



Following is a statement issued by Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies relative to the proposal for removal of tracks in Morris Avenue.

"During our recent conference with Commissioner Dwight G. Palmer on our highway problems, we explored a possible solution to the removal of the trolley tracks on Morris Avenue.

"The Commissioner continued his adamant stand that before any consideration could be given to the removal of the trolley tracks, the municipality must prohibit parking entirely on Morris Ave. on a 24 hour basis.

"We informed the Commissioner that the governing body continues to be equally adamant-that we wish to continue our parking privileges as they now exist on Morris Ave.

"In an attempt to bring about some solution to this problem-of-covering-the-tracks; we and the Commissioner discussed the proposal that the state widen Morris Ave. by 4 feet on each side of the road and repave the entire new width of Morris Ave.

"The State officials felt that they could expend up to \$600,000 for such a project, including new curbs and paving. Commissioner Palmer-insisted, however, that the municipality would be responsible for replacing and repairing sidewalks removed or broken-as-the result of the new widening:

-----The-Commissioner-also-indicated-that-if-this-proposalmeets the approval of the municipality that the work would commence immediately_and-that-we-could-maintain-ourpresent parking regulations.

"The governing body and its various municipal agencies has this proposal before it and the necessary-engineering studies are in progress for a determination. A decision on -this_matter_should_be_forth_coming_in_the_very_near_future."
