

Charter Group Hits Action Of Police & Fire Depts

Call Present Rule "Severe Handicap"

This is the fifth article in the series providing information on the local government with specific reference to the Council-Manager Plan "E" on the local referendum by the Springfield Organization For Charter Study.

"The many men who staff the police and fire departments, both on a regular and volunteer basis, are a fine group giving every effort to properly serve our town. Because of the inadequacies of our present system of township government, they must operate under severe handicaps. The Charter Study Commission Report makes no specific reference or recommendation concerning our Police and Fire Department, nor is it legally entitled to do so.

"These large departments, serving two critical needs, suffer from the lack of coordinated administration. This is a direct result of the fact that the Chief of each department is responsible not only for the technical control of his department, but also held responsible for complete administrative control such as maintenance, purchasing, requisitions, clerical duties and personnel problems. This mass of administrative duties and details for which the Police and Fire Chiefs are responsible, deprive their staff of their full technical and professional guidance.

"Skilled professional administration, centralized in a trained manager as proposed under the Council-Manager Plan "E", would improve these administrative processes by relieving our Police and Fire Chiefs of these duties.

Dems Hit 'Move To Bayway' Remark At Home Meeting

Township Committee Candidates Howard A. Flammer and Daniel M. Lucy today sharply criticized their opponents' answer to Springfield's runaway tax problem—"if you don't like it, move to Bayway"—as the worst contempt for the people ever recorded by any candidates for public office.

"When our opponents can brazenly tell people concerned over climbing tax costs each year to move out of town, then we are all faced with a hopeless situation should the present ruling majority continue in office," Flammer and Lucy declared.

The remark, issued by Arthur Handville and Isaac Freedman, came at a discussion period last week at a Springfield home at which candidates from both sides were invited to discuss the issues.

Flammer and Lucy, a 3-1-1 strongly urged a three-plank platform to cope with halting Springfield's runaway tax costs, one of the highest in Union County.

Flammer and Lucy called specifically for immediate steps to provide an annual and complete tax report to the people enabling grass-root level budgeting information and encouraging programs involving huge expenditures, an end to give-away projects of taxpayers' monies such as the Shunkpa sewer, and controlled planning in cooperation with builders to take the accent off massive large scale development of private homes while more desirable ratables can be developed to pay for necessary municipal needs.

Do-Nothing 9 Years

"Handville's do-nothing nine years in office, like his answer to Springfield's tax problems is a failure of the people that we cannot afford any longer. He has threatened and served notice to continue his complete disregard of public opinion throughout the present campaign," Flammer and Lucy added.

"Not only with his answer on information and encouraging programs involving huge expenditures, an end to give-away projects of taxpayers' monies such as the Shunkpa sewer, and controlled planning in cooperation with builders to take the accent off massive large scale development of private homes while more desirable ratables can be developed to pay for necessary municipal needs.

GOP Leaders, Ignore Charter, Back Art & Ike

While Republican leaders in Springfield such as Mayor Albert G. Binder, Township Committee member Raymond Forbes and others are reported to be planning a campaign against adopting the Council-Manager form of government, they have united in supporting the two GOP candidates, Frederick A. Handville and Isaac Freedman, next month.

A joint statement by Mayor Binder and Township Committee member Eugene F. Donnelly, the three Republican members of the present governing body in control, was issued yesterday in which they announce that they endorse Handville for reelection and Ike Freedman who is running for the first time on the Republican ticket.

Freedman and Handville announced some time ago that they endorse the change in government for Springfield. Mayor Binder has already publicly announced that he is opposed to Council-Manager Plan and Mr. Forbes is expected to participate in a campaign against the adoption of the question. The difference of opinion on the question of the proposed change in the form of government has led to the question whether or not the Republican organization will be unified in the coming elections and this announcement of unqualified support for Freedman and Handville eliminate any split in the GOP as far as the local candidates are concerned.

