Perhaps it was the presence of three clergymen on the dais. perhaps it was the time —Sunday afternoon. perhaps it was the purpose of the gathering. Whatever the reason, the ceremony of dedicating Springfield's model fallout spelter in Town Hall last Sunday was a solemn affair.

Solemn, that is, in the sense of serious, earnest, sobering. There was little applause in response to the talks delivered. Perhaps those taking part in the program and those in the audience were thinking thoughts that maybe some day such shelters would have to be used for real.

It was the right kind of program for the occasion, methinks, and the two co-operating organizations.— Spring-field-Civil Defense-Disaster Control Council and Springfield Woman's Club-have earned the plaudits of their community and have demonstrated—what working together can do.

The turnout of the citizenry — in the face of the downright nasty weather — was splendid. Apparently there IS civic interest and pride in this township.

There has been much in the papers recently about the proposed site for a proposed new Post Office in Springfield. First the Zoning Board of Adjustment approved a petition for a variance which would allow the projected structure to go up on the Widmer property on Springfield Avenue near the Rali, way R.R. tracks.

Then the Township Committee put an obstacle in the path by calling for a traffic survey and returning the request to the Zoning Board with the recommendation that it be given a new hearing in the light of suggestions resulting from the survey.

In all probability further action on the variance was taken at this week's meeting of the Township Committee — this comment having been written several days prior to Tuesday.

All this is good, of course. If there are to be traffic hazards. . . if school children are to be endangered by the erection of a new postal facility, it certainly is better to recognize the peril in advance of building operations rather than wait until the job is done and it is too late to manipulate parking and traffic regulations.

One—thought keeps protruding while these words are being tapped out: what about the public? Is convenience of the people who are to use the place taken into consideration when a new P.O. is planned? What do YOU think of the location?

Mention of Quincy, Ill., in news dispatches telling about the over-flowing of its banks by the Mississippi River brings back memories. . . . It was in Quincy, several decades ago, ... that this writer began his newspaper career on the afternoon daily there. I arrived at the office to start work on a Monday morning in March and Old Man River was misbehaving. . . . just beginning to go over the banks. My first taste of Mid-West reporting was telling about sandbagging measures. What puzzles me is that no progress has been made in lo, these many years toward eliminating this annual—threat to life and property.

More nostalgia. When word came over-the radio that the Hudson-River was kicking up, I was reminded of my very-early days in Troy. Floods reaching a hundred yards or so from the bank of the river were common Spring occurrences. One year, however, the water spread inland several blocks and I recall sitting on a flight of stairs extending upward from the first floor of my home and retreating step by step as the water rose. There actually were rowboats in the street. I do not think it ever had happened at that point before that year nor do I recall it ever happening since.

This must be recorded for the eyes of prosperity: SNOW fell this seventh day of April in the year 1960; anno Domini — ten days before EASTER SUNDAY!
