now and seek an expert to interpret the 'handwriting' on their own wall? 'Save for a weak and slipping grip on the office of mayor, Elizabeth remains a preponderantly Democratic City. Linden is rock-ribbed Democratic, Hillside has tumbled out of the Elephant's hoodah, Rahway went over the hill a year ago. Now they have 'counted and counted' in Kenilworth and Roselle 'and they divide.' In a brief and warning word, through their dividing they have split away from the GOP in a disaffection being repeated often enough to qualify almost as a trend."

"It is not enough that the Republican County and State tickets have again carried. The towns are pulling away! And Florence P. Dwyer clears the high obstacle of being one candidate in a field of eight to attract greater individual approval than her party's State Senator, with only a single opponent to share his vote."

"Such results should project no problems that the Republican leadership can miss noting. Normally Republican, Union County may not yet be of a mind to accept a Democratic ticket, save in the face of some particularly evident blunder, such as that one which sent Harrison A. Williams Jr. to Congress."

"But, they have shown by the rising crescendo in their approval of Mrs. Dwyer that more and more they are placing the accent on aggressive, single-minded representation—and Republican towns are slipping into Democratic brackets! Could a mandate be more obvious, or more pointed than that?"

"Even as the tellers were counting votes the electorate was stuffing Senator Hand's knapsack with marching orders. The time for sweetness and light and the time for kissing or being kissed by babies is passed. The Senator is now confronted with the cold, exacting assignment of proving that his newly-discovered personality is an awakening of a fighting spirit rather than a convenient means of attracting votes. In his representation of Union County the Senator can lose to the unseen government of the State House cellar and be forgiven. But, it is unlikely that he will continue to be forgiven for failure to go down fighting; not to lose and stop fighting, mind, but go down 'bloodied and unbowed.'"

"The days intervening between now and the next general election for State and County office can be a period of severe trial for the Republican party. When Roselle falls by the wayside, no GOP traveller is safe, nor may any face the next election with complacency. This is 'handwriting' that calls for no interpretation by a Daniel. If the boy is father of the man, the town is father of the county—and the towns are slipping away."

There is an almost sure-fire sales-closer used especially by insurance men which has become a cliché and goes about as follows: "May you never need it—but, if you need it, may you definitely have it."

This little observation was inspired by "another job, well done" by the Springfield First Aid Squad members last week and their immediate response to the call of an emergency has added a great number of new friends to the already large list of boosters and supporters.

A signal went out to members of the First Aid Squad who were assigned to "stand by" orders on that particular morning. A hurried call went out to the other available members and the First Aid Squad and the ambulance were on their way.

So efficient, so willing, so helpful and so concerned were all the police and First Aid Squad members that the patient was soon in the hospital, in the hands of her doctor and is now on the road to recovery because of the capable work of these humane and merciful people.

The First Aid Squad and the Springfield Police Department have made some new friends. Even relatives of the couple, residing in nearby communities, are so appreciative of the quick response to the call for help that they intend to show greater interest in such humanitarian services in their own localities.

In order to display definite appreciation, the First Aid Squad has received a contribution from this couple. This incident spotlights the need for more financial support for the Springfield First Aid Squad. 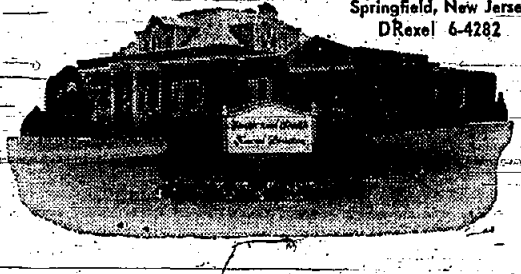

Climaxing a year of intensive study by the Election Laws Committee of the League of Women Voters of Springfield will be the unit meeting which is to be held on Wednesday, November 16 at 8:30 p.m. in the Springfield Public Library.

Mrs. Henry Wasung, chairman, and her Committee, have spent two years in research on the election laws of New Jersey and this past year has specialized on School Election Laws of New Jersey.

The meeting on November 16 will be devoted to a discussion of school election laws with special emphasis on Springfield school elections. A. B. Anderson, Secretary of the Springfield Board of Education, Mr. Frank Kerr and William Melick, Jr., Springfield members on the Board of Educa-

tion of Union County Regional High School and Mrs. Helen R. Smith, secretary of the same board, will be the featured speakers at the unit meeting.

