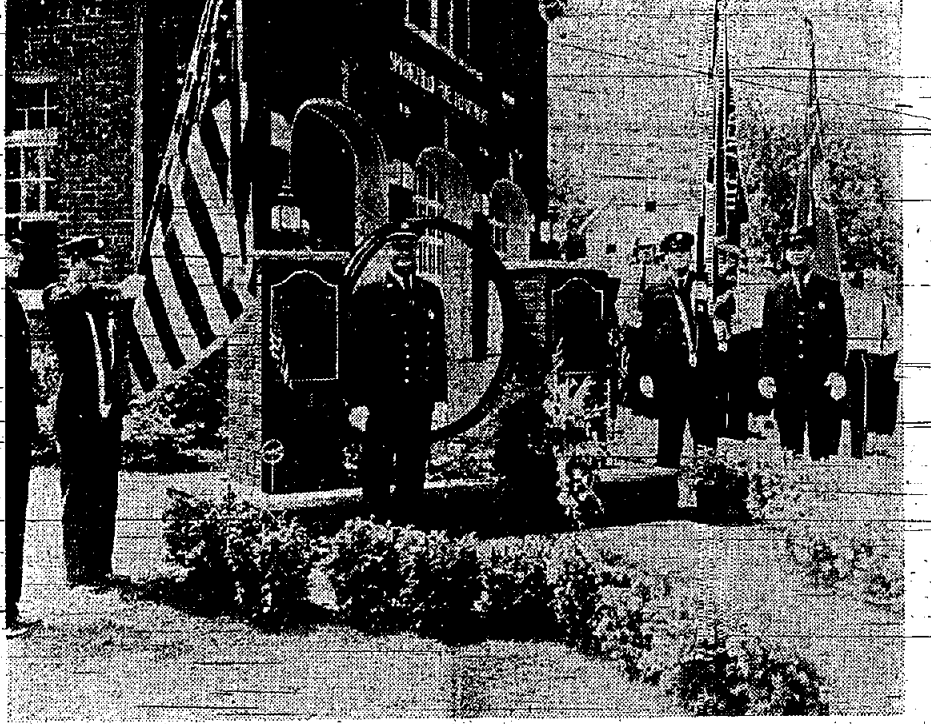

Bugs — bugs — bugs! Those hideous creatures that seem to peer from behind each leaf, receive many frantic calls each day inquiring whether they are dangerous to children or animals. Of course they always come from the neighbor's property and at this stage the lawyers are ready to enter the case.

TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

Let me assure you the only thing to fear is your sanity. They do not bite children or animals, but even I shudder when one of those fuzzy caterpillars start crawling down the small of my back. Of course there are chiggers, and the louse that drives horses nuts all summer, so maybe we better get the insecticide ready.

Q: What is the best way to eliminate most bugs?
A: First is to treat the lawn area with chlordane, DDT or Malathion. Dusts, such as Scott's Cope or powdered forms of chlordane can be applied with a spreader. This eliminates almost all insects that originate in the lawn. If liquids are preferable, you can spray with a tank, or better yet a hose siphon device. Just add four ounces of 72 per cent chlordane for each 1,000 square feet and turn on the water. For the shrubbery you can apply malathion, lindane or combination such as Ortho Isotox right now to control most garden pests. Either dusts or liquids are effective, but the timing is very important. Start before insects are evident and reapply every few weeks. Once the bugs get a head start they can be difficult to eradicate.

Q: What shall I do to prevent the Japanese beetles from overrunning my yard?
A: Beetle grubs will soon turn to flying beetles. As soon as you see the first beetle, spray the entire shrub area (lawn too, if you wish) with 50 per cent Methoxychlor wettable powder. Chances are that the beetles will avoid your grounds and head for the neighbor's property. Let your neighbor worry from then on. (Aren't I a stinker?)

Q: My lawn is turning brown in spots. What bug is causing this?
A: I have seen no evidence of insect damage except beetle grubs. Grub damage will cause the turf to die, and it can be lifted from the earth like a mat. If the grass is firmly fastened to the ground I doubt if it is insect damage. Most of the dead grass seems to be from too much moisture for the roots are badly rotted. Our County Agricultural Agent, Eric Peterson, claims to have run across some bluegrass disease, but this is not evident all over.

A period of dry, clear weather will probably help the grass recover. Avoid widespread use of turf fungicides unless you have competent advice. More about this condition next week.

Q: My peonies are beautiful and I wish to plant more. Any advice?
A: You seem to have the answer. Just do not plant peonies too deep. Barely cover the roots with soil. Make sure the soil is a loose loam—not heavy clay.

Q: My pines are crawling with worms. What shall I use?
A: This is pine sawfly larvae. They can devour a pine in a short time. Almost any spray will kill them. Use rose dust, if nothing else is available. Rose dusts, or sprays are effective against almost all insects and diseases.

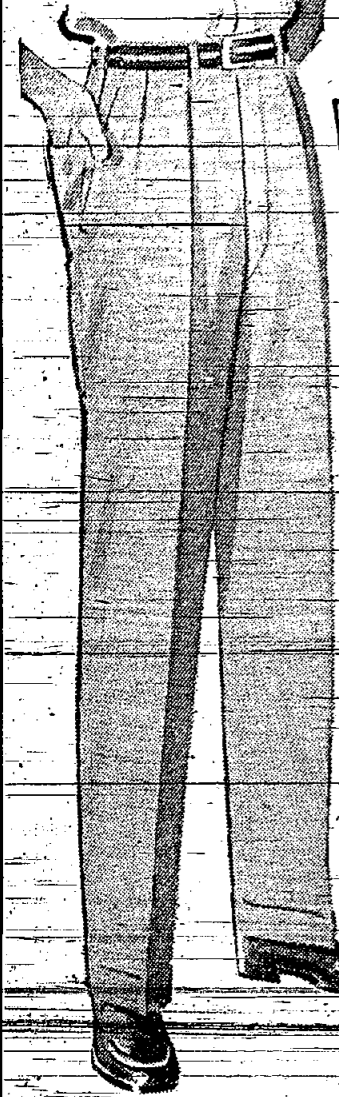
