


He probably doesn't look much like the man next door. He does his arithmetic with the aid of a centuries-old gadget called the abacus, and he writes the results in characters that would be quite undecipherable to you yet you probably have far more in common with him than you'd ever dream.

Allowing for the possibility that some hungry and easily-deceived saloonkeeper should sell liquor to an under-age customer that wouldn't eliminate the customer from punishment as 'is presently the case. Also, with the frosty fall weather coming on, such an ordinance would be bound to discourage the show-off who has to prove his virility by toting along a 'bottle' to a football game.

'Committeeman Bonadies may have supplied a good lead for various other well-intentioned communities which hadn't noted the short cut to less teenage drinking through the ordinance he has suggested. However, it won't be the perfect ordinance unless the Springfield committee can find some way to include a key which will open the door of the low order merchant who sells the teenager.
