

1,000 Trees To **Feel Bite Of Pruning Shears**

The Springfield Shade Tree Commission is currently tackling the job of pruning, clearing and removing over 1,000 trees along Springfield streets.

The work is being done by the Davey Tree Company and the Mountain Tree Company under the overall supervision of Shade Tree Commissioner Edward A. Cardinal. It is scheduled to be completed by Dec. 15, 1957.

Shade trees affected are those within 10 feet of the curb. Not only must they be pruned and treated for disease, but branches must be removed that are below 12 feet in height from the road surface and 8 feet in height from the sidewalks. Primary need for road clearance is to enable fire engines to move unobstructed

The Springfield Shade Tree Commission's investment in red, yellow, blue and white paint has caused much consternation among housewives here.







Mental retardation is a tremendous problem. Three per cent of all children born are mentally retarded to the extent that they can benefit little or none from regular school classes. The greater part of the monies collected remain in Union County and are adminis-tered as direct aid for retarded children within the county. Fifteen per cent of the total is 'sent to the National Assn. for Retarded Children to be used for research purposes. The great strides in research on retardation and the prevention of such misfortune are documented daily in newspapers and magazines.

Fund Drive Begun


The Union County Unit of the New Jersey Assn. for Retarded Children maintains the Nancy Lu zon Training School in Roselle with an annual enrolument of 35 children. 'This school serves the supplemental needs for the very young and for the older mentally retarded of the County, A rec reation program for 40 mentally retarded young adults is conducted monthly in Elizabeth under the direction of a paid leader. For six weeks during the sum mer the Unit operates Camp Star in the Rahway River Park in Rahway. 41 children had a period of recreation at the camp. The program consisted of a morning pa riod for arts and crafts, music and physical activities. The afternoon feature was swimming in the Rah-

way River Pool. There are approximately 500 Union County children in the six State Schools for the mentally retarded. Many of these children have long been forgotten by their marents or have become orphans. During the holiday seasons, especially Christmas, and Easter, the Unit obtains presents and candy gifts for the children and provides
