





For here, at what will soon b the First Aid Squad's own building, has been installed a special Bell Telephone alarm system so outdoor dancing to follow. In case that as soon as the emergency is reported to the police, the alarm sounds and the squad members on duty make a rapid change from "construction workers" to "angels of mercy," drop their hammers and saws, and man their ambulance. Several


