No. 5 - SIGNALS" (Fifth and Last in a Series) One day distant or near an enemy aircraft may fly over Springfield, so high it can't be seen, and drop one bomb that in its blast power and destruction will surpass all the bombsof all the planes that flew for the United States in World

Today's planning for Civil Defense is based on the use by the enemy of a 20-megaton bomb, equal to 20 million tons of T.N.T. used in "olden days." When that bomb hits, there will be survivors. Even in the face of distressing public apathy, Civil Defense measures have made that much certain. For example, the Japanese vho lived in Hiroshima had no

War Two.

hit-Their first inkling of the immensity of their woe was the giant mushroom that billowed up, miles high into the sky and few in Hiroshima lived that long. But the Japanese-in-Nagasaki had a brief warning. Americans of today are assured there will be some warning ....

maybe minutes, maybe hours. The enemy exists. He has the weapon. He has the aircraft to deliver the weapon. Springfield is a community of families, of parents and children. But most parents do not even know what the air raid signals mean, says Springfield's CD chief, Saul Freeman.

Freeman says, patiently (he's said this over and over): "There are just two air raid signals.

"One is a three minute blast at steady tone. It means "alert," and when you hear it you are-directed to turn to the regular radio channels for instructions. If those channels are silent, then turn to conelrad' at 640 and 1240 wavelengths. Under no circumstances use the telephone. The wires are needed for more urgent business than yours.

"The other signal is a threeminute blast in a fluctuating tone, high-and-low, high-andlow, It means 'take cover'.

"When the 'take cover' given you are under orders to put your personal or family survival plan into immediate operation. Proceed in haste to the family shelter. Then tune in concirad on your battery radio: 640 or 1240 on the dial. Listen for Civil Defense instruc-

tions. Do not use the telephone. That's when Freeman and his men will be poised for action. 200 trained volunteers against the atom bomb.






