Local Baha'is Will Be Hosts Of Convent'n

The Baha'is of Springfield will play host this Sunday, December 6, to the Baha'i State Convention at the Edward Walton School. One hundred or more representatives from the state of New Jersey are expected to attend.

The purpose of the convention, Joseph Ioas said, is to elect delegates to the national convention to be held in April at the Baha'i House of Worship in Wilmette, Illinois, a north shore suburb of Chicago.

The theme of the convention will be the completion of the remaining tasks of the ten year World Crusade, initiated by the Baha'is in 1953, with emphasis on the goals in the United States still to be achieved. The world goal is the establishment of the Universal House of Justice in 1963, which is dependent upon all the lesser goals of the Crusade, Mr. Ioas stated.

"In no way is the Universal House of Justice dependent upon the adoption of the Baha'i Faith by the mass of peoples of the world, nor does it presuppose its acceptance by the majority of the inhabitants of any one country," he asserted.

The Baha'i faith is now established in over 255 countries and territories of the world. Springfield is one of some 1500 centers in the United States.

Prior to the convention, on December 5, William DeForge, a well-known lecturer from Hackensack, will speak at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Ioas, 141 Salter St., Springfield. The meeting will start at 8:15 p.m. Mr. DeForge has traveled throughout South America representing the Baha'i Faith. He will explain the teachings of Baha'u'llah, the prophet of the Faith.

Mr. Ioas said that any Springfield resident wishing to attend this public meeting will be cordially welcome. For further information call Drexel 9-5093.

School Board Lets Town Inspect Building Plans

The romance is on again. Springfield's Board of Education and the Township authorities are going "steadily again." The new township began after a history making meeting held last Monday, November 23.

The meeting was "history making" because it was the first time the members of the Board of Education invited the Township authorities to "sit down and examine plans for the new school."

The meeting, held in the Board of Education offices in the Caldwell School, was attended by Howard S. Smith, president of the Board of Education; School Superintendent Benjamin F. Newsinger, School Board Secretary A. E. Anderson and School Maintenance Superintendent William Wagner. Building Inspector Wilbert J. Binder and Fire Chief Ormond Mesker appeared for the Township governing body.

There was a very interesting exchange of ideas, and several recommendations were suggested by Building Inspector Binder and Fire Chief Mesker. The meeting ended with a set of plans being given to Binder and Mesker for their study.

Unique History Course Offered At Regional

By F. KULAWIEC — Some highly interesting and commendable goings-on have been uncovered by this writer in the social studies field at Dayton Regional High School. It may not be generally known but the fact is, those students who elect F.A.C. in their freshman year are choosing a course which is probably offered only at Regional High School of all the high schools in the nation.

Entitled "Foundations of American Culture," this course is the pet project and invention of Miss Pauline Keith, chairman of the department, and teacher at Dayton Regional for the past 14 years. Miss Keith, after much thought and some discontent over the arrangement of the history curriculum on the freshman level a few years ago, mapped out a course, which she felt would serve as an initial course in the social studies offerings of the school. The intention of the course then was to present to the freshman student important aspects of various world cultures such as political thought, social mores, art, literature, and philosophy as influencing the development of our own American culture.

Captain Joyner has seen 27 years service with the Springfield department and both Lieutenant Pinkava and Sergeant Quinton have earned their promotions with excellent performances since joining the local police force.

Springfield Will Be At County Mayors Meeting To Discuss Route 22 Plan

Proposals to improve the existing Rt. 22 under the Federal highway building program will be discussed by Union County mayors at a December 10 meeting in New Providence Borough Hall.

Mayor Samuel Jones of New Providence, chairman of an informal committee of municipal heads, has scheduled the meeting for the purpose of hearing the ideas advanced earlier this month by Leonard Best who seeks to study the feasibility of the proposed Rt. 78 plan. Best suggested in a letter to Union County mayors the possibility of widening Rt. 22 in conjunction with the federal highway assistance program.