Following is the statement issued:

"Republican Mayor Albert G. Binder, Republican Township Committee member Eugene F. Donnelly and Raymond M. Forbes have issued a joint statement endorsing the Republican candidates, Frederick A. Handville and Ike Freedman.

"The Mayor and his colleagues urge public support of Handville and Freedman on the basis of their outstanding qualifications as demonstrated by their governmental, business and civic accomplishments.

"The Mayor further stated that Republicans have made this a good town in which to live, and that such men as Handville and Freedman will insure the continuation of the progressive type of government Springfield has enjoyed since its inception as a Township. The tremendous surge in population in the past ten years is the best endorsement of how desirable Springfield is as a place in which to live.

GOP Candidates Defend 100 Yrs. of Republican Rule

"There is no need for a change of political leadership in Springfield. Republican administrations have given Township residents more than 100 years of good progressive government," Frederick "Art" Handville and Isaac "Ike" Freedman, Republican candidates for Township Committee asserted today.

Future Bleak As Week Shows No Improve'nt

Herman Spiesbach's parents are resigned to the possibility that after 18 years their son won't know them. The father and mother have been told that even if the boy regains consciousness it is likely that he won't recognize his own parents.

"We may be known to him only as far off voices he has heard while in the coma," the father said this week.

"Actually we still don't know how much damage has been done to the brain," the family's doctor reported yesterday. Dr. Gabriel Lull also said Wednesday that he was sorry to report no change in the boy's condition from last week.

Dr. Lull looked quite depressed.

He says there are just periodic flashes of some recognition. But the boy remains in a deep coma.

Spiesbach suffered a critical head injury when he fell from his bicycle on August 23 and has been unconscious ever since. Yesterday marked the 47th day he has been in a coma and under care by nurses around the clock at Overlook Hospital.

Kravetz Says Dems Hide Behind League's Skirts

Raymond R. Kravetz, Campaign Chairman for the Republican Candidates for Township Committee today charged that the Democrats did not really want to debate tax issues and other controversial problems in a public meeting, and chided them for hiding behind the skirts of The League of Women Voters.

Art Handville and Ike Freedman, the Republican candidates in furtherance of Kravetz's

their invitation to hold an open debate on the Campaign issues at a meeting scheduled for October 20th or 21st.

The Republicans charged that the Democrats were using the League of Women Voters candidates night on October 28th as a "dodge." "The Democrats knew well that the League has conducted this issue, as discussed at their meeting," Freedman and Handville asserted.

"Every issue that has been brought up by the Democratic candidates in this campaign was approved by the Democratic member of the Township Committee, Vincent J. Bonadies and since the records prove he had voted for the Shunpike sewer project and the Township re-evaluation program he should not allow his hand-picked candidates to use this campaign to question the honest sincere motives of the Republican Committee men," Handville and Freedman declared.

"Neither of the two Democratic candidates for Township Committee post ever appeared at a Township Committee meeting to protest either the sewer project or the tax evaluation program—until they had been selected by their party boss to be candidates. They never objected to the Township Committee that it had or was now proudly planning the future of Springfield. All these issues now being raised are just campaign gimmicks on their part to get votes," Handville and Freedman asserted.

Handville who has served as a member of the Township Committee for nine years said that his record as an administrator of his appointed duties and the record of efficiency and service of the police and fire departments which he heads is sufficient unto itself as a basis for his reelection this November.

Freedman whose civic record includes having been president of the Springfield Chamber of Commerce for two years as well as having served civic and charitable ventures during his long tenure as a resident and merchant in the community said "that if the Democrats really had the interests of the community at heart they would have graciously accepted our offer to have a public debate."

The text of a second telegram to Democrats from Republicans follows:

"Your veiled refusal of our offer to debate the issues as proposed in our telegram to you of the 4th again reveals the consistency with which you and your party have conducted all your previous campaigns. We repeat our offer to debate with you on the issues—sincerely in our belief that the people of Springfield are entitled to the truth, the one issue sadly lacking in your campaign."

