Members of the Board—notably Dr. Minor C. K. Jones of Mountainside and William J. Melick Jr. of Springfield, Board president—have hit out against the proposal as individuals. Last week the position of these members was embraced by the Board as a whole and the position of the education body was made clear.

Neither the two members mentioned nor the Board as a unit has argued against a county vocational school as such. The opposition is to the method chose by the

To recognize marks of quality in a shirt you should examine it closely, read the label and ask questions of the salesper son when necessary.

Nothing is more uncomfortable than an ill-fitting shirt, so be certain to ask for the correct neckband size and sleeve length. The shirt should be long and smooth fitting over the torso, flat on the chest, yet roomy enough for comfort.

Examine the back yoke and cuffs to see that fullness has been gathered properly. Stitching is a good indication of workmanship. Seams on a good shirt will have 18 to 20 stitches to the

Collar points should be sharp evenly stitched and lie flat Buttonholes should be evenly and closely stitched. Well-made buttonholes will not fray out They should slip easily and securely over the button.

Don't overlook the buttons Eustrous pearl buttons of uniform thickness with four holes, securely sewn on, are very satsfactory for a good business

Even a- full-cut shirt with good workmanship will do you little good if-the fabric quality is not there. The label shouldguarantee there will be no more than 1 percent shrinkage, and the guarantee should cover the whole shirt, not just the collar Colored shirts should be fast to light, washing and perspiration

Good Rule to Paint Ceiling First

When painting a room, give the ceiling priority over walls; and woodwork. Otherwise you will have to take extra precautions to keep from spoiling the work you've already done. And don't start the ceiling until you have time to do the whole job at once, since restarting is certain to leave some trace even with nonlapping

Dip only an inch or two of the brush into the paint. Flow the paint on with just enough pressure for uniform spreading. When using a roller, avoid overloading, move along in even strokes, and have a small brush handy for tight spots.

Remove as much furniture as possible and cover the remainder_with drop cloths. Don't get tangled up trying to paint around a ceiling fixture—take out its screws to lower it a little and you'll have an easier and neater job.

Right Color Important When Staining Wood

When staining natural wood, choose a color of stain appropriate for the wood and style of the piece of furniture.

So much is said about a natural finish for wood these days that one might well wonder about when stain should be

A stain may be used to freshen the color of the wood appears faded or grayed, but should not be evident that stain has been used.

If a piece of furniture has been previously stained or has several erlors or types of wood in it, it is usually desirable to

Woods that have no natural beauty, such as bass wood, poplar and gum, usually need staining. Woods with natural beauty in grain and color, such -as mahegany walnut, cherry pine and maple, usually do not need staining

If you decide that a stain is desired, ebserve colors of mel-Jowed wood to find the right celor for the piece in mind. Then apply it only after the surface is smorthed and before a finish coat is put on. Surfaces must have a satin smoothness before staining. Wood whiskers left on absorb more stain than a flat surface and cause a coarse, cloudy appearance. Stain in the day-time when the light is good.

Salvent Great Aid When Repainting

Preparing the surface of piece of furniture for repaint ing usually takes time and elbow grease. But if the surface is smooth, there's an easier

If the surface of painted trim or furniture is smooth - not cracked, peeled or alligatored -rag on or brush on a solvent cleaner. There are a number

of brands available. A solvent cleaner cuts the glossy surface and makes "tooth" for the next coat, eliminating the need for using abrasive paper, steel wool or an undercoater. It also removes any wax applied to the

surface. Solvent cleaner dries instantly and the coat of paint may be applied immediately after using it,