Major Vincent J. Bonadies said that he has received his invitation to attend the conference. The mayor stated that he would be present at the meeting. "I am in complete accord with Best's plan," the mayor remarked, "and I would like to see something done about the situation on Rt. 22."

Best's proposal advocates improvements of Rt. 22 in light of the fact that the State has indicated that action on R. 78 has been proposed for several years. Bes, president of the Richard Best Pencil Co. of Springfield, claimed that the postponement of action on improvement of Rt. 22 is "indefensible." He suggests that the problem should be approached "boldly" so that the project could qualify for a substantial amount of (Continued on Page 2)

Action in Washington, is well developed on the Springfield new Highway Petitions. Approximately 50% of the voters or roughly 4,000 Springfield voters, signed petitions last year asking that a study be made to revitalize the present Route No. 22 before huge expenditures and great property damage evolved by construction of a new Route No. 22 (Now called Route No. 78) through town.

The latter was accomplished by a township solicitation of voters' signatures headed by the Twin Brooks Civic Association in cooperation with interested citizens and other local (Continued on Page 2)

Vocational School Plans Move Ahead

Plans for the proposed county vocational high school continue to move ahead despite the opposition of school boards in the regional school district.

Due to be named within days is a superintendent for the vocational system. Applicants for the job have been narrowed to four from an original total of 40.

The board will soon begin a study of a recently conducted survey of school needs for county pupils. Fortunately for protesting boards, the cost of the survey was borne by the federal government.

The survey was carried out with the help of the Union County Council of PTAs; Franklin Connolly of Elizabeth, state supervisor of occupational information and guidance, worked during the past three months to help set up and carry out the survey.

Board members defend the need for the new school on the basis that with the national economy reaching new peaks annually, the demand for skilled workers becomes more acute every year.

Crestmont Insured By Federal S&L Corporation

Savers in Crestmont Savings and Loan Association may be assured of the safety of their money, according to Loren F. Gardiner, president.

This statement of assurance has been made by Crestmont's top executive in view of the investigation being made by New York State's Attorney General, Louis Lefkowitz, of fraudulent practices against eight savings and loan associations located in other parts of the country.

Savings accounts of the members of Crestmont have been insured for safety up to \$10,000 each since Nov. 21, 1959 by the Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corporation, a permanent instrumentality of the United States government. The corporation was set up by Congress in 1934 to protect savings of members of insured savings and loan associations.

The possibility of fraud in out of state associations, Mr. Gardiner, reported, points up the desirability of dealing with local financial institutions which has been realized for many years by those already taking advantage of the services and facilities offered.

The security of savings extends to all local insured savers. Mr. Gardiner said, referring to a statement made by the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance, Charles R. Howell, who emphasized the point that "no New Jersey association was in any way involved in this matter.

 90/10 federal aid.
 "The Springfield Industrialist cited several factors in his proposals that he claimed rendered the Rt. 78 plan disadvantageous. He said that the proposed road "cuts through good residential areas, and that it fails to provide access to towns such as Plainfield, Scotch Plains, Westfield and Cranford."
 Best also maintained that the tentative plans do not call for servicing the Hillside and Elizabeth areas unless a planned Goethals Bridge spur is built, he pointed out that the Highway Department is on record that this is not contemplated in the foreseeable future.
 He also criticized the cost, \$300 million, and he said that the Rt. 78 plans are vague on handling traffic from the Garden-State Parkway in Union.
 This week, Best said that Rt. 78 would require the construction of several million dollars worth of access roads at county expense. He maintains that Rt. 22 already has the needed feeder roads.
 His plan for improving Rt. 22 calls for widening it to eight lanes from Newark Airport through Hillside. In Union, approaching the Garden State Parkway, it would become five or six lanes in each direction, with the center lanes elevated and carried over the Parkway. Traffic to Vauxhall road and

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GETTING THE MOST FROM YOUR GARDEN

We had our first taste of winter recently, but fortunately it didn't last long enough for the frost to penetrate deeply. However, we may not be so lucky next time and should be prepared.

