The Bulldogs had a rough time of it against the Rams. Their offense was stymied by the solid Roselle defense, only Herb Etzold was able to break loose for a 30 yard touchdown jaunt. The Bulldogs had a couple of opportunities in the final period, but managed to score only once.

With Rahway going into the 24-year-old rivalry sporting an impressive 7-1 record, it would appear logical that they would be heavily favored. But a look into the past would sway the most courageous and able gambler that this is no game to wager any more than a "coke" on.

Forget how many all-stars each team possesses . . . forget the teams they have beaten . . . forget the teams they have lost to . . . just remember that this is the Springfield-Rahway Thanksgiving Day Rivalry.

#### Expect Anything

It is a proven fact, that what will transpire at the Poultry Party can be determined only after the gun has sounded. When Rahway has been expected to win in the past, a fired-up Springfield team managed to upset them. It has worked this way for the Bulldogs as well.

There have been years when things have gone according to form, but they are in the minority. There have also been years when one team has managed to make a romp of the game.

The most recent, being the 1958 finale when Jos Williams & Co. went on a rampage to score 60 points. The most Regional has managed to score in one game against the Indians were 38 points in 1947. This was their greatest margin of victory as they held Rahway scoreless.

As has been the case in most of the 24 meetings, Rahway will be considered favorites. They have only lost once, and that to a powerful Westfield "it" Springfield on the other hand has been handled by Carteret, Roselle and Westfield.

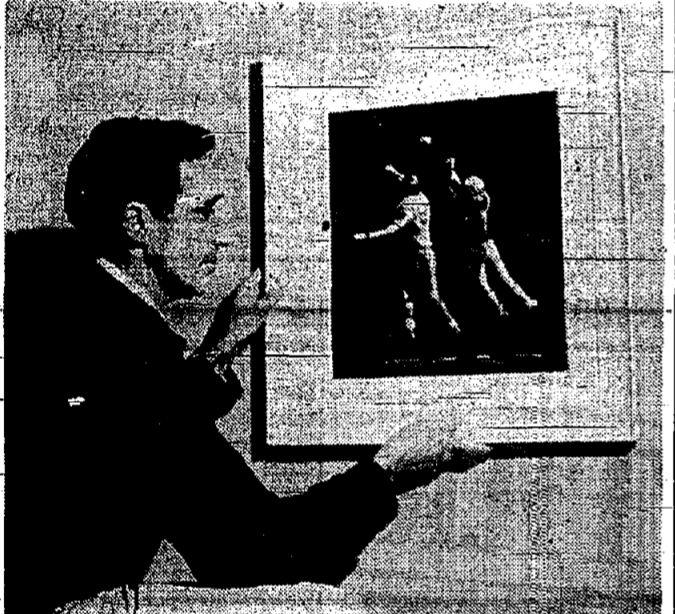

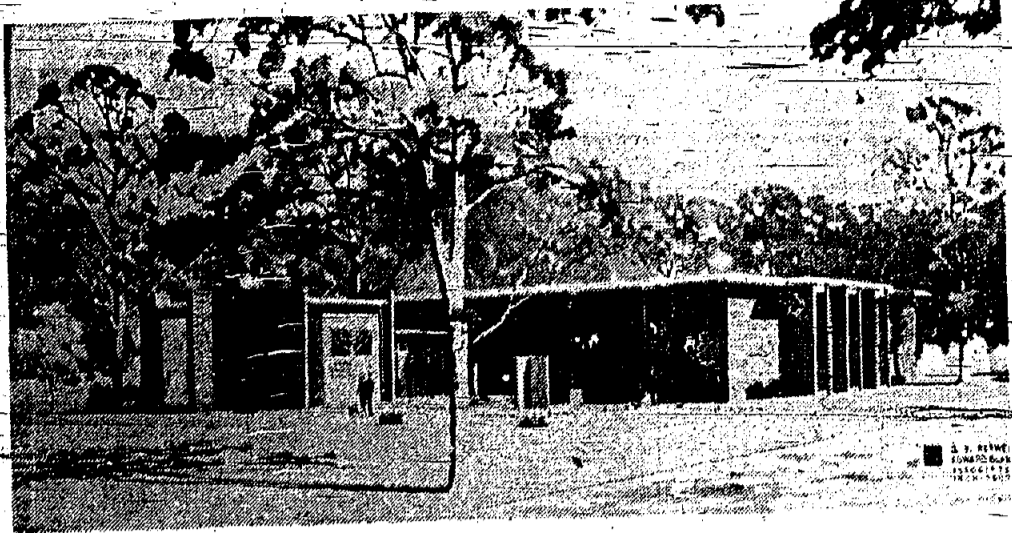

**Spring Construction Set for New Temple**

The Temple for Shalom Congregation is to be constructed on the corner of Shunpike Road and Springfield Ave. in Springfield early in 1961.

This new Temple, designed by D.S. Rotwein and Edward S. Blake, Associate Architects, will have a library, chapel, classrooms, sanctuary, offices, and other facilities to serve the rapidly growing Congregation.

