

to existing Route 22. This fact and all the others have been thoroughly looked into and appraised by not only the Department and the local office of the U.S. Bureau of Public Roads, but also by Bureau of Public Roads Officials from Washington. Care has been taken in eaching these decisions.

The facts have been developed by experts in this field and traffic equirements have been determined by traffic engineers both State and Federal Government. This makes it just a little difficult to understand how persons not trained in the traffic field can determine that widening Route 22 to four lanes in each direction will suffice until-1975 or 1980.

planation for so much attention in one week to the needs of our older people. Consider these facts, for instance. Within 10 years the number of Americans over 65 years old will reach 10 percent of the total population. During that same

period of time, the key productive age-group-those from 20 to 65 years, from whom almost all the working force is drawn-will be reduced to only one-half our popu-This represents an inlation.