A list of questions has been submitted to the speakers and each has been allotted 10 minutes to answer the topics. This will be followed by a question and answer period.

The main topic for discussion is "Explain procedures used by Springfield Board of Education from time candidate files until he is elected." The same topic will apply to the Regional Board Election.

### Tax Collections Ahead of 1954

Total collection of taxes in Springfield for the month of October amounted to \$129,816.26 as compared to \$165,029.16 for the same month in 1954 but the grand total for 1955 up to and including October showed an increase over last year.

In 1954 the total tax collection was \$1,175,055.09 while for this year the total for the same period was \$1,262,709.84. October collections also included \$106.67 of taxes due in 1954 which brought the total of last year's taxes collected in 1955 to \$35,222.46. Taxes due in 1953 in the amount of \$923.45 and \$37.73 for 1952 have been received this year.

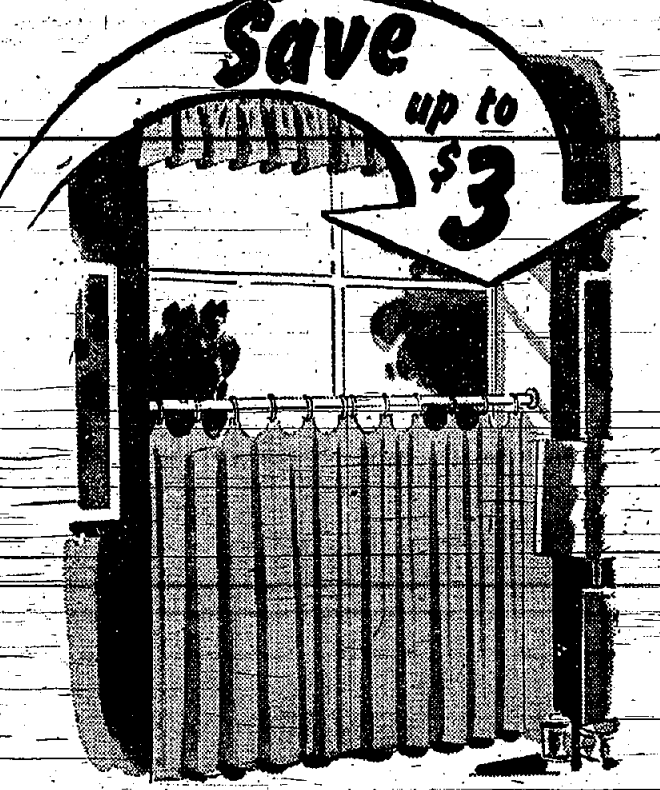

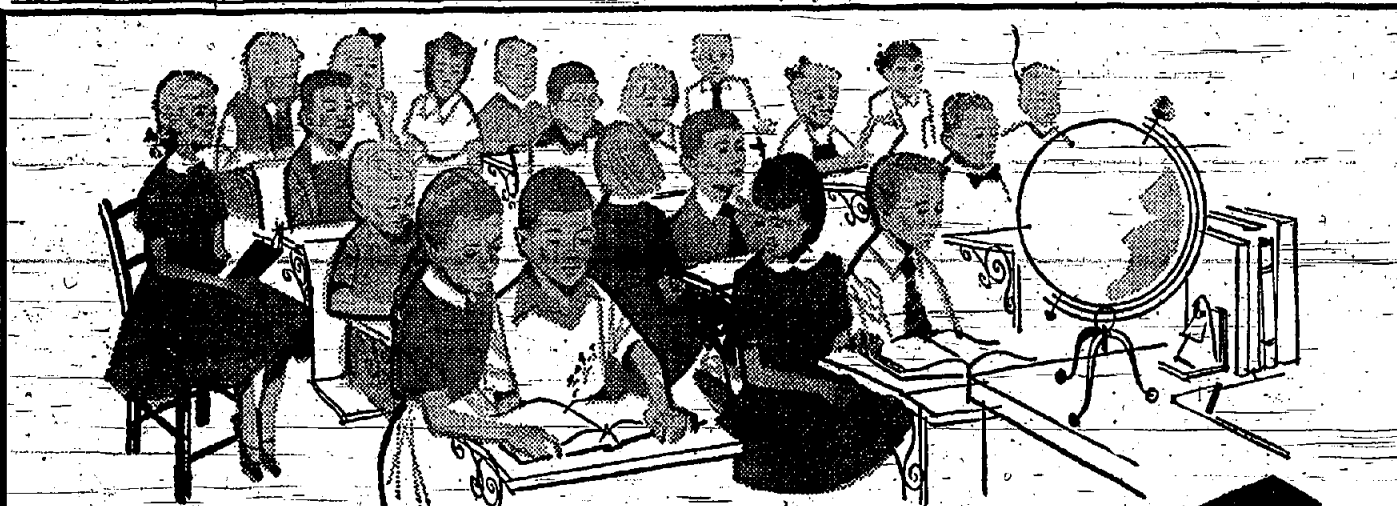

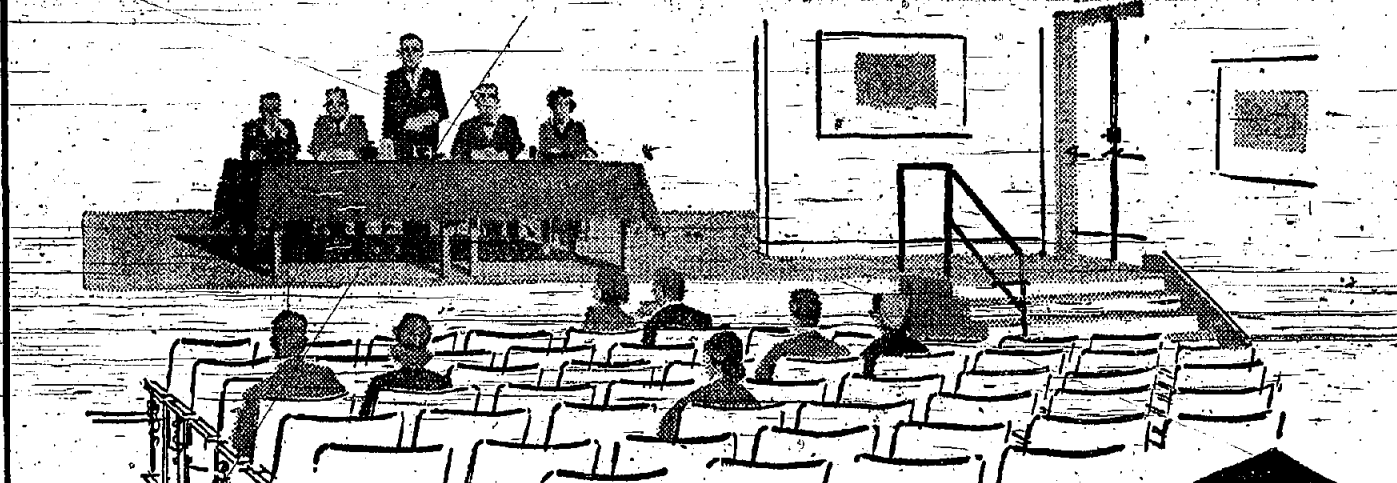

Must we believe our priests?

"I can subscribe to most Catholic beliefs," a Protestant gentleman recently remarked, "But I'll be darned if I'll believe them because some Catholic priest tells me I must!"

But religion! Haven't we soul freedom? Can we not believe as we like? Well, hardly. If we are thinking men we must believe in an intelligent, creative God. If we are Christians, we must believe in humanly inexplicable mysteries—a Trinity of a single Divinity—a Virgin Birth—a Man who was God—a Resurrection from the dead—an Ascension into Heaven. We could not discover these things for ourselves. We must believe on the say-so of some person or some book.

And so with the Catholic and his priests. The priest does not and cannot create religious truths, but he teaches them with the same God-given authority with which the Apostles taught—and converted the world 1900 years ago.

"Go ye, therefore, and teach all nations . . . teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you, and lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world. Amen" (Matt. 28:19-20, King James' Version).

And that is just what the Catholic priest has been doing for nearly twenty centuries—teaching all nations all things whatsoever Christ commanded; and so he will continue to do, with the promise of Christ being with him, even to the end of the world.

Must we believe our priests? We must! For us it would be unintelligent to do otherwise.