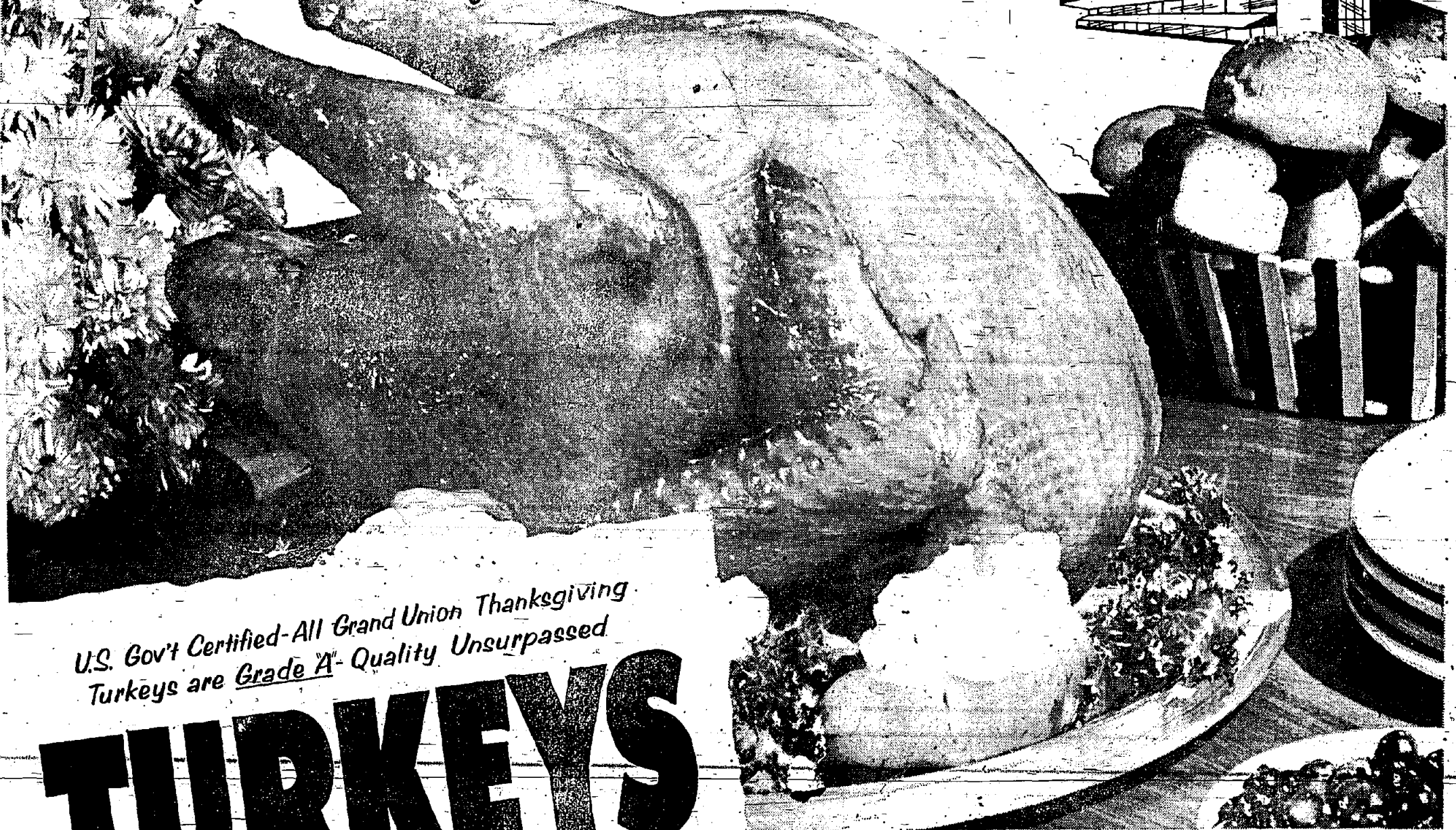

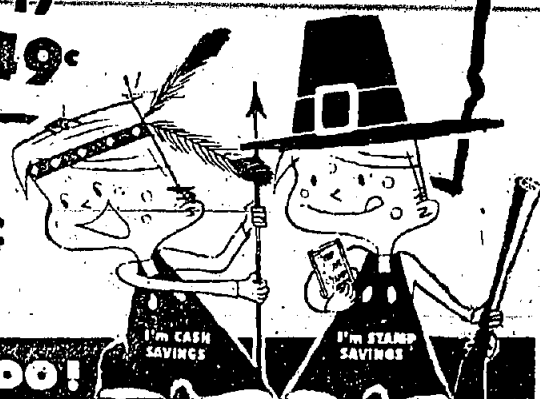

8 North Union County Towns May Join Essex Congressional District

Eight municipalities in Union County which will include Springfield, Berkeley Heights and Mountainside would be added to a group of Essex County towns...

This shift is being suggested as the result of the 1960 census which will increase New Jersey's Congressional representation from 14 to 15.

The eight municipalities suggested to become part of the present Twelfth District are in the northern and northwestern parts of Union County...

These eight municipalities to be taken from the current Sixth District are Berkeley Heights, New Providence, Mountainside, Springfield, Summit, Kenilworth, Union and Hillside.

