Regional Plans Adult School In September

The Union County Regional Board of Education announced it will sponsor a district-wide school of adult education in September 1960.

Classes would be held here at Jonathan Dayton High, at Arthur Johnson High School in Clark and at Gov. Livingston High, scheduled to open next year in Berkeley Heights.

The action originated with the Clark Adult School, a nonprofit corporation which holds classes at Johnson Regional, Harding School in Kenilworth and Deerfield, Mountainside. Earlier in the month, the school asked the regional board to take over its operation and, in effect, sponsor an adult school for the entire regional district of six communities.

In advocating the move, Dr. Warren B. Davis, superintendent of schools, said sponsorship would entitle the district to additional state aid and make possible Americanization classes for the foreign-born and certain other courses for high school credit.

Dr. Minor C. K. Jones, a member, noted that while the board would have to assume financial responsibility, the cost of running the school, except for the salary of a full time director, would be paid for by grants.

Although the Clark group recommended an initial budget of \$7,500, excluding the director's salary, the board referred the item to a budget conference that followed the meeting.

No Application for Airport Says Rep.

"No application, request or inquiry of any kind has yet been made to the Federal Aviation Agency concerning a proposed jet airport in the Morris and Union County area by the Fort of New York Authority or anyone else," Rep. Florence F. Dwyer (R-6th Dist., N.J.) reported.

The Union County Congresswoman, who has been in Washington the past five days for a series of conferences on the airport controversy and other Congressional business, said the FAA told her "they have no information whatsoever on this project."

"I have been assured by the aviation agency," Mrs. Dwyer added, "that the law requires public hearings to be held on the question of a proposed site of an airport before Federal" (Continued on Page 2)

Regional Board Budget Higher By \$446,328.

Reflecting the constant upward surge of pupil enrollment and the opening of a third high school, the tentative budget of the Union County Regional High School Board of Education was forwarded to Dr. William H. West, County Superintendent of Schools for his consideration and approval.

The grand total of the budget for the school year 1960-1961 is listed at \$2,711,348.25 in comparison with a 1959-1960 total of \$2,265,020.25 or an increase of \$446,328.00. This increase includes chiefly new teachers, maintenance, guidance, administration staff made necessary by the opening of the new school, equipment and supplies for the new facilities which are beyond the amount set aside under bond funds, and increases in salaries which are included in a salary guide tentatively approved by the Board. The new proposal for teachers holding a BS degree begins at \$4500.00, \$100 higher than the present guide and at its top point is \$100 higher than this year's schedule.

The increase in the amount to be raised by taxation in the 1960-1961 budget to be paid by the communities comprising the Regional District is \$434,995.77. This increase reflects a loss in state aid to the district of close to \$100,000 due to the increase of local fair share from 3 mills to 4 mills as defined by state law.

The Board has emphasized the fact that many of the budget items concerned with the opening of the Governor Livingston School are non-recurring.

The average effect of the 1960-1961 budget increase in this district will be a probable rise in regional tax rate from an average of 1.72 to approximately 2.07. Last year the Regional Board had been able to reduce the previous year's average tax rate 35 points. This year's probable average of 2.07 is approximately the same as the preceding year.

It should be noted that with next year's enrollment up more than 300 pupils, preparation is also being made for the influx of nearly 600 additional pupils in the following year.

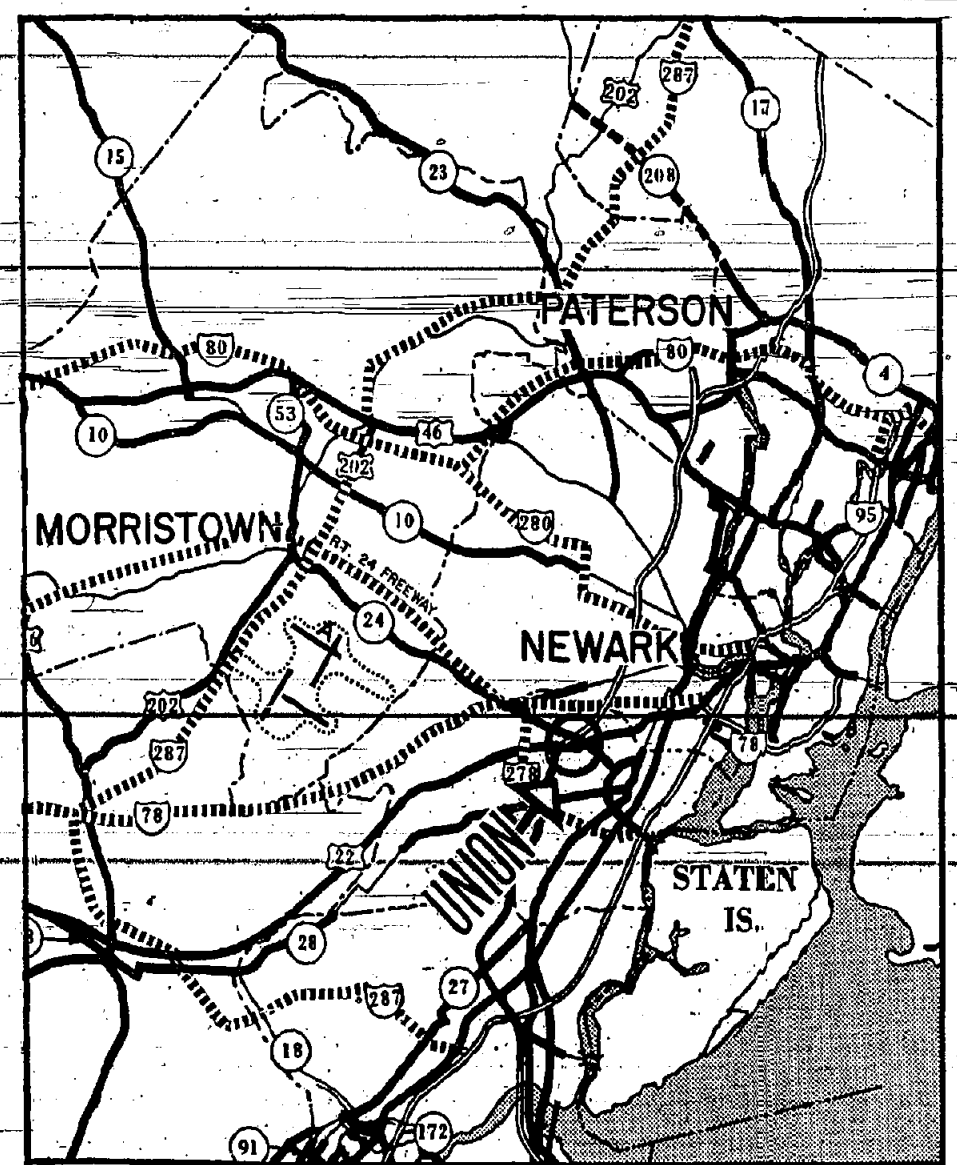
'Be Careful' Is Plea Of Gov. In Telegram

Governor Robert B. Meyner is very concerned because of the rising number of traffic deaths in New Jersey.