Roses should be first on our mind, and if you have no roses you may miss one of our loveliest shrubs. Remember to plant at least half a dozen, or more this fall, or early next spring.

Q. Shall I cut my roses back now or in the spring?

A. Cut them back now. This will eliminate the chance of splitting, and will get rid of considerable debris. Don't cut them back all the way, however, but reduce the growth one third to one half to reduce chance of storm damage. Regular pruning is then done next March or early April, as soon as the danger of freezing is past.

Q. Is it necessary to prune climbing roses as well as hybrid tea roses?

A. Everblooming climbers should be lightly pruned at this time. Cut back the main canes lightly, if needed, but all laterals should be cut back to two or three buds. Old canes that

have produced for several years should be removed one or two each year to be replaced with vigorous new canes. Remove all surplus new shoots before they rob the plant of much needed strength. Spring blooming climbers that bloom only once should not be pruned until the plant has bloomed next spring.

Q. How much should I prune my tea roses?

A. The rule is: 1. The weaker the bush the harder the pruning. 2. Prune severely to get few large flowers and prune lightly to get masses of small flowers. Generally speaking you can leave three to five strong canes and cut them back to two or three dormant buds. Some of the newer varieties will produce flowers on much larger plants, and need not be pruned so severely.

Q. How shall I select the proper buds to leave on my roses?

A. If your roses grow stiffly upright, prune to outside buds which will tend to spread the new growth laterally. If the bush is already too wide just prune to an inside bud and next

season the bush will assume a more upright shape. Use the latter method where the rose bushes are crowded together.

Q. What should I mulch, and how do I do it?

A. After the first year most roses are hardy enough to survive average winters, but to be on the safe side it is wise to mulch them with a loose soil to a height of 8 to 10 inches. Mulching will prevent the lower branches from freezing during sub-zero temperatures, and when this is removed the following spring the buds will be fresh and green to get a good start as soon as warm weather sets in. Do not use a mulch that retains moisture and remains wet and soggy, or it may do more harm than the cold.

Strictly speaking, the word "mulch" doesn't refer to the size of a fist, but to members of the carp family only. There's no such thing, for instance, as a trout mulch.

Your Library

"How is Christmas celebrated in...?" is a question which reappears each December in most libraries. For several years the Springfield Library has been seeking and buying books on Christmas customs just to answer this question. By this time it has acquired some very good books to add to the rest of its varied collection of Christmas stories, plays and carols.

Three of the best books on Christmas customs are being held in the Library beside the desk of the reference librarian. CHRISTMAS—CUSTOMS AROUND THE WORLD by Herbert H. Wernecke has a wealth of material. It divides the world into sections: Europe, South America, Africa, United States, and Canada, and so on. CHRISTMAS AND ITS CUSTOMS by Christina Hale has chapters on the various types of Christmas customs such as "Fire and Light," "Gifts and Greetings," "Carols," "Christ-

mas Legends and Superstitions." The third book on special reserve is CHRISTMAS IDEALS for 1955 which has a section on the way Christmas is celebrated in many countries like Holland, Mexico, Syria and others.

Besides these books which are being held to answer questions are five number of the annual publication called CHRISTMAS, all of which are filled with materials about Christmas including customs, carols, stories, poems and pictures for various ages.

Five books about Christmas customs which may be borrowed for 7 days are THE CHRISTMAS BOOK by F. X. Weiser; ALL ABOUT CHRISTMAS by M. H. Keyth; FIFTY YEARS OF CHRISTMAS by R. M. Elmquist; CHRISTMAS TRADITIONS by W. M. Auld; and THE SOUTHERN CHRISTMAS BOOKS by H. T. Kane.

While the school children are engaged in learning about how Christmas is celebrated, their mothers are planning for celebrating Christmas here and

now. A comprehensive book called COMPLETE CHRISTMAS BOOK has suggestions for preparing gifts, decorations and entertainments. Another of this type is CHRISTMAS IDEA BOOK. CHRISTMAS MAKE-IT-BOOK has patterns and designs for making decorations. Two other books which will help are A HANDBOOK OF CHRISTMAS DECORATION, and A TREASURY OF CHRISTMAS DECORATIONS. CHRISTMAS LIGHTING AND DECORATION FOR HOME INDOORS: OUTDOORS has suggestions of interest to the man of the house.

