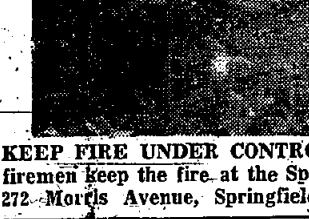

## TAKING CARE OF YOUR GARDEN

By Edward A. Cardinal



I watched Mayor Bonadies, of Springfield, cast an approving eye upon the lawn around the Municipal building. When he first became Mayor he called me into his office and told me he was turning over the maintenance of the grounds to the Shade Tree Commission, and wanted me to work out a maintenance program that would keep the lawn and grounds in tip-top shape without spending large sums of money for periodic renovation. I know he is happy with the results for he told me that hundreds of townfolk

next paragraph for further instructions.  
Q: What is the best method of killing crabgrass and weeds?  
A: If you have a sprayer, either tank type or hose syphon device, you may use liquids such as sodal and AMA. This will kill the crabgrass after two treatments, as a rule. If weeds are also present, weed-killing hormones such as 2,4-D may be added to the spray, or you can purchase a combination such as "DiMet-plus 2." Remember that at temperatures under 85 degrees it is necessary to use considerably more material to kill crabgrass, so follow directions closely. If a sprayer is not available the dry materials may be applied with a fertilizer spreader. Make certain the spreader controls function properly or severe damage can occur with lawn chemicals.  
Q: Is it necessary to rake out the dead crabgrass?  
A: It is not always necessary, but think it best for I always bear in mind the Biblical quotation, "and some seed fell upon fertile soil and multiplied a hundred-fold." If the lawn is raked to bare ground the seed is more apt to germinate and take root. If you do not rake out the dead grass I would then use a top-dressing composed of peatmoss, humus, sand and/or topsoil. This will help to maintain moisture as well as supply a rooting medium.  
Q: The grass is good and green, so shall I lime and fer-

tilize before seeding?  
A: You will be unable to fertilize for sometime after seeding, so do it now. After the raking operation, add lime at the rate of at least 25 pounds per thousand square feet, and fertilize with a good grade of lawn food, following the directions furnished on the bag.

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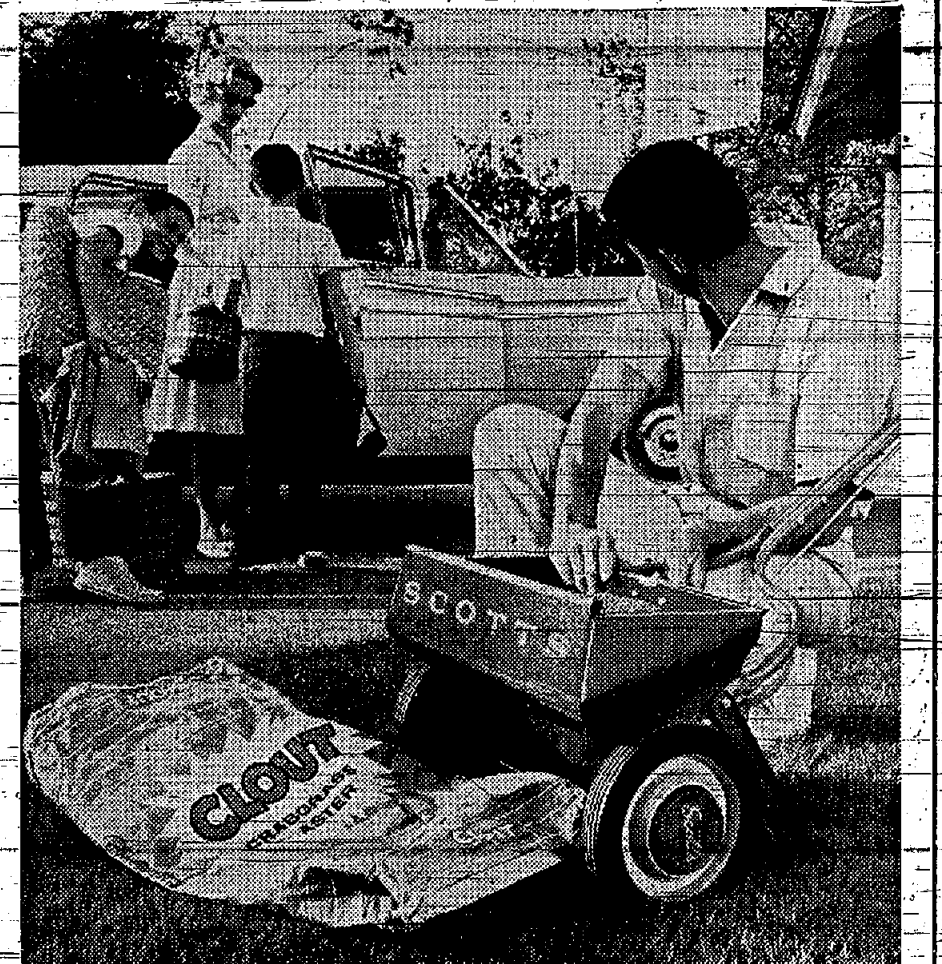

public an excerpt from the report concerning the case register's open file of 612 active and inactive cases of tuberculosis. Today's figures elaborate on the register's closed file of 275 tuberculosis cases, as follows:

Deaths from tuberculosis, 157; deaths of tuberculosis patients from causes other than tuberculosis, 36; clinically inactive for more than five years, 12; diagnosis changed, 18; moved out of county, 44, and unable to locate, eight.

Of the 193 tuberculosis patients who died, 30 per cent were discovered either immediately prior to or on examination after death, the report shows. It also reveals that 47, or 30 per cent of those whose deaths were attributed to tuberculosis, were in the age group of 60 to 69 years.

Wide Range in Ages

Nine of the deaths listed were of persons more than 80 years old and three less than 20 years old.

**County League Reports TB Cases Double; '56 - '59**

The Union County Tuberculosis and Health League Inc. states that the number of reported cases of tuberculosis in Union County was doubled between 1956 and 1959.

The league said, "The number of cases, rather than the number of deaths, is the true indicator of the tuberculosis problem in the county."

The statement was based on statistics from the first report issued by the newly established Union County Tuberculosis Case Register, which covers the period of January through June 1960, together with reported cases and deaths from 1956 on.
