In Case You Missed This News

The Daily Journal of Elizabeth is for the election of Senator John F .Kennedy ,the Democratic candidate, as president of the United States.

came Chairman of the Welfare Committee, he undertook to overhaul and upgrade the status of the County's Runnells Hospital which treats chest diseases and the chronically ill.

The unique manner in which Dr. Carlin has undertaken this project is certainly worth recounting. Having found Rose Hall ,a_home_built for nurses quarters, at a cost of nearly 1 million dollars, only-one-half occupied, Dr. Carlin went to work.

Experts-agreed this unused portion of Rose Halfcould be converted for use by the chronic ill at 1/10th the price of a new construction. In order to build a wingwhich would house 110 patients, now being farmed out to nursing homes , it would cost Union County Taxpayers \$1,100,000. or \$10,000. per bed.

Under the Carlin plan the conversion of Bose Hall to accommodate 170 patients will cost the Taxpayers approximately \$75,000. For the remodeling of this building for the care of the chronically ill.

Considering the County pays an average of \$200 per month per patient to privately owned nursing homes the conversion of Rese Hall to accommodate 110 patients would represent a payment to the County Treasurer of \$220,000 per month which is now paid to private nursing homes from County funds.

Dr. Carlin has also raised the question of a countyrun blood bank and has pledged cooperation to various social and charitable agencies in the County which were dustrial rateables to the County.

He is currently chairman of a committee which is working towards the establishment of an Industrial Planning and Real Estate Development Commission. The new county agency would cooperate with local Chambers of Commerce and realtors in a concerted drive to attract industrial rateables to the CoCunty.


The county's immediate maojr projects in the future should be according to Dr Carlin :

- Use of count yfacilities ,via expansion of the County for the elderly who are now being sent out of the County to nursing homes.
- 2. More aid and assistance to the local mental health agencies and more public discussion of the subject to increase the citizenry's willingness to support such efforts.
- 3. New facilities for juvenile offenders now housed in a portion o fthe County Jail.
- 4. The estamblishment of a Vocational School to provide the technical training which the County's high schools do not offer in the industrial arts courses.