Furthermore for the women responsible for Christmas preparations are the group of books which include (1) HOLIDAY CANDY AND COOKIE COOK BOOK (2) GIFTS FROM YOUR KITCHEN (3) THE HOLIDAY CANDY BOOK and (4) WIFE SAVER'S CANDY RECIPES.

In the library they will find books of Christmas carols, Christmas plays, stories, and poems.

All of these types of books about Christmas have been collected and placed in the main hallway of the Springfield Library, so that they will be convenient for people who use them. All of these materials with the exception of the three titles first mentioned may be borrowed for home use.

Mr. Norman Gierman, School Education Chairman for the Springfield Gaudineer PTA was in charge of the Classroom Visitation which was the feature of the general meeting on Monday, November 23rd. More than six hundred fifty parents went "back to school" where they followed the daily schedule of their children, heard the teachers explain the curriculum, and saw the displays of classroom projects.

The Classroom Visitation was preceded by a brief business meeting, during which the parents were urged to help support the plans for the expansion of the facilities at Trilside Museum. Pamphlets, which were distributed, explained that the expanded program will encompass vital and basic sciences of astronomy, navigation, meteorology, telescope construction, chemistry, electricity, physics,

atomic energy, etc. The Union County Park Commission has agreed to operate and maintain the new facilities with the Trilside Museum Association and the Union County Board of Education. All Union County residents are being asked to contribute funds to help provide such scientific advantages for Union County's young people.

Headquarters are in Westfield. Mrs. Frank Jakobsen, president, presided.

Mrs. Victor Bracht outlined the next general meeting program for January 25th. A Community Workshop, The PTA, Dr. J. E. Jan Tausch, Springfield School Psychologist, will be in charge.

The Attendance Banner for November was won by Miss Miller's Seventh Grade.

Mrs. Spencer Cannon, Room Representatives Chairman, has been in charge of a survey by parents to determine the representatives of the Eighth Grade in the proposed Union County Vocational-Technical School.

The purpose of such a school is to prepare people for useful employment. In addition to providing a general high school education, it prepares students to enter chosen occupations. All students in vocational and technical courses must meet the intelligence, aptitude, and physical requirements necessary for employment in the occupation for which the instruction is offered.

Graduates of such schools are assisted in job placement. Attendance will be free to Union County residents, and transportation will be provided by the Board of Education of the district in which the students reside, when necessary. A similar survey is being made among the parents and students of tenth graders.

Mrs. John Brownie and Mrs. Frank Jakobsen represented the Gaudineer PTA at the Annual State Convention in Atlantic City on November 18th, 19th, 20th. Over 3000 delegates, representing 1349 New Jersey PTA Units, attended sessions at the Conventioneon Hall and the Traymore Hotel.

Reform Jewish Conclave Discusses Social Issues

Charles Danziger, president of Sherey Shalom Suburban Reform Congregation, Springfield, reported on his attendance last week at the 45th General Assembly of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations in Miami.

This was the most inspiring experience of "my life," Mr. Danziger said. "Nearly 3,000 delegates assembled for prayer and discussion under the guidance of the greatest rabbis, teachers and dedicated lay leaders in the dynamic movement of Reform Judaism. I sincerely believe God was there too."

Meeting in plenary session, the convention approved resolutions:

- Expressing dismay over organized opposition to a political aspirant solely because he is of Roman Catholic faith. Reform Judaism opposes all religious bigotry.
- Calling for equal housing opportunities for all people, and the elimination of discrimination in public and private housing.
- In favor of making birth control information and assistance available to all who seek it.
- Objecting to laws in certain states which violate the constitutional principle of separation of church and state.

