

Local Baha'is Will Be Hosts Of Convent'n

The Baha'is of Springfield will play host this Sunday, December 6, to the Baha'i State Convention at the Edward Walton School. One hundred or more representatives from the state of New Jersey are expected to attend.

The purpose of the convention, Joseph loas said, is to elect delegates to the national convention to be held in April at the Baha'i House of-Worship in Wilmette, Illinois, a north shore suburb of Chicago.

The theme of the convention will be the completion of the remaining tasks of the ten year World Crusade, initiated by the Baha'is in 1953, with emphasis on the goals in the United States still to be achieved. The world goal is the establishment of the Universal House of Jus tice in 1963, which is dependent upon all the lesser goals of the Crusade, Mr. Ioas stated.

"In no way is the Universal House of Justice dependent upon the adoption of the Baha'i Faith by the mass of peoples of the world, nor does it presuppose its acceptance by the majority of the inhabitants of any one coun try." he asserted.

The Baha'i faith is now established in over 255 countries and territories of the world, Springfield is one of some 1500 centers in the United States.

The standards that a hospital must meet to pass muster are of the highest-all directly aimed for the better protection of hospital patients. The_joint commission places

great stress on the keeping of medical records. In this way a complete report of every patient-case hitosry, statistics, Jaboratory results, diagnosis and final summary-is filed for fuure reference and research.


The medical staff has other rules to-live -up to. Constant analysis and review of clinical work done in the hospital is always under review. There is compulsory consultation in certain types of operations-major surgery of questionable risk, for instance, or operations with obscure diagnosis, sterilization cases, first Caesarians and all curettages where a known or suspected pregnancy could be interrupted.

Twenty to 25 per cent of hospital deaths must be autopsied as diagnostic checks. Another aspect of medical staff re sponsibility_is the complete investigation of the medical abilily and professional qualifica. tions of all affiliated physicians,

The joint commission requires that the governing body, in this case the hospital's board of trustees, meet certain standards also. Here is vested the legal and moral responsibility for the conduct of the hospital as an institution, directly answering to the patient, communiy and sponsoring organization. Committees must adhere to certain structure, keep accurate minutes,
