The Growth Pattern in New Jersey continues strong

What happened in New Jersey in 1957? Industry kept right on growing, commercial establishments kept on expanding, and residential areas continued to show a year of healthy growth. A vacuum cleaner manufacturer built another plant in the same town in which it had been operating. Many small firms merged with large nationally known companies. 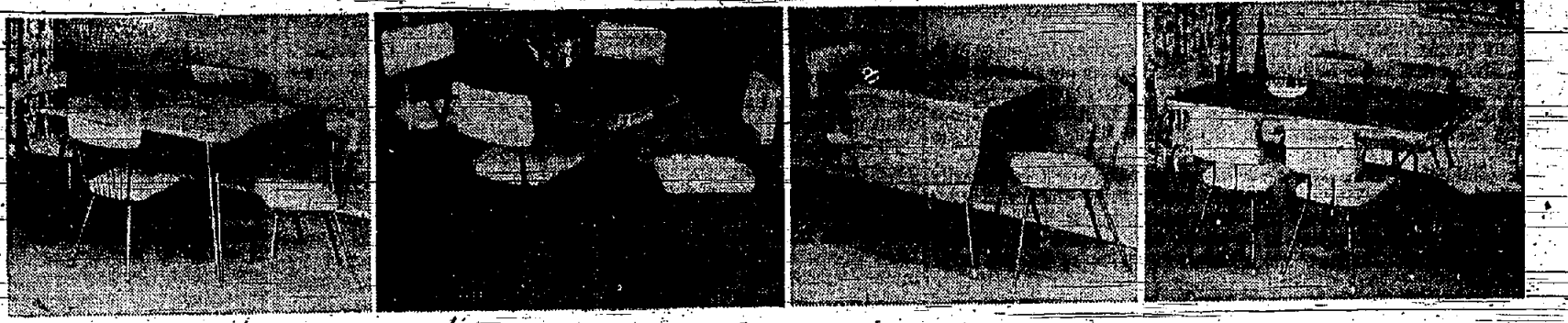

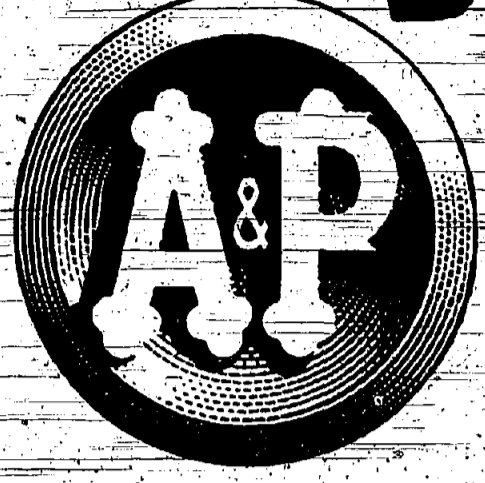

Realizing that program chairmen are often looking for helpful hints on program planning, the Union County Council of Parent-Teacher Associations offers the following Plan of Work for Program Chairmen:

A. Keep in Mind:

1. Programs are things which people do together.
2. The more members involved in thinking, planning, presenting, and evaluating, the more action will come.
3. The things your unit does between programs is the program, too.
4. Read the National and State publications—in them there is endless help.
5. The Program and action must fit your own group and area.

B. Selection of Committee:

1. Mothers and Fathers—At the elementary level there is a great tendency for mothers to do most of the work. Active efforts should be made to encourage fathers to assume a larger responsibility. Program planning meetings and some association meetings should be planned to enable them to participate.
2. Principals and Teachers—The principal or his representative should be given an opportunity to serve. They share in the interest of child welfare, should be a full partner in planning the program, can serve as resource people combining knowledge of child guidance and development with a knowledge of teachers' interests. The teachers should be given an opportunity to participate in routine preparation if they so desire.
3. Other Committee Members—Any chairman may be asked to serve, especially if the program deals with the subject of the chairmanship. Examples: Health, International Relations, Music, etc. The president is a member ex-officio.