In a telegram to Mayor Vincent J. Bonadino he asks that Springfield residents should be made aware of the increasing number of traffic deaths and urges greater care especially "during the holiday period."

Mayor Bonadino stated that the matter of traffic control is in the hands of Police Chief Wilbur Selander and that all departments in the Township are cooperating in seeing that traffic rules are strictly enforced.

Following is the telegram addressed to Mayor Bonadino: "Traffic deaths in New Jersey are now higher than a year ago at this time. Consequently I am asking you to give increased support to accident prevention in the manner outlined in the recent letter from Attorney General Purman. This tragic trend in traffic casualties can be halted by night checks and stricter enforcement. Attention should be directed particularly to the alcohol factor which is so prevalent in accidents during the holiday period. In addition to stricter enforcement, I suggest you inform your constituents by every possible means of the increased perils in traffic at this season. I thank you for past cooperation and extend best wishes for the holidays. Robert B. Meyner, Governor of the State of New Jersey."

Officials Unite In Fight Against Jet Airport; Sees Danger For Entire Area

Officials from all municipalities in the area, with Congresswoman Florence P. Dwyer (Rep. 6th District) pouring the most blistering barrage at the Port of New York Authority, are uniting to fight the proposed plan for a jet airport in the Chatham-Morris County vicinity.

Tremendous noise and danger paths will be cut across western and southern Union County if the Port Authority's proposed jet airport in the Great Swamp area becomes a reality, Rep. Florence P. Dwyer said.

"If the very vague map which the Port Authority released can be taken as fact, the major northwest to southeast runway location would mean jet planes with their tremendous noise and danger, taking off right over the central school areas of New Providence and continuing just north of the Bell Laboratories, directly over the Daystrom offices and the new high school," Mrs. Dwyer said.

"I'm informed that jet planes normally fly at an altitude of about 400 feet until they are five miles from the end of the runway and do not begin to really gain altitude until they are nine miles from the runway," Mrs. Dwyer said.

School Fire Detection Systems Up To Voters; On Referendum In Feb.

NOTICE TO PARENTS OF SCHOOL CHILDREN

In the event of snow or ice, and the possibility of No School for that day, parents are requested NOT to call either the local police or fire departments!

As outlined in bulletins to parents sent out by the schools in town, citizens are requested to LISTEN TO RADIO STATION WOR 710 on the dial, between 7:15 and 7:45 for notification of school closing or to listen for Fire whistle at 7:30 and 8:00 a.m. - 2 blasts.

Both the Police and Fire Departments were hampered by over 400 calls after Monday night's snowstorm and the cooperation of citizens is urgently requested.

Springfield voters will have the choice of whether or not to install a fire alarm detection system in the local schools.

The question will appear on the ballot at the school elections along with the budget question. They will appear separately.

The system will cost in the neighborhood of \$22,500 and appear on the ballot as a \$25,000 project. Fire Chief Frank Metzger has recommended the move and many parents have indicated their support.

The board said it felt that since the system fell into the category of capital improvements the voters should be allowed to pass directly upon the measure.

A suggestion from the audience that the item be included in the budget was voted by the board for several reasons, including the one stated above. The school governing body also felt that it was unwise to possibly "jeopardize" the whole budget in case a majority of voters felt that the alarm system was unnecessary.

The alarm devices, which would be installed in all schools, would have alarm boxes in fire headquarters. They would be marked "on" constantly. Any smoke, fumes or heat would set off the alarm.

Board President Howard Smith pointed out that the proposed device is far superior to those that are activated only by smoke or heat. As an example, he said that a fire smoldering within the walls might go unnoticed until it erupted into a conflagration.

Grants Raise Overlook Fund To \$455,000

Overlook Hospital announced today the receipt of \$250,000 in grants from three foundations to be applied to the \$1,200,000 still needed to complete the payments for the \$490,000 nine-story addition.

The Fannie E. Rippel Foundation, Newark, New Jersey and the Lillia Babbitt Hyde Foundation, New York, each made additional gifts of \$100,000 over sums previously contributed. The other foundation gift of \$50,000 was anonymous.

The announcement of these gifts brings the amount raised in the current fund drive, through December 21, to a total of \$455,000, or about 38% of the \$1,200,000 goal. More than 1900 contributors have signified their interest and support of Overlook with gifts to the campaign.

Donald H. McLean, Jr., President of Overlook's Board of Trustees, in acknowledging these grants stated: "The receipt of these magnificent gifts at this Christmas time serves once again to re-

Longer Torso, Bares Key Season's New Resort Fashions

Key word to 1960 resort fashions is "long." Blouses are long, often brushing the hipbone. Longer jackets are slim and continental, the newest unmatched to the rest of the outfit, but related. Cover-ups for swimsuits and short shorts just a sliver of the underlying outfit beneath the hem.
 A Women's Wear Daily analysis of current trends in resort and cruise wear shows that tunics are longest, in playdresses they sometimes extend to, and bare, the knees. Tunics show up in everything, from tennis clothes to tops for dresses, skirts and pants. Even waistlines are lengthened to give a longer torso look.
 Dress collections for resort and cruise promise to be particularly feminine and pretty, says Women's Wear Daily. Dresses continue with belted waistlines and upper width is more positive. Unusual colors and handsome fabrics introduce a new individuality to Southern clothes.

