WHO IS RESPONSIBLE FOR SPUTNIK?

The Springfield Sun, under its present management, has never taken sides in a local election. We don't intend to do so ncw.

However, we deplore the use of the proposed new Federal Highway hysteria in the contest to be decided next Tuesday between Township Committeeman Vincent J. Bonadies, the incumbent, and Henry Grabarz, who seeks the office.

Our elections should be decided on the qualifications of the candidates, not because they belong to the same party as Dwight Eisenhower or Adlai Stevenson.

To introduce an issue like the Federal Highway program into the Springfield contest for Township Committee is like asking Morris Avenue Motors why Detroit put fins on the new Chryslers.

Bonadies, as a Democrat, is no more involved or responsible for the Federal-State highway program than any Springfield Republican official is involved with the State Department career man in Washington who has been dismissed from his official position because he accepted a Cadillac car from King Saud.

Whatever influence any member of Springfield's official family is able to exert through either the Democratic party or the Republican party on a State or Federal level, we feel confident that everyone will be equally vigorous in seeking to protect the best interests of all in Syringfield.

The money will come from ear-marked funds already appropriated by Congress, but the route-the actual pinpointed location of the new highway-will be a joint job between both the New Jersey State Department of Highways and the Federal government bureau. Trenton will not be able to have any highway constructed without the approval of every foot of the way by the Federal offices.

The whole relocation of Route 22-and the proposed spur to the Goethal's Bridge-should be taken out of local politics. The fight against any unnecessary "butchering" will be fought by both Republicans and Democrats in Springfield. It calls for the same kind of community cooperation as fighting the flood conditions in the Township or the speeding on the highways. It needs teamwork.

In the parlance of the prize ring, Springfield was cl-bbered and slammed to the floor for a long count last week when all the newspapers in Union County, including the Springfield Sun, published maps showing the proposed route of the new Federal Highway.

However, Springfield, recovering quickly from the knockdown, is now fighting back savagely and there is every reason to believe the final decision will not be so devastating.

As a matter of fact the hysteria has cooled off a bit. Home owners are already organizing protest groups-Township officials are planning to go to Washington-and the picture this week is not quite o Bonadies: so grim,
