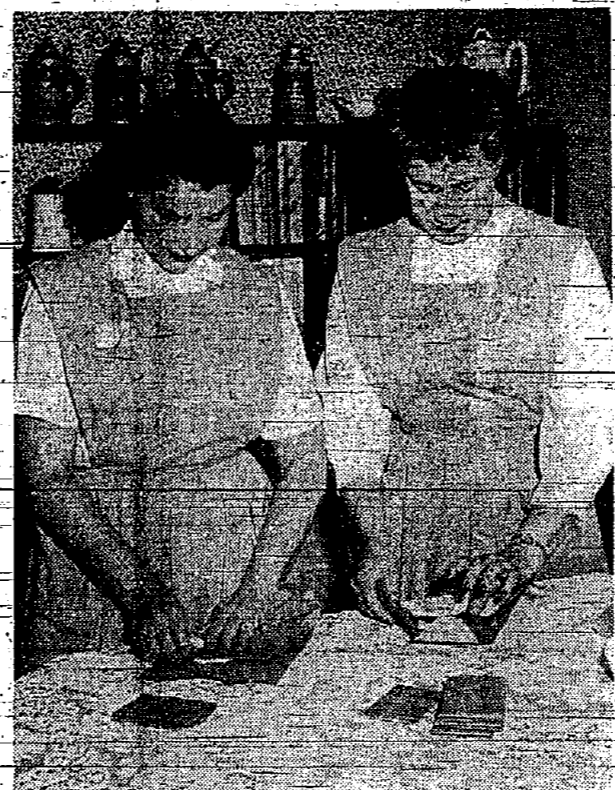

 operate in the work of the Women's Auxiliary by means of financial support or volunteer service, or both. Springfield Twig No. 1 is a service group whose principal project is maintaining the nourishment cart every Friday evening. Milk, juice and cookies are served to patients throughout the hospital before bedtime.
 In addition to this main project, the Springfield group has set up work sessions every six weeks. At these meetings bandages and surgical supplies have been prepared and packaged. Members of the local group serve many daytime hours in departments at the hospital, such as X-ray, central supply, working with the Junior Volunteers and conducting "hospitality tours" of the new wing at Overlook.

There are two Twig groups in Springfield. Hospital volunteer workers are always needed and the Springfield Twigs are hopeful that more women in town will feel the desire to form such groups among their own neighbors or friends.  it should be so difficult to obtain specific and reliable information about how Routes 78 and 24 might affect their homes — they could not understand the need for so much mystery.
 Lucy Lets Go
 Committeeman Daniel M. Lucy let loose once again in a trade against Highway Commissioner Dwight Palmer and his department in Trenton. He charged Palmer with developing a "cute technique over the years to out-manuever municipalities," and admitted somewhat ruefully that he "feared Springfield was being out-manuevered."

Mr. Lucy used such expressions as "mess" and "horrible" and "hanging by thumbs" in describing the conduct and actions of the Highway Department. Others made "ruthless," "heartless," "hard-boiled."
 The Commissioner also expressed fear that there might be a tie-in between the Morris Avenue widening project and the changes being considered in the path of Route 24.

Spectator Amazed
 The delegation of questioners appeared bewildered by the entire picture and one of them spoke to this reporter of his amazement that a matter of such vital public importance and interest should be so badly mis-handled by the State Highway Department.

What came out of the exchange of opinions and venting of feelings was a motion directing that a letter be sent to Commissioner Palmer asking for detailed information about the roads. Mayor Bonadies said the letter would go out promptly and that he would supplement it with a phone call.

 Lucy, that thus far the subject has been talked about plenty but there has been nothing in writing. He suggested that the State Highway Dept. be asked to give specific information in writing as to exactly what it proposed to do, with maps and sketches to show what could be expected, how property would be affected;

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what the town would be required to do, when the job would be started, etc.

Mr. Lucy said he disliked "getting all excited" over the matter only to find that the town was up against the stone wall of delays and indecision.
 Suspects a Trick
 All members of the governing board felt the same way, and it was voted to send a letter of inquiry to the state agency.
 Committeeman Russel W. Sibole wondered out loud if the township might not be "wooled" into having the job done only to have the State Highway Commissioner prohibit parking on the street.
 It was brought out that the Commissioner has control of traffic and parking regulations on state highways—and Morris Avenue is such a highway—twice over. It is both Route 82 and 24.

Some attempt to have this threat taken care of will be made when the Highway Department is contacted.
 It was brought-out two weeks ago that when the state presented its widening plan to the township, it made the elimination of parking on the street at all times a condition for proceeding.

