RECIPE OF THE WEEK

Chocolate Party Cake
2 1/2 c. sifted cake flour
2 t. baking soda
1/2 t. salt
1/2 c. butter or margarine (1/4 lb.)
2 1/2 c. brown sugar, firmly packed (1 lb. box)
3 eggs
3 1-oz. sq. unsweetened chocolate
1/2 c. sour milk
2 t. vanilla extract
1 c. boiling water

Method:
1. Start oven at 375 F. or moderate. Grease bottoms and sides of three 8" cake pans and dust with flour. Sift cake flour and sift again with soda and salt.
2. Cream butter or margarine until soft. Add sugar a little at a time and cream until light. Add unbeaten eggs, one at a time.
3. Put chocolate in measuring

pan and melt over boiling water. When melted add to batter. Mix thoroughly.
5. Sift about 1/2 of flour into batter. Add 1/2 milk and mix, ending with flour. Mix in vanilla and boiling water.
6. Pour batter into greased pans. Bake 25-30 minutes.
7. When cool spread frosting.

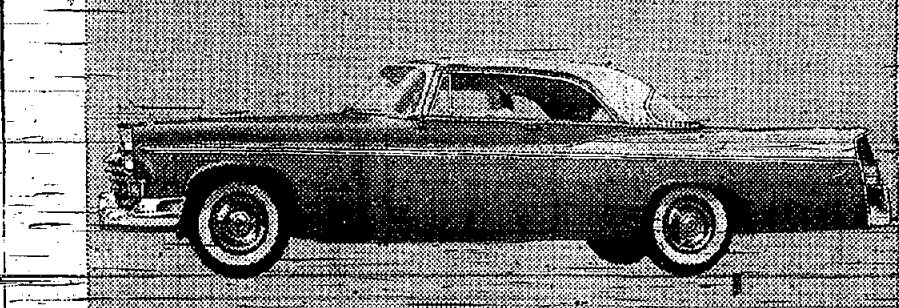

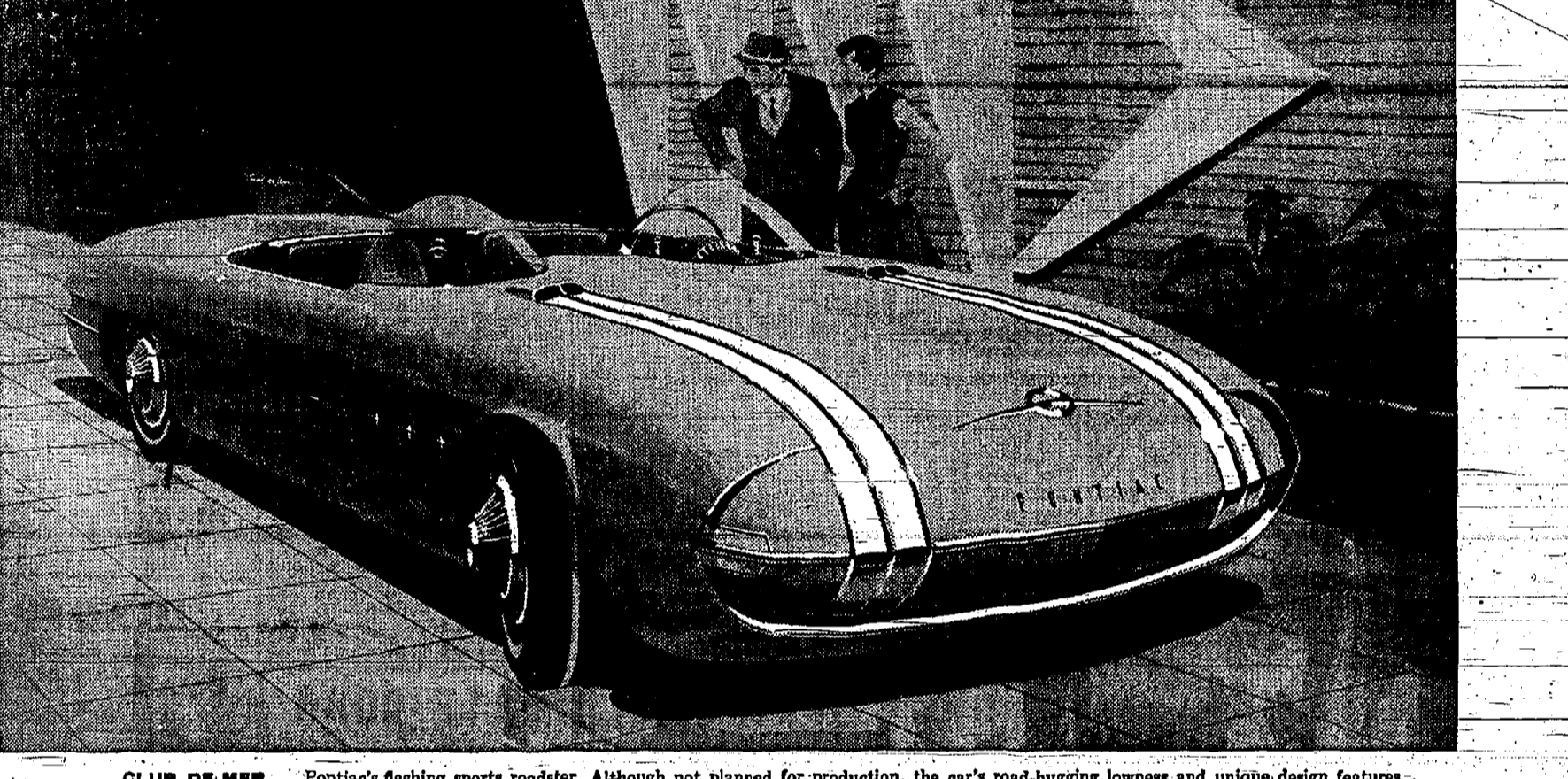

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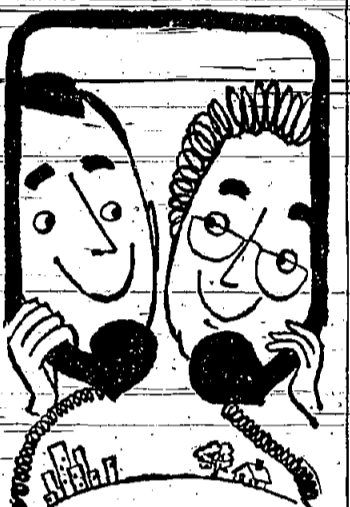
