After 31 years in business, during which time Springeld has grown into a thriving community, the First National Bank of Springfield is being sold to the National State Bank of Elizabeth.

Official approval of the offer to purchase the assets of the local bank is expected at a special meeting of the First_National_directors_and_shareholders_on_June_7_and after that, the business of the local bank will be conducted by the National State of Elizabeth.

Springfield's First National was ganized in 1925 with Dr. Watson B. Ferguson, Nicholas C. Schmidt Morris, who recently died, as Erwin L.