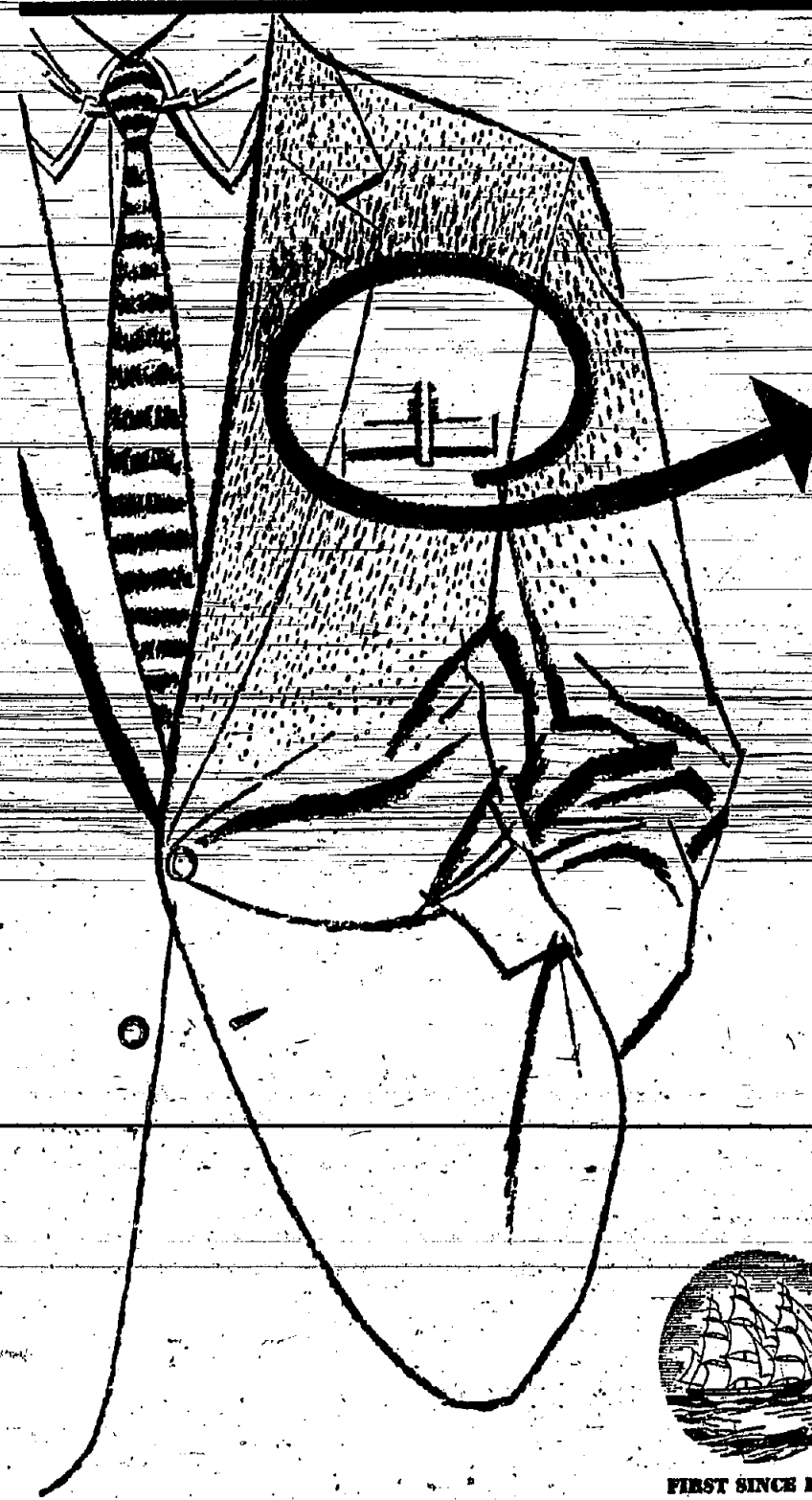

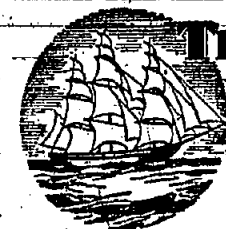

School Budget

(Continued from page 1) to anticipate what will be needed, there are times when unforeseen circumstances arise. When the budget for the school year 1957-58 was prepared, it was estimated, on the basis of figures available at the time, that enrollment for this year would be about 1,550. However, so many new students enrolled that this estimate has been greatly exceeded, and at the beginning of the term in September 1957, there were 1,707 students enrolled in our four schools. At the present time the total is 1753. As a result, although nine teachers were added to the staff, 24 out of a total of 65 classes already have from 30 to 38 pupils, and there are no funds available to secure more teachers for the current year. It is now anticipated that the enrollment for 1958-59 will reach 1,950. In this connection, in its December 26 issue, the Springfield Sun gave statistics on the rapid increase in the number of children attending school in Springfield. Since 1952 the total of children attending public and parochial schools has doubled, although school attendance throughout the county is up only about one-third for this period.

The increase of 400 students between last year's budget estimate for 1957-58 of 1,550 and the estimated figure for 1958-59 of 1,950 represents an increase of 26 per cent. The high enrollment is primarily due to building of new homes in the community, and it should be remembered that this building will result in increased rates. At the December meeting of the Board of Education a tentative budget was approved, totaling \$3,977,679.85, an increase of \$158,170 over the budget for the year 1957-58, or 19 per cent. The amount to be raised by taxation will be \$337,024.41. The difference represents anticipated state aid of \$108,122 and anticipated unexpended balances of \$32,533.44. A summary of the various items making up the budget follows, together with explanation of any material changes. The figures shown are estimates, not definite commitments. Actual expenditures are kept as much below the budget figures as possible and any balances remaining at the end of the year is used to reduce the amount to be raised by taxation the following year.
