

## **Officials Meet To Discuss New Highway Route**

No official word has come to Springfield from the New Jersey State Highway Commission regarding the pro-posed realignment of the new Route 22 but a conference with the Township Committee is expected to be set up within a few weeks.

A letter has been forwarded to Highway Commissioner Dwight R. G. Palmer requesting information on whether or not any new maps have been prepared showing the route to be taken by the new highway in going through Springfield. In anticipation of some action by the Highway Department very soon Henry Grabarz, Springfield Planning Board Chairman has called a special meeting of that board for tonight( Thursday, September 19) to discuss the part the Springfield would play in a Countywide Planning Board which would serve the many municipalities of the County in the same manner







"Father," the tremulous voice barely finds its way through you've promised to make it good in some way."

It happens every day\_in the confessional, that-balancing of the scales of justice: stolen goods returned, frauds adjusted, wrongs of every description put to right.

Has the penitent attacked the good name of a neighbor?- Hemust try his best to undo that harm. Is he in a situation which stenographer

taxes his morality to the breaking point? Does he find his stenographer a temptation? He must try to have her transferred to another department, or, find her another job some place. Is he falling in love with a married woman? He-must promise not to see her again, not even to think of her any longer, if that be possible.

The father-confessor is a man trained in the ways of phychology, not only through his books, but also through his constant experience with human nature. He knows how to size up the personality of the sinner, his strong points, morally, and his weak points. The answers to a few leading questions give nim a fairly good idea of the sinner's sincerity.

He carries a tremendous responsibility. It is his place to see that the sinner is really sorry. Otherwise, the words of for-giveness would have no effect. He must help the sinner work out a way of sloughing off his bad habits, of restoring lost or stolen goods, of repairing every malicious evil done by the sinner to his neighbor. He must reassure the broken-hearted penitent and give him fresh hope in the mercy of God; he must work through the crust of the smug, brittle soul, who may be convinced that he is already a saint (there are such people). If the annals of the confessional could be published, what a

story they would tell: of sinners reclaimed, of wolves turned to lambs, of alcoholics reformed of countless dangers to society averted. Thank God for the confessional!