One of the workshops Mr. Danziger attended was entitled "Interreligious Relationships—Conflict and Cooperation." A Catholic priest shared the platform with Jewish and Protestant educators to discuss this issue. Mr. Danziger noted that "despite deep doctrinal differences among the faiths, which cannot and should not be ignored, various religious groups can work together for common civic goals. The urgency of today's social issues demands cooperation of the three major faiths, with free exchanges and regular communication." Dr. Leo Pfeiffer expressed the need for a widespread process of "dialogue," of understanding the position of other groups, of sitting down together to discuss the differences in a spirit of respect for differences.

Father Twomey of Loyola University suggested that "we would have fewer differences if we all lived up to our religious obligations and moral commitments."

"New Frontiers for Reform Judaism" was the theme of the convention—frontiers within personal beliefs, in congregational life, and in our social order. The underlying note of the entire conclave was that "Reform Jews must be informed Jews."

On this note, Mr. Danziger said, "I intend to strongly urge expansion of our present program of adult education and youth activities. Understanding Jews will be understandable Jews, making us better citizens in a better community."



House Plants Easily Killed By Kindness

More house plants are killed by overwatering or improper fertilizing than by neglect. Too much water makes roots rot and fertilizer applied too generously burns them.

That's the word from Donald B. Lacey, Rutgers home grounds specialist who is also a reliable source of information about window gardening.

Give plants just enough water to keep them moist, but not wet, in his advice. Plants in sunny windows near radiators or in hot, dry rooms may have to be watered daily. Foliage plants in planters or in dim corners of the room may need water only once a week.

Plants in plastic pots or ceramic containers need special watering care. Soil in such containers will not dry out nearly as quickly as in a clay pot, nor can the water drain out as readily.

Stick a toothpick into the soil if it comes out clean, the plants are ready for water.

Why not try "double potting"? Keep plants from drying out in a warm room? Put the plant in its clay pot into a container 2 or 3 inches larger in diameter.

Put pebbles in the bottom for drainage and fill the space between the pots with peat moss. Water the soil in the pot just enough to keep it moist and moisten the moss occasionally.

House plants will need very little fertilizer between now and early March. Short days and low intensity slow down growth during the winter.

Homegrown Holly Is the Berries For Yule Decor

Home grown holly for the holidays. That's the happy prospect in many homes for this Christmas.

The American holly, which used to thrive only in the southern States and along the East coast to Massachusetts, now grows well in many northerly locations. Thanks to nurserymen, such hardy hollies as beautiful, Merry Christmas, Carol, old hollyberry, cheerful others with equally delightful names are available for home grounds plantings.

For those who want to get on the holly bandwagon, J. M. McNeese, field representative of the Davey Tree Expert Co., urges them to plant both male and female trees. That's because the holly is dioecious, meaning male and female blossoms sprout on separate trees. Plantings in the ratio of about one male to five of the others should work out well. Without the attractive red berries, the Yuletide appeal of the greenery is dulled.

Even away from their native habitats, hollies require only moderate protection. However, you'll probably be doing this in an eastern exposure.

The Springfield Board of Education was criticized in a letter from the local Continental Post No. 228, American Legion, protesting the Board's policy of keeping our schools open November 11... instead of honoring their war heroes on Veterans' Day.

The Legion Post letter, submitted under date of November 30, calls this a "shameful and flagrant display of bad taste" and "hopes it will never again be repeated in Springfield."

The Legion, it is understood, has also sent a letter to the

Springfield Board of Education protesting against having the schools in session on Veterans' Day.

Following is the complete letter:

Editor, Sun:

On November 22, 1959, a letter was sent by our organization to the Springfield Board of Education. In it we expressed our deep disappointment in them for not proceeding in accordance with American tradition which expects and requires all Americans to honor their war heroes on "Veterans' Day."

We protest their policy of keeping our schools open on November 11 thereby showing neither the regard or respect

It seems most unliking for our public schools (teachers of courtesy and respect) to show no recognition whatsoever to a day particularly designated for observance because of its deep significance to us all.