1930 INFLUENCE

Big influence in sportswear is the 1930's period, which contributes both the look of ease and suppleness and the areas of exposure. Bare middles, bare backs, shorter shorts, side slits and back slashes are showing more girl than has been revealed in many years.
 Women's Wear Daily fashion editors find that dresses are cut to flatter, rather than to flounce. Skirts are straight hanging, but full, often cut on the bias. Silk-like and crepe-like fabrics make dresses with a "spectator look." Classic fabrics, piques, gingham, denims, tickings make crisper dresses with controlled fullness about neat little baggy tops, often with peasant embroidery. For casual dresses, and more active play wear, newest star is cotton seersucker, the great sportswear fabric of the '30's, the first of the no-iron materials. In neat stripes, it is most seen in blue or beige and white.
 Jackets are newly significant, part of the calculated look of unmatched separates. Newest are longer jackets, slim and continental-style, to be worn with short shorts of easy skirts. Regatta look of the 1930s appears in spectator costumes in blue and white, sometimes with a accent. Overblouses, shaped slightly over pants and slim skirts, now stop at the hipbone or below, instead of just brushing the waistline.
 The relatively quiet advent of the bikini on American beaches last summer has given rise to a spate of new pared-down two-piece swimsuits, plus, for the less adventurous, more sedate two-pieces. With it covers-ups are important, the Italian school girl's smock newest. In one-piece suits, low-as-possible backs provide bareness. Textured knits, soft cottons, lightweight yarns with stretch will be important.
 A sweater wardrobe for cool tropical evenings, subtropical days will include new-looking Angora this season, as well as ever-popular cashmeres, fur blends.

 miles out," Mrs. Dwyer said.
 Westfield Route Cited — "Five miles from the end of that runway is just south of Echo Lake Park in Westfield and nine miles out is just past the Garden State Parkway in Clark. The take-off route would apparently continue on over Highway," she said.
 "The more southerly of the two runways would take a route over Berkeley Heights, Mt. St. Mary's Academy and on out over Terrill Rd. in Scotch Plains and Plainfield," Mrs. Dwyer continued. Jets normally use straight-line takeoffs and landing to save fuel, she said.
 Mrs. Dwyer who is among the leaders opposing the jet field, said that dozens of schools lie directly in the take-off paths. She recalled that one of the three planes which crashed during take-offs from the Newark field landed across the street from Battin High School in Elizabeth.
 "There is absolutely no reason to risk another series of crashes such as we in Union County have already experienced," she stated.
 The congresswoman also expressed concern that the take-off route would go directly over the Murray Hill research district where several major firms are conducting defense research work. The Bell Laboratories employs several thousand engineers and other personnel at the Murray Hill location.
 Disaster Feared — "If one of those planes crashed into the Bell Laboratories, we would not only have a disaster unlike anything we have ever experienced in this county, but the nation's vital defense research work would be drastically affected. I should think even the noise from the planes taking off would be a most disturbing factor to the engineers working in that area."
 "The dangers of crashes are real ones," Mrs. Dwyer said. "No other airport in this area would require a pilot to clear a 450 foot hill within seconds after take-off. The Federal Aviation Authority will be asked to investigate this danger factor before any funds are allocated."

 funds can be authorized. Since an airport of this apparent size would undoubtedly require such Federal assistance, we can be sure that the general public will have an opportunity to express its views on any location the Port Authority ultimately proposes.
 "Congresswoman Dwyer reiterated her opposition to the location of a major jet airport in a heavily populated, residential area."
 She said the "likeliest site," the Great Swamp area in Morris County, "would, if approved, disrupt the residential pattern in a large part of northwest Union County, including the communities of New Providence, Summit, Berkeley Heights and others."
 "Modern jet aircraft," Mrs. Dwyer explained, "require much longer approach and take-off zones than conventional aircraft. This fact, coupled with the ear-splitting noise of big jet engines, enlarges the area of disturbance far beyond previous limits."
 "The experience of eastern Union County with the occasional jet planes using Newark Airport has demonstrated all too conclusively the nerve-shattering impact of jet operations on community life."
 "As I see the situation, there are two alternatives open to those who see a need for expanded airport facilities in the metropolitan area. Either perfect an effective jet noise suppressor system, or locate jet airports away from heavy concentrations of people and rely on a rapid transit service to overcome the disadvantage of greater distance away from downtown areas."
 "In the final analysis, whenever the choice is between the convenience of a relatively few airline passengers and the health and safety of entire communities, my position will be on the side of the people. Progress becomes spurious when the price in human terms becomes too high."
 "On American coins the eagle generally holds a cluster of arrows in its claws or a scroll in its beak, and these too, were Roman devices."

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Rabbi Explains Hanukah Holiday

has symbolized the fight for religious freedom throughout the ages. It will begin this year at sunset, Friday, December 25th. Hanukah, as chronicled in the Book of the Macabees, recites the struggle between Jewish freedom fighters and the Syrian King Antiochus in the Holy

Land two millennia ago. The despotic ruler attempted to force paganism upon the Jews, who rose up to resist under the leadership of Judah Maccabee. In the year 165 B.C.E., Judah Maccabee and his band recaptured the Temple at Jerusalem, cleansed it, rededicated it, and proclaimed an eight-day "dedication of the altar." Jews have commemorated the holiday with special services, prayers and hymns, in synagogues, homes and religious schools.

Hanukah is known as the "Festival of Lights" and also as the "Days of Dedication." Its universal theme—"the fight for religious freedom"—has echoed in human history, particularly in the "civilization of the west," and is as meaningful today as it was in the times of Mattathias and his fine son, Judah, and his four Maccabean brothers, who led the Jewish people in the struggle for spiritual liberty.

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

Food Fads Topic Of Nutritionist

New Jersey women will "Focus on Food," including attitudes and fads about food, during Homemakers' Day in the War Memorial Building Trenton on Jan. 23.

The all-day meeting will begin with registration at 9 a.m. in the Assembly Hall. Sponsored by the N. J. Department of Agriculture and the Cooperative Extension Service of Rutgers University, it will be open to the public.

