This year, in local politics, will be known as the "New Faces of 1959.'

Last week the Republicans-announced that Paul H Beck and James M. Cawley, both newcomers to the political scene, would be their candidates for the two seats on the Township Committee.

Yesterday, the Democrats got off the launching pad by presenting William H. Balentine and Russell W. Sibole, both new faces, as their color bearers in this year's contest.

This is good for both political parties and Springfield. These four young men—and they are all young men since three of them are still in their thirties and one is only 42 will bring a new look to the political campaign itself and to the two vacancies on the Townsh p Committee.

Experience is important in conducting the affairs of a municipality. Men like Township Committeeman Eugene F. Donnelly and former Mayor Albert G. Binder have given the local administration many years of experience and guidance. But there's something about these young men who seem to take over no matter how confusing the situation may appear to newcomers. We're happy that these jobs are being thrown into the laps of our younger resi-

Next November should produce an interesting campaign. The Democrats believe they can sweep the Township clean by electing their two cand dates. The Republicans are already shouting that Messrs. Cawley and Beck will establish their beachhead for a full campaign to regain control in Springfield.

-A VERY THOUGHTFUL IDEA

Springfield's Ch ef of the Fire Department Ormond W. Mesker has made a public announcement which shows that fire-fighters think of things other than just extinguishing fires. The announcement is that emblems are now available to be placed on homes to indicate where there is an hational Even invalid or a person living there that could not aid themselves in time of an emergency.

Chief Mesker pointed out these markers would prove valuable when fire equipment rolls up to a house where such an emblem is displayed. Faster rescues will be possible when our firemen spot these attractive emblems which are made of fluorescent paint so that they may be seen at night when a spotlight is turned on them.

Persons interested'in obtaining these markers should contact fire headquarters. A fire officer will then call at the home and place the emblem on the entrance and rear door-and-on the door and window of the incapacitated person's room. There is no charge for this service.
