

We congratulate the Grand Jury and hope that it will lead to strong legislation which will eliminate the last-minute letter maligning a candidate and that fav orite political dodge of hiding behind the anonymity of "civic association," "committee of 100-or 1000," and - similar fictitious groups that fool no one but do immense harm.

With such tactics always in the realm of possibilty in a political campaign, is it any wonder that so many. people of great ability and high repute are reluctant to become endidates for public office?

We hope this blot on our reputation for fair play will be wiped out-and quickly.