Dr. Frederick J. Stare, chairman of the department of nutrition, Harvard University, will speak on "Our Food Beliefs, Fact or Fad?" during the afternoon session. Dr. Stare will consider such subjects as fats in the diet and vitamin supplements.

The morning session will open with a talk by Miss Kay Nawa, who conducts a consumer education program for the Livestock Division, Agricultural Marketing Service, U.S. Department of Agriculture. She will talk about "Meat for M'ems," using meat cuts and grades.

The second talk of the morning will be on "Attitudes and Appetites" by Dr. Francis Dowd, professor of psychology at Rutgers. He will tell how emotions affect appetites and how eye-appeals set by others influence food habits.

There will also be exhibits of interest to homemakers.

persist. Banding, says Edward J. Duda, entomologist of the Bartlett Tree Research Laboratories, restricts growth. It's like choking a tree with a taut iron chain. Trees banded 15 years ago with a sticky gum show severe retarded growth today.

Even worse perhaps is the practice of scraping off large areas of the bark on the trunk or big limbs to get rid of insects or prevent them crawling up and down. The scraped areas are often white-washed and while the white-wash is not harmful, the de-barking is because it removes vital inner bark and the tree's tender life-line, the cambium area just beneath the bark.

Decorate For Happy Living

Interior design, which includes decoration, begins with a careful analysis of your way of living, whether you are designing part of an area or the entire house.

"Much of today's 'interior decoration' is superficial," says Miss Gena Thames of the extension home furnishing service at Rutgers University. "Too little stems from a careful analysis of our mode of living. Making our homes more livable isn't just painting the walls, putting up curtains and filling space with furniture."

"A successfully designed interior is functional and practical," she points out. It serves the purposes intended for your family's habits of living. First things are considered first. In a well designed home, furniture and areas are flexible in use and in arrangement. Traffic lanes are open, space is used creatively, seating is comfortable, backgrounds are restful and functional. It satisfies your ideas of comfort, beauty, economy and ease of maintenance. It fulfills the needs of each family member. Furnishings and their backgrounds are of good design.

As you design or redesign interiors Miss Thames suggests you attempt to create a setting for happy living that will help family members to develop individuality and character, a setting that is attractive, yet simple and unpretentious.

Keep maximum use and minimum care in mind. Furnishings simple in design and free of excessive ornamentation require less care.

Designing or redesigning an interior is a continuing activity. One rarely has everything he wants or needs. And something is usually wearing out.

As your family progresses from one cycle into another, your pattern of living and your interests change. There are no "musts" or "shoulds" in furnishing a home. Design or redesign for an honest reason. There is no need to follow traditions slavishly.

Don't be concerned over mixing one kind of sofa with another kind of chair or whether Empire and Victorian can be used together or with modern, advises Miss Thames. Choose and use related or similar forms.

Statistics Show School Kids Smarter than Norm

Springfield mothers who brag that their children are smarter than most other children — or at least if not smarter then, are better taught.

According to statistics released by Superintendent of Schools Benjamin Newsinger, local youngsters who took California achievement tests averaged more than a year better than average.

The grades and their achievements were: Third, 4.0; fourth, 5.0; fifth, 6.0; sixth, 6.7; seventh, 8.5 and eighth, 9.3. All of which, as a board member remarked, "adds up to a very fine record."

In other Board of Education news, the board received a letter from Continental Post 228, American Legion, protesting the fact that the schools remained open Veterans Day.

The communique pointed out that the schools were closed the day before the holiday for the election and the following day for the teachers' convention.

PA's Report on 14 Other Sites Surveyed for Port

Why the Great Swamp for a jet airport? What was wrong with the other 14 sites studied by the Port Authority? Why not put the field in Burlington County or shove it up to Westchester? Those are a few of the many questions being asked about the PA's selection of the Great Swamp as the site for its proposed new jet airport.

And they are good questions but they are best answered by the Port Authority.

Following is the PA's report on each individual location studied:

- 1—MacArthur Airport, Suffolk County, L. I. Approximately 50 miles from New York. Would require airways crossovers for most domestic travel. Inadequate size unless railroad and two major highways are relocated. Site would include parts of population centers of Patchogue, Farmingdale, Sayville, Ronkonkoma.
- 2—St. James Airport, East of St. James, Suffolk County, L. I. Approximately 50 miles from New York. Air space same as MacArthur. Inadequate size unless three major highways relocated. Site includes Town of Centereach, Long Island Expressway and Hauppauge-Nesconset Expressway cross site.
- 3—Lake at Westchester
- 4—Westchester County Airport, distance from New York OK. Within buffer zones of all three existing PA airports. Inadequate size hemmed in by a lake and surrounding populous areas. Rocky and hilly terrain.
- 5—Pine Island, Orange County, N. Y., 50 miles from New York, poor access roads, swamp and low area. No room for crosswind runways. Surrounded by high-terrain approach obstructions.
- 6—Caldwell, N. J. Ok for New York distance but minimum

- 7—Great Swamp, Morris County. Travel distance OK with new highways by 1965. More than adequate size. Physical requirements OK.
- 8—Solberg Hunterdon, South-west of New Brunswick in Somerset County. Over 40 miles travel from New York. Restricted by Raritan River on east
- 9—New Brunswick, 40 miles travel from New York. Too close to Newark Airport and McGuire Air Force Bases. Adequate size. Part of Town of North Brunswick, waterway, hilly terrain on site.
- 10—Matawan, south of South Amboy, 30 miles travel from New York. Too close to Newark Airport and McGuire Air Force Base, critical conflict with major highways. Size not evaluated. Physical requirements not evaluated.
- 11—Hightstown-Jamesburg, 40 miles travel from New York. Size and physical requirements not evaluated. Too close to Newark and McGuire.
- 12—Lakewood, 50 miles from New York. Too close Newark Airport and McGuire. Size and physical requirements not evaluated.
- 13—Mount Holly - Burlington, west of Bordentown, 55 miles from New York, 10 miles from Trenton, 100 miles from Philadelphia ports. Critical con-

Fresh Greens In Home Yards

Pruning the yew or Taxus hedge just before Christmas provides a supply of fresh greens, keeps the bushes in shape and gives you a chance to see some troubles you may have overlooked.