If such is to be the case is it not rather pointless to honor Lincoln or Washington because of their places in American history if in the same breath we choose to ignore the millions whose efforts made possible the very continuation of American history?

We sincerely hope that this shameful and flagrant display of bad taste will never again be repeated in Springfield and with beer cans; we should help make this community better by not letting our children develop the language they use. It is alright to let them watch 77 Sunset Strip, but don't let them start calling you "chick" or maybe "Daddio."

Accreditation

For Overlook

What does it mean for a hospital to be "accredited?" Overlook Hospital can tell you because it has just received approval by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Hospitals for a three-year period. Imagine opening your home—every closet, basement, attic, each drawer and file cabinet—to an inspection team that will peer into every nook and cranny—and rate you accordingly. On a major scale, this is what happens in a hospital. A team of experts comes and investigates its every procedure with scrupulous care. Equipped with practically every investigative tool but a microscope, they virtually don't miss those, either, while they are on the rounds. The joint commission, considered the top ranking authority in its field, is comprised of four member organizations: American College of Physicians, American College of Surgeons, American Hospital Association and American Medical Association.

The standards that a hospital must meet to pass muster are of the highest—all directly aimed for the better protection of hospital patients. The joint commission places great stress on the keeping of medical records. In this way a complete report of every patient—case history, statistics, laboratory results, diagnosis and final summary—is filed for future reference and research. The medical staff has other rules to live up to. Constant analysis and review of clinical work done in the hospital is always under review. There is compulsory consultation in certain types of operations—major surgery of questionable risk, for instance, or operations with obscure diagnosis, sterilization cases, first Caesarians and all curettages where a known or suspected pregnancy could be interrupted.

Twenty to 25 per cent of hospital deaths must be autopsied as diagnostic checks. Another aspect of medical staff responsibility is the complete investigation of the medical ability and professional qualifications of all affiliated physicians. The joint commission requires that the governing body, in this case the hospital's board of trustees, meet certain standards also. Here is vested the legal and moral responsibility for the conduct of the hospital as an institution, directly answering to the patient, community and sponsoring organization. Committees must adhere to certain structure, keep accurate minutes, meet at regular intervals and carry supervisory responsibility for different areas of hospital function. The administrative officer of the hospital, Robert E. Heinlein, is the official representative.

Last, but not least, the physical plant is examined in all its departments. What protection is there in case of fire, for instance? Rigid controls, written fire control plans, elimination of hazards, safeguards such as extinguishers, sprinkling devices, fire barriers, etc.—all must be planned in case of such an emergency. The hospital's sanitation and dietary programs are meticulously inspected. Isolation facilities must be provided for communicable diseases. In case of power failure, emergency lighting in operating, delivery and emergency rooms, as well as nursery and stairwells, must be ready to go into immediate action. Diagnostic and therapeutic facilities are checked with equally careful scrutiny. Pharmaceutical standards are upheld with similar precaution, as are those of the clinical laboratories, pathology department, blood bank and radiology. Nursing care receives the same thorough going-over and of vigilance while it is on the commission's roster.

Unique History

(Continued from Page 1)
 Three have already been made since the course was first established—the last one in '58 and new areas are being investigated for inclusion into the general pattern of the course. Miss Keith, always eager to increase her own already wide store of knowledge in this field, has completed work recently at Colorado and New York Universities of a specialized kind from which new ideas have been gleaned and introduced in her own course. This course is open to freshman and this year about 30 per cent of the present class of 240 students elected F. A. C. as a major subject. Those who take a keen interest in social studies in this first year course, find awaiting them on upper levels an array of exciting new courses from which to choose and which will be described briefly in the following.

It might be noted that all students are required to study American history for two years

during which time the student is exposed to every important aspect of the country's history since early colonial times through World War II, included in U. S. History II are two specially important units: "A Study of Totalitarianism" and "The Effect of Science on the Future of Humanity". The social, political, moral and ethical involvements are studied here.

As of the present school year the social studies department has been expanded to include several new courses in several new areas. Psychology and sociology are both being offered this year as one semester course. In psychology, taught by
