# **Disappointed With Census Figure**

Keen disappointment with the preliminary estimate of Springfield's population as revealed by the 1960 census was expressed by Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies Tuesday evening, May 10, at the regular meeting of the Township Committee.

The Mayor reported to his colleagues and the considerable number of men and women in the audience that he had been notified that the first tabulation showed the municipality's population as of April 1 to be 14,434 (the figures reported in The Sun last week).

He said this was a disappointment, that he expected the figure would be at least 17,000. He questioned the accuracy of the number, saving that the door-to-door count kent by the police, a review of such statistics as the voting lists, school population, boys in service and young folks at college certainly gave the impression that Springfield has a population far above the figure quoted above.

Census officials are to be approached to ascertain if anything can be done to check-the correctness of the preliminary tabulation.