If the bushes are under the edges of roof gutters or under a large tree you may find a lot of small dead tips. These were not killed by a disease during the summer, but rather by ice and snow last winter. Falling ice or snow may have bruised the bark and when as little as a third of the girth of a branch is killed the branch beyond that point will die.

Larger branches of young hedges have been known to die because of a nurseryman's tags were attached by wires and these wires strangled the branch. It may not be too late to remove any pieces of wire you find on a bush as you prune it.

Yew or Taxus can't stand wet soil. If any of yours are planted near a rain down-spout they may be getting more water than they can stand. This condition has killed more yews than all other causes combined.

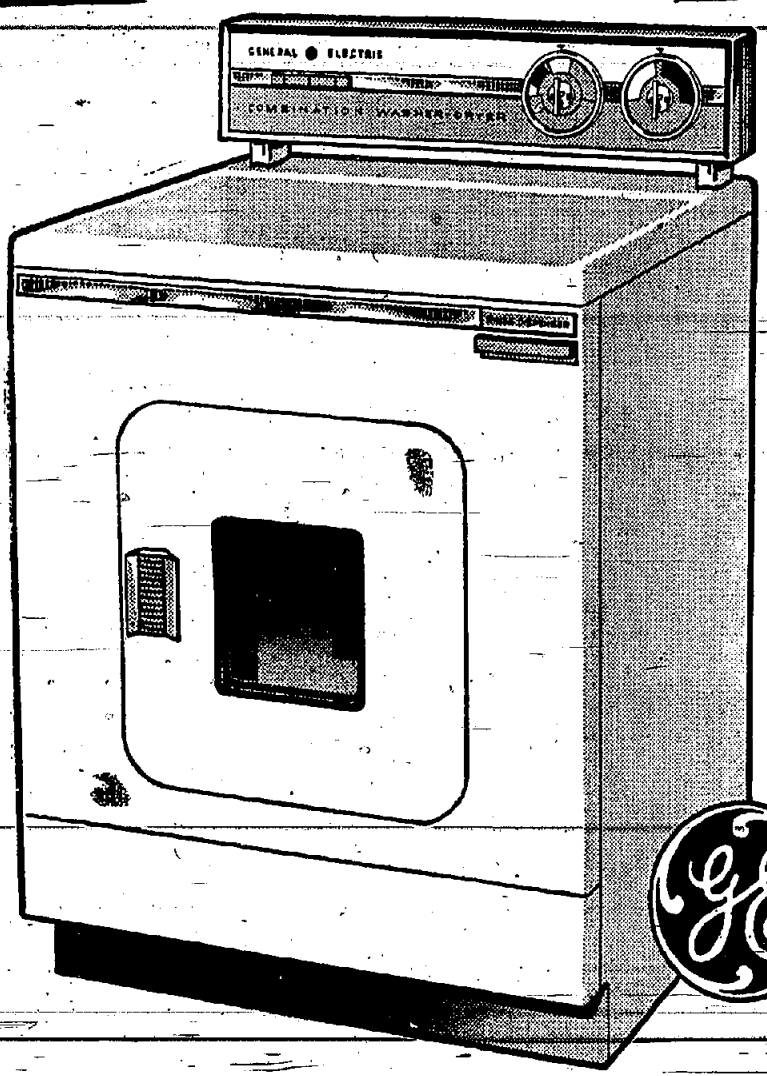

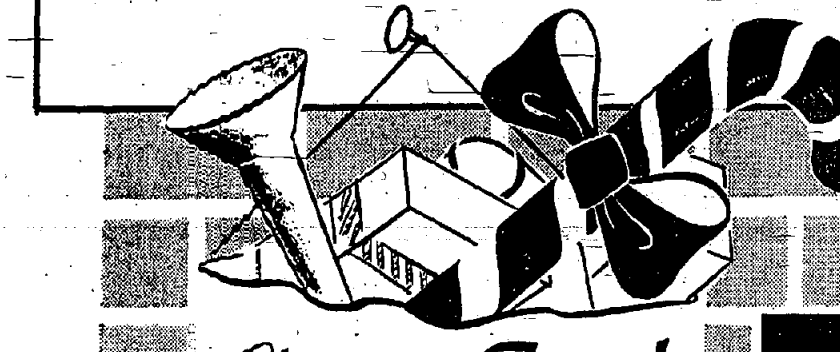
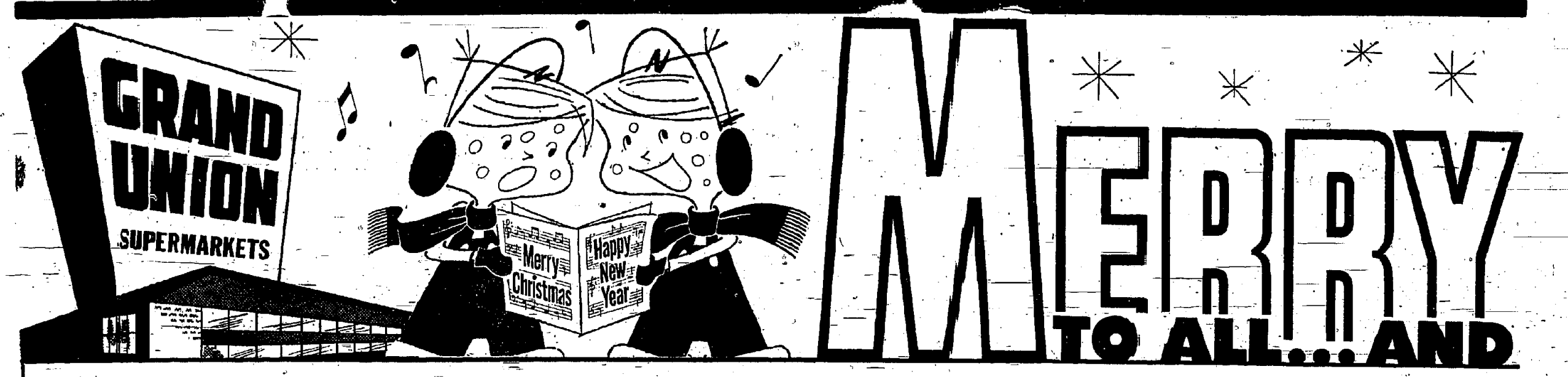

HERE ARE BABY SITTER RULES

—In Emergency Dial Operator and Ask For Police or Fire Department.