The remaining 13 county towns would remain and comprise the new Sixth District under the proposal by the Rutgers bureau which is headed by Dr. Ernest C. Reock, director.

Middlesex, currently split into the Third and Fifth districts, would be consolidated into a new 15th District. This would be the most drastic change in the entire realignment of the state's current 14 districts.

The federal apportionment law, the report noted, requires that states redistrict their areas into an appropriate number of single-member congressional districts...

Changes For 1962 The report pointed out that redistricting is the responsibility of the Legislature, with the approval of the governor required.

The population of the districts now ranges in size from 253,353 in the 13th to 663,643 in the Fifth, the report said.

Under the bureau plan, it would range from 357,872 in the Sixth to 451,670 in the Second, sharply reducing deviations from average.

The report compared the percentages of votes cast for congressional candidates of the two major parties in 1953 with what the vote would have been under the proposed districts.

Present Sixth - Republican, 52 per cent; Democrat, 48 per cent. Proposed Sixth - Republican, 50 per cent; Democrat, 50 per cent.

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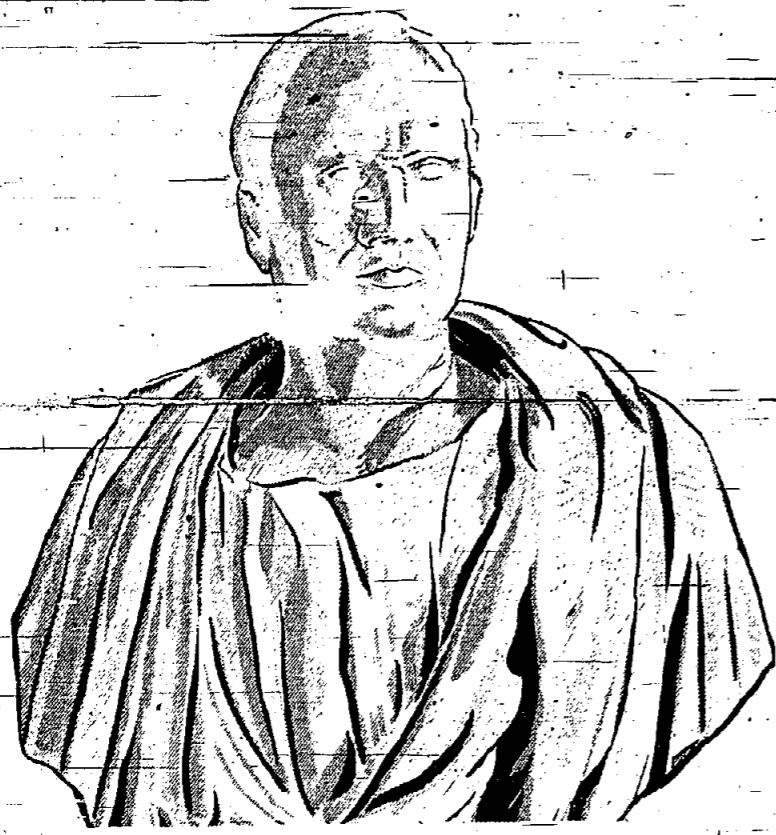

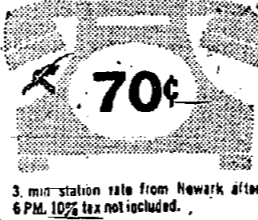

Mail Early for Christmas

Faced with the possibility that the 1960 Christmas season will set an all time holiday mailing record, Postmaster A. V. Vecchio announced today that he is starting his annual "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign immediately. During the last holiday period, the Springfield post office handled approximately 1 1/2 million pieces of mail. This year, it is expected that the total volume will exceed 2 million pieces.

The entire Christmas mailing period is a big battle against time. Even though Christmas is a month away by the calendar, it is Christmas every day at the post office from now on.

The Postmaster advises: "Do not take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use sturdy corrugated mailing cartons, use heavy wrapping paper and strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be well stuffed with tissue or old newspaper to cushion the contents."

Mr. Del Vecchio offers these helpful mailing tips to insure delivery of your Christmas cards and gifts on time.

First, check your card list carefully and make sure each address is complete with full name, street and number, city, zone and state. Second, for gift packages stock up on heavy wrapping paper, cartons and strong cord. Third, you can include your Christmas card or letter inside your gift package by adding the appropriate first class postage to the package itself. Fourth, buy your stamps now. Don't wait until the last minute when long lines form at the stamp windows.

He further said: "If you have articles of unusual size or bulk, better check with the post office before attempting to mail them. The limits of size and weight of packages vary."

Use only first class postage on your Christmas cards. Cards sent by the 4¢ first class rate may include personal handwritten messages. They will also receive full forwarding and return service. Do not fail to put your return address on every Christmas card envelope. Not only is this socially correct, but it helps tremendously to keep the mailing lists of both you and your friends up to date.

Postmaster Del Vecchio says that with your help the post office will be in a much better position to get the Christmas mails through on time. Make it a point to mail your Christmas cards and gifts for the most distant points well before December 10th. Those for nearby destinations should be mailed by at least one week before Christmas.