"Your offer to debate at the League of Women's Voter meeting of October 28 is an unfair attempt on your part to evade the challenge presented by us since that meeting is one confined by them to the specific questions submitted by the League to all the candidates, including one requiring you to assert your stand on the proposed change in our present form of government, a stand we have already taken but one which you have consistently avoided—due to your lack of political courage and conviction, we

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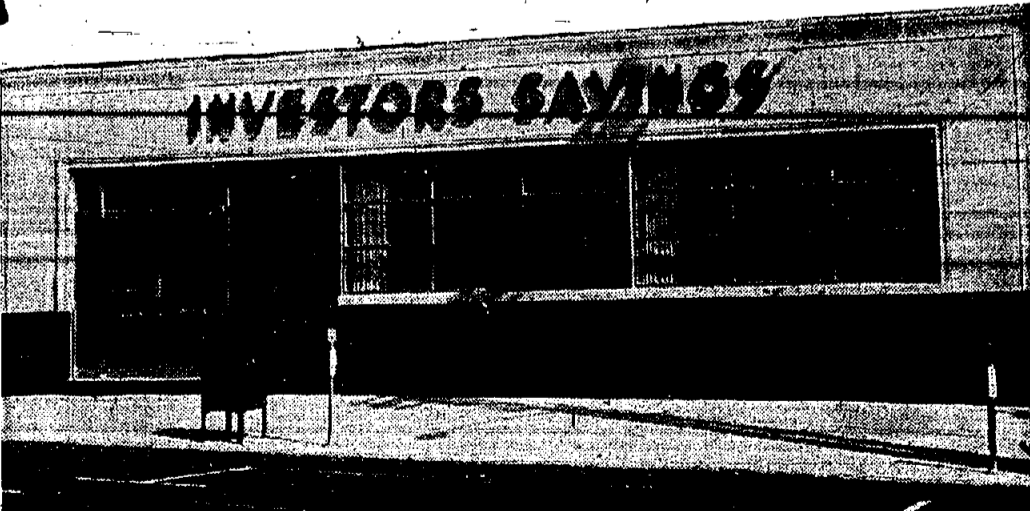

The Chiefs are subjected to the influence of the other committeemen as individuals, and the committee as a whole. In turn, the committeemen in charge of Public Safety is also subjected to the influence of his fellow committeemen and possibly his political party."
"Under the proposed Council-Manager Plan 'E', the committee members would retain their legislative function and provide policy for all departments of the town government. Administration, management and performance of the legislative policies, would be channeled through and carried out by the trained professional town manager in cooperation with the department heads on a non-political, full time, business-like basis."

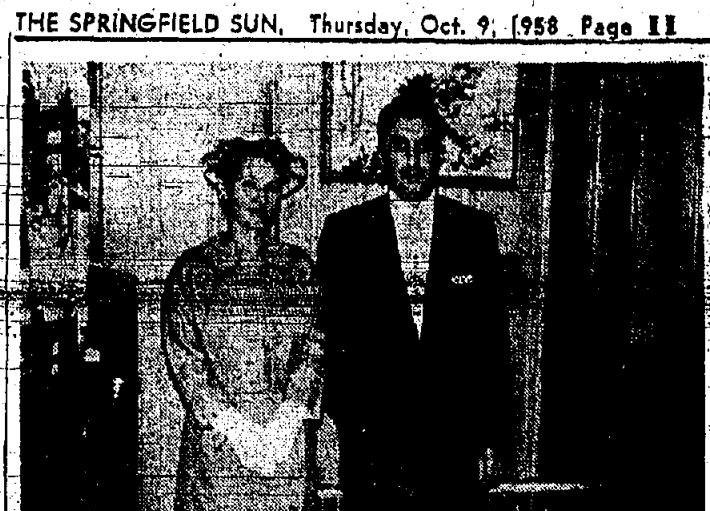