If you are planning on having a baby sitter during the coming Christmas and New Years Holiday period, the National Board of Fire Underwriters through the Chief of the Fire Department and the Chief of Police offer these suggestions.

In addition to all of the following suggestions, if there is an emergency DIAL THE TELEPHONE OPERATOR AND ASK FOR EITHER THE FIRE DEPARTMENT OR THE POLICE DEPARTMENT.

1. Know the sitter; make inquiries about training and family background.
2. Employ only sitters who have a sense of responsibility and who-like children.
3. Try to have the same sitter regularly if possible, and, who lives nearby.
4. Have a preliminary interview with the sitter; Acquaint her with children and pets, especially the watchdog.
5. Give instructions orally and leave them in writing.
6. Give instructions orally and how to get children out of house in case of fire.
7. Give sitter the telephone number of the fire department, family doctor, and place to which they (parents or adult members of the family) are going. Also, what neighbor to call in the event of an emergency.
8. If there is no phone, explain to sitter other means of notifying fire department in case of a fire.
9. Caution sitter against permitting child to play with matches, electric cords, or other electric appliances. Also, tell her to keep the child out of the kitchen if possible.
10. If sitter is to bathe youngster, make certain she has had such experience.
11. Leave a first aid kit with sitter and explain how to take care of simple burns, cuts, bruises.
12. Be sure sitter understands that in a fire emergency she should get the child out of the house; then call the fire department, then notify parents.

13. Provide flashlights for use in case lighting should fail.

14. Always come home at the hour agreed upon; telephone if delayed.

15. Make suitable and safe arrangements for accompanying the sitter home.

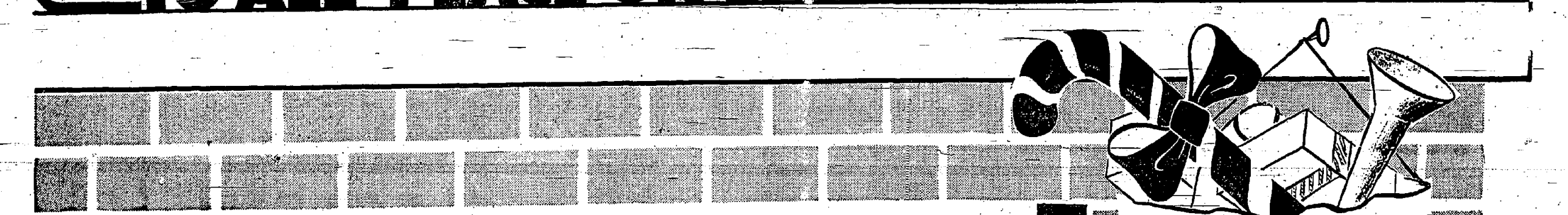



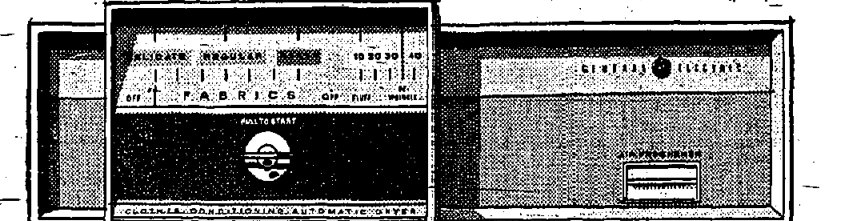

Not Too Late To Plant

It is too late to plant spring-flowering bulbs? This question often arises during December, especially when the first snow or cold snap reminds us that winter is almost here, according to Lawrence D. Little, Jr., County Agricultural Agent.

You can plant spring-flowering bulbs, such as daffodils, tulips, crocus and other small bulbs, any time the ground is not frozen in December or even in January and still get flowers next spring. They may not be as large as those planted earlier, however, advises Lawrence D. Little, Jr., Agricultural Agent.

Late bulb plantings should be mulched with several inches of leaves or salt hay to encourage root growth and prevent heaving during the winter.

If soil freezes solid and the bulbs still are not planted, you may have a chance to save face. Many gardeners keep several bushels of top soil handy for such emergencies. Plant your bulbs in flower pots, then store the pots in wooden boxes in an unheated garage.

Air Force Needs Teachers

The Air Force wants teachers-experienced teachers at least 23 years old—with two years current teaching experience and a current valid teaching certificate. They must be able to pass a rigid physical examination and have the personality attributes necessary to adjust to living and working conditions unlike those found in the United States. The positions are located in Air Force Schools at overseas

bases in Europe, North Africa, and in the Azores, Bermuda, Iceland, Japan, Newfoundland and the Philippines. The purpose of these schools is to provide public school educational opportunities in grades 1-12 to children of our military and civilian personnel stationed overseas.

The tour of duty is for one year beginning August, 1960. Salaries begin at approximately \$4,300 per annum with additional compensation to individuals possessing higher academic degrees. Transportation is furnished to and from the post of duty at no cost to the employee and housing or a housing allowance is provided. In some areas ten to twenty per cent is added to the base pay.

Applications are being accepted by the Air Force Overseas Recruitment Branch, 111 East 18th Street, New York 3, New York.

Offers Art Scholarships

Two art scholarships will be offered to high school seniors by the New Jersey State Federation of Women's Clubs.

One award is a continuance of this school year of the Mary Roebling Scholarship for Painting which is a grant of \$750 for further art training to the State's top painting winner. A new companion award is the Helen F. Boehm-Scholarship-for Sculpture for a similar amount as a top State sculpture prize.

The competition is being organized on a statewide basis by the Federation and is open to all senior students who are residents of New Jersey and enrolled in any public, private or parochial school of the State. Entries in painting may be in any of the painting media, and works are to be submitted ready for hanging. The sculpture entries may be in ceramic, chalk, stone, wood, plaster, bronze, or hand composition and may be carved, cast, or constructed. The Federation has organized under the Scholarship Chairman, Mrs. John E. Volkman of Haddon Heights, eleven District Chairmen to cover all counties unlike those found in the United States. The positions are located in Air Force Schools at overseas

Busy Work - Or Responsibility

Most parents agree that in city or suburban homes there aren't nearly so many chores for youngsters as there are in farm homes. Frequently parents say there just isn't anything for the youngster to do around the home, and the child rebels against busy work.