To this the township would not agree. The state revised its proposal by doing away with the parking edict but requiring the municipality to do some of the work.
 It was the expressed fear of the Township Committeemen that the idea of doing away with parking might yet linger in the mind of Highway Commissioner Dwight Palmer.

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TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

The "Tree that grew in Brooklyn" and can be found in many back yards and lots in smoky cities and seems invincible against insects, insects and children. It has been classified as a "weed" tree in some books and the ill-smelling male flowers of the male tree make it undesirable to many. It is short-lived compared to other trees and resembles the sumac in many ways. There is probably one somewhere in Springfield, for a branch was once brought to me for identification.

Q: Why is it that some nurseries are selling plants now, yet another nursery refused to sell because it is too late?

A: Many nurseries have plant material in pots, tubs or burlap bags. These plants were dug some time ago before the leaves appear, and the growth was checked considerably. They are safe to handle at anytime and will even live on top of the ground if kept watered. Once these plants are gone, the nursery must go to the fields to dig others. At this time of year they have produced considerable foliage which most likely will wilt shortly after digging, especially if not watered and cared for properly. The nurseryman feels he would rather lose the sale than have you

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lose the plant.

Q: I planted roses four years ago, but this year one plant has smaller leaves than usual, and does not resemble the others. What is wrong?

A: You did not mulch them sufficiently this winter and the top froze back. Now the understock is producing growth which will produce small white flowers—the wild rose upon which the hybrid was grafted.

Q: We are plagued with tiny bugs which crawl all over the kitchen and drive us nuts. Shall we head back to our apartment, or is there a cure?

A: The insect is called clover mites. They are not harmful, and usually disappear in a few weeks. They can be controlled by spraying the outer walls with malathion, aramite or other insecticides. Ordinary insect spray bombs will reduce their numbers indoors. The insects originate in the lawn and head for the heat of the house during chilly, spring weather.

Q: What are the chances of making a good lawn at this time of year?

A: Excellent—if done properly. Prepare the lawn in the usual manner, be sure to rake cover—the entire area—with a light layer of salt hay. This will prevent wash-out, eliminate many weeds, and act as a mulch to eliminate constant watering. Leave the hay on permanently for it will eventually decay and form humus.

County Use of Jail Labor Is Idea Offered

Prisoners would be put to use to maintain county property under a plan proposed by Freeholder Frank T. Cuchie of Elizabeth.

Cuchie would use "non-criminal" types to work on the extensive park system, which includes Echo Lake, Mountainside, and the vast Watchung Reservation in Berkeley Heights and Mountainside.

The Freeholder also proposes using jail inmates to farm land around the John E. Rummels Hospital to provide county institutions with home-grown vegetables.

Cuchie did not indicate if this would conflict with the possibility of Berkeley Heights building a school on Horseshoe road on county property adjacent to the hospital.

Used in Parks

The Elizabeth Freeholder suggested the use of persons serving time for motor vehicle offenses and non-support. The men would clear brush and streams in the park system.

Cuchie declared that at the present time the Park Commission lacks the manpower to accomplish all the clearing tasks. The Freeholder stressed that he did not intend to take any job away from anyone.

Cuchie said that some other Freeholders have indicated approval of the plan and it has been declared legal by County Attorney Louis J. Dugli.

The Cuchie plan would not have one-way benefits. He noted that the county jail lacks recreational facilities and the labor would get the men into the sunshine and keep them occupied.

CD Nerve Center On Job During Alert On May 3

The nerve center in Union County at the recent Civil Defense test was a building at 2371 South Avenue, Scotch Plains.

The structure houses the county's civil defense headquarters and radio equipment. During the "raid" contact was maintained with all of the 21 towns in the county.

From the South Avenue site, the county Civil Defense Radiological Detection Staff computed direction of prevailing winds, their velocity and estimated the volume of fallout from the various theoretical "explosions" in the area.

Deputy Director James De-

vin reported that the fallout power, food, medical supplies, water, blood, transportation and hospital space.

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Naming Director Is Postponed

Action on the selection of a new permanent head for the John E. Rummels Hospital has been deferred until June 1, it has been announced by the hospital's board of managers.

Originally, the board had indicated it might choose a successor to retired Dr. John E. Rummels at a meeting held last week.

Three men are being considered for the post, including Dr. Eugene Nargiello, who is currently acting medical director and chief of staff at the institution.

Other men who are reported in the running for the \$13,000-a-year post are Dr. John L. Wilson, medical director of the U.S. Public Health Service Hospital at New Orleans, and Dr. David Biber of Union, an internist with a specialty in chest diseases.

In other hospital news, the State Civil Service Commission indicated that the post of rehabilitation director at the hospital is open to all residents of the state.

Originally, the job had been restricted to county residents but no one applied for the job, which pays from \$5,700 to \$8,900 a year.