It's perfectly natural for youngsters to resent busy work. It's one thing to do something that's needed and that will help mother or father. It's something else entirely to have to do things that aren't necessary or needed.

Part of the difficulty in thinking about household chores for children is that adults often underestimate the ability of the child, says Phyllis Greer of Rutgers University. Therefore, the jobs assigned to them are the easy but unpleasant ones—taking out the garbage, for example.

How could anyone be enthusiastic for long about garbage? Most mothers dislike washing dishes and making beds. Usually, where two winners will be chosen by a jury of professional artists recommended by the Arts Committee of the State Museum.

Three sculptures or five paintings must be submitted by each participant to be judged as one entry. One painting winner and one sculpture winner from each of the eleven districts will bring their entries to the New Jersey State Museum at Trenton next April for final judging by a professional jury recommended by the Museum arts committee. The grand prize winner will be announced at a luncheon on Federation Art Day, April 18, 1960, at which time Mrs. Roebling and Mrs. Boehm will present the two scholarship awards. The remaining finalists will receive an honorable mention gift through the courtesy of Edward Marshall Boehm, noted Trenton ceramic sculptor.

It's the Law

HISTORICALLY SPEAKING...

Trial by jury and arguments before them go back to Greek colonies in Sicily about 600 B. C., in lawsuits over lands seized by tyrants.

Soon Athens itself adopted the system, but appears to have worked out no rules or evidence of judicial control of the trial.

Juries often cheered or booed the parties. They talked together and shouted back to the speakers. What one man knew about the case he told his neighbor.

All evidence could go: Personal knowledge, hearsay, prejudice, and the juror's opinion.

The Athenian jury had power. Each "discase" (chosen by lot) was both jurymen and judge. Each juror got one "obol" a day—about three cents.

Each accused person had to come before the jury personally to defend himself—which was especially hard if he didn't know the art of advocacy, since he was assumed to be guilty.

Indeed, many hold that if Socrates had taken independent advice he would never have defended the boisterous and biased Athenian jury which sentenced him to the "hemlock there on the hillside" in 399 B. C.

Less outspoken defendants in those days sought bootleg legal advice. Antiphon (415) ghost-wrote and sold briefs to clients who had to put their own cases to the jury. He set out four steps of an Athenian trial: 1) the charges are the jobs given the children.

One way to solve the problem is to make a list of all the duties—including everything, not just dishes and garbage. Then let each member of the family select the job he prefers.

Naturally, some of the less interesting jobs will be left over, but these can be divided up. Rotating jobs is also a good idea—laundry one week, dishes the next, cleaning the bathroom the following week.

accuser's charge, 2) the accused's reply, 3) the accuser's reply, and 4) the accused's response.

Afterwards the jury let the accused off or found him guilty. The jury sentenced the guilty then and there, allowing some—Socrates, for one—to propose their own penalties, and even to bid them upward if they failed to please the jury.

After the trial, the speakers (or in Socrates' case, his friend Plato) often worked their talks over, and sent them out for friends to admire or criticize.

Pretty much the same appeals which are heard today were then used to win the jury over. Aristotle listed a few, as follows:

The values the jurors shared with the speaker—reverence for justice, the law, and the city's founding fathers; the sanctity of the jurymen's oath; the verdict's effect upon public and foreign opinion, and sometimes upon women and youth.

"TRUTH AND THE WHOLE TRUTH"

The stakes in life, liberty, and property before our courts are high and call for solemnity.

You must take an oath before you may take the witness stand, for instance. "You do solemnly swear," the clerk says, "that the evidence you are about to give in the issue now pending shall be the truth, the whole truth, and nothing but the truth, so help you God."

You reply: "Yes," or "I do." Why the oath? To impress a witness and to bind him to tell the truth upon penalty of perjury.

For a long time in England no one could testify in court unless he professed certain religious beliefs as to the nature of after-life. The great John Stuart Mill waged war on this because, he said, a truthful-disbeliever was the only one penalized. For the liar would claim his belief to get his day in court. This rewarding of liars, he claimed, was self-defeating.

In America, may a witness take the oath some other way? Yes, if the judge believes that you have a special way of taking a binding oath, the clerk may use it.

Suppose you cannot in good conscience take any oath at all? Then you may "solemnly affirm."

To lie on the witness stand has the same legal effect as a false oath: You may face a perjury charge.

Nurses Needed At Hospital

Dr. A. E. Rabbi Elaborates Candle's Meaning

By Rabbi Reuben R. Levine Temple Beth Ahm

The main feature of the Hanukkah observance is the lighting of candles. The eight lights we kindle in our homes symbolize the re-lighting of the Eternal Flame in the Temple of Jerusalem when the Jews regained their freedom from the Hellenized Syrians over 2000 years ago.

The lighting of a candle, the striking of a match—these are simple acts. But the light they create for us at Hanukkah time represents the unquenchable, indeed, the unquenchable light of freedom that springs eternally in the human heart.

In honor of Hanukkah, I present herewith a composition that tells us what it means to light a candle:

"A candle is a small thing. But one candle can light another. And see how its own light increases, as a candle gives its flame to the other. You are such a light!

"Light is the power to dispel darkness. You have this power to move back the darkness in yourself and in others—to do so with the birth of light created when one mind illuminates another, when one heart kindles another, when one strength en- lights another. And its flame enlarges within you as you pass it on.

"Throughout history, children of darkness have tried to smother the passage of light from man to man. Through history, dictators large and small have tried to darken, diminish and separate men by terror.

"But always in the end they fail. For always, somewhere in the world, the light remains; ready to burn its brightest when it is dark; a light that began

when God created the world, saying 'Let There Be Light,' and every free people has remained free by resisting those who would extinguish in men the light of freedom, of love, of truth.

"To do our daily part to increase this light, we must remember that a candle is a small thing, a MAN alone is a small thing, a NATION alone is a small thing. Remembering this, we must recognize something much more than our indispensability to others. We must also remember THEIR INDISPENSABILITY TO US. We cannot hope—either as individuals or nations—to reach our highest capabilities until we help those around us reach theirs. To be strong is the strong must serve.

"THESE LIGHTS WE NOW KINDLE." These words accompany the lighting of Hanukkah candles in the home, and in the heart, to commemorate the eternal bridge of light which reaches from Creation itself to the radiant spirit of free men in this spirit is celebrated the Festival of Hanukkah—the Festival of Light—wherein the candle that gives its light to the others is called the Shamash, 'the servant candle.' You too are strongest . . . when you serve.

"Yes a candle IS a small thing, but one candle can light another."

At a meeting this week, the board received an opinion from Borough Attorney Irvine B. Johnson, Jr., which resolved two of the problems facing the board.

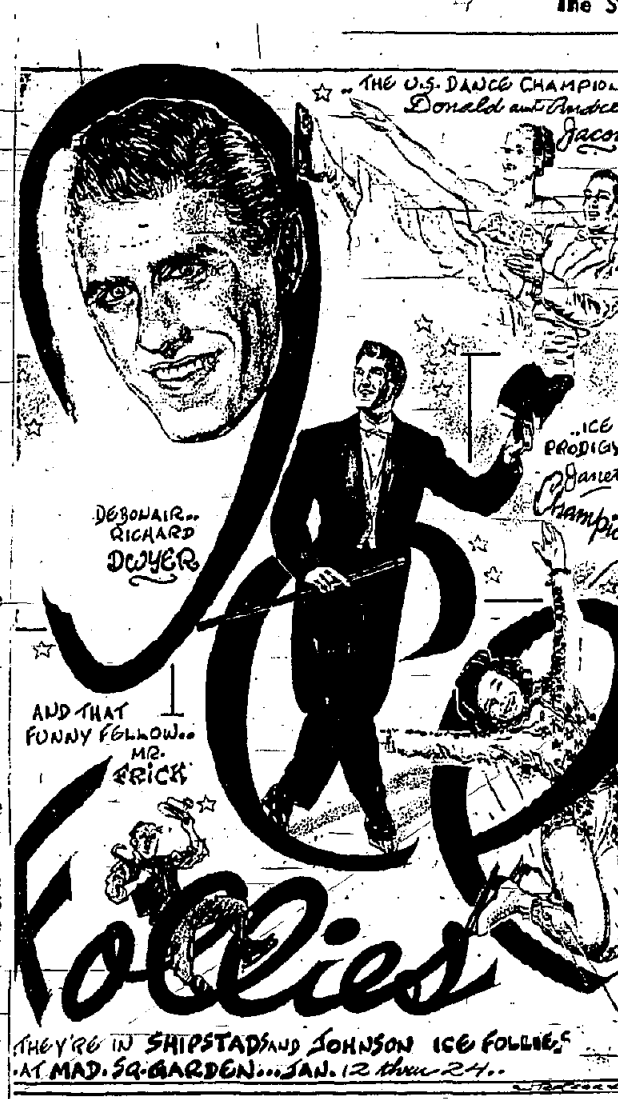

Hall asked that the board restrict the working hours to 8-5 and eliminate Saturday and Sunday work. He said that something should be done about the "terrible junk yard" appearance. Hall said that there were old truck bodies and other junk around the lot.

Hall also warned that the Noltes had reserved the right to use the converted three-car garage on the property. He said that in the past manufacturing operations had gone on in the garage and he did not want a situation "where the Noltes will have their cake and eat it."



Dr. Runnells May Be Held As Director

Freeholder Thomas G. Dunn announced he will move for an extension of Dr. John E. Runnells' term as medical director at the county hospital in Berkeley Heights that bears his name.

Dunn said that he will urge the Board of Freeholders at its final meeting of the year tonight Thursday to "take the necessary steps" for the retention of the 83-year-old hospital official.

This will mean a recommendation to the Board of Managers at Runnells Hospital to make an exception for Dr. Runnells in enforcing the mandatory retirement rule for county employees over 70.

Dunn said he is acting because of the physician's contributions to "medical science and the community" and because of "the tremendous demonstration of public opinion in favor of his retention at the hospital."

"I firmly believe," Dunn said, "that mandatory retirement at 70 is practical, but in view of Dr. Runnells' contributions to medical science and the community and in view of the tremendous demonstration of the public opinion in favor of his retention, I think an exception should be considered."

If Dunn's resolution is approved by both boards, it will come as a last minute reprieve for Dr. Runnells. The mandatory retirement ruling, passed two years ago, is to take effect on Thursday, the day of the freeholders' meetings.

Dunn wasn't sure of the reception his resolution would get at the meeting.

Freeholder Edward J. Carlin, chairman of the freeholders' welfare committee which has a supervisory relationship with the Runnells board, said he would confer with Dunn on the resolution before voting on it.

In this third of a series of articles, guidance was chosen for the spotlight because of the heightened activity going on at the present time in this department. Maybe parents and others interested in our school system know cursorily about this aspect of the modern high school. One ought to know a great deal more. I feel, because guidance is the key to a successful stay in the high school.

Many interesting and important services are rendered by the guidance department to the student, and if parents can know a little more about these services, then much can be done to help the student through his high school career. Now guidance may be an old story to some. Some may say that books have been written on guidance a long time ago. And yet, as a completely separate area of a school's make-up, guidance is a relatively new facet at Dayton Regional High School. It used to be that guidance was practiced individually by the classroom teacher, either directly or through the class as a group.

Today, however, the guidance department exists as a completely separate department, staffed by five full-time counselors and housed in an attractive, and accessible office on the ground floor of the school. There isn't a single student who doesn't know where the guid-

ance office is or who hasn't been in the office at least once. It is a busy place too, with students coming in for information or for counselling or just for browsing through the mass of brochures and pamphlets and catalogues on a variety of subjects; teachers can be found usually referring to past student records, checking on present student difficulties, trying to get help on a certain student who is having his difficulties or recording grades and standardized test scores in the students' files, or someone from administration might be seen here getting figures on class sizes, certain courses, or for conference with the guidance personnel in curricular problems. For his own protection and in order to facilitate the plowing of snow, we urgently request that all cars be kept off streets during the winter months.



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
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
