Township In Hassle With State Dept.

The Highway Department, according to the reports, had already acquired the property through condemnation and the trouble started when an attempt was made to raze the buildings. Several scorching telegrams were sent to the Springfield authorities objecting to the treatment of those who went to Troy Village for the demolition job.

Bonadies Predicts 1961 Rise In Tax Burden Here

Springfield has been warned by Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies that "the year 1961 will produce a temporary increase in the tax burden to the home owner."

This prediction was made by Mayor Bonadies in his "State of the Union" message delivered to a well filled municipal building auditorium Monday during the organization meeting of the Springfield Township Committee.

Speaking of "getting the financial house in order," Mayor Bonadies said "consequently this transitional year of 1961 will produce a situation in which heavy demands on both educational and municipal services may not be adequately met by our present income, hence, producing a temporary increase in the tax burden."

Your Library

NEW YEAR RESOLUTIONS: At this season the mention of one automatically awakes the response of the other. But when the idea of New Year resolutions is examined critically, it is kind of a negative response. We usually resolve to get rid of bad habits which have been plaguing us.

This year let us propose something new: not a resolution, but a goal. The goal which is suggested by a book is **WORLD VISION**. The aim, to take a real good look at world affairs, would make a wonderful goal for American people during 1961.

This idea has been suggested by a book "Let My Heart Be Broken" by Richard Gehman, which describes the activities of an organization called **WORLD VISION** headed by Dr. Bob Pierce. Some people may have heard of Dr. Pierce on the radio or heard of him through church publications. It is true that Dr. Pierce is concerned with helping missionaries of the Protestant denominations. This should not deter anyone from reading his story or appreciating the broader aims of his group.

Dr. Pierce's story tells about the living conditions of the masses in the Far East. It gives a picture of life there at the lowest level of society. It tells the inspiring stories of many individuals who are devoting their lives to making the existence of just a few of these people more endurable. But the reason the book can be read by anyone of any religious persuasion is its amazing stories of human courage and its broad social implications.

For several years a great deal has been made of the failures of the Western World, and particularly Americans, to reach the depressed masses of Asia. "The Ugly American" by Lederer and Burdick gave a startling picture of our mistakes. In "Let My Heart Be Broken" it is pointed out that for over a century Western men and women have been working to improve the lot of the depressed masses. This is work which Communistic countries are just beginning, but are organizing on a large scale and claiming all the credit. Therefore it would seem important for our people to read these books and others like them in order to gain understanding of the conditions faced by people in the other half of the world. Then we will understand why they accept communism, or any other plan, which they believe will improve their living conditions. Let us all accept as our goal for the new year a responsibility for discovering more about other people in this world, for arriving at a true understanding of them, and for gaining a World Vision.

Equip Cars Properly for Snow Driving

All drivers have a public duty as well as a personal duty, and fortunately the two usually go together.

That is the philosophy of chief of police W. E. Selander and the basis for his frequent words of advice on the why and how of safe winter driving.

"The individual driver, and the driving public as a whole, both have an interest in a smoothly flowing traffic situation and a good safety record," Chief Selander explained. "To the individual it may be a matter of getting to work on time, and not losing a pay check due to involvement in a traffic accident. To the city it is a matter of Public Service and a good civic reputation."

The chief emphasized that the city's snow removal and traffic control functions are being carried out as efficiently as possible, using modern equipment and tested techniques.

"But we need the cooperation of every driver," he pointed out. "We are asking drivers to keep their cars properly equipped and conditioned, to prevent stalls and ensuing traffic tie-ups, and also to enable them to stop their vehicles efficiently and safely when emergency conditions arise."

Drivers are sometimes licked by bad weather before they get started, for the simple reason that they can't get started when caught by an unexpected snowfall or icy streets.

"I wish they would realize that they could improve their ability to start and then to keep going by 400 per cent on glare ice and 300 per cent on loosely packed snow, simply by putting a pair of reinforced tire chains on their rear wheels," the chief commented. "This certainly would save them the embarrassment of holding up traffic at a critical moment. Consequently, they would be doing themselves a favor and performing a public service, at one and the same time."

The chief also requested public cooperation in helping with snow removal operations, by refraining from parking at curbs in both business and residential sections any longer than is strictly necessary during and following heavy snowfall.

"If drivers help to keep the streets clear for us, the snowplow crews will be better able

However, it is still best to tune in WOR's John Gambling program, and listen for the whistle blown at fifteen minute intervals between 7:00 and 8:15 A.M.

You are urged not to telephone to keep the streets clean for them, the chief reasoned.

"I also want to re-emphasize that drivers will be doing themselves and their city's safety record a favor by driving with extreme caution in bad weather," the chief said. 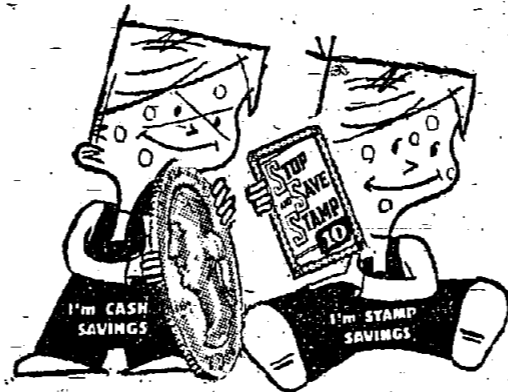

Congregants Donate Labor for Addition

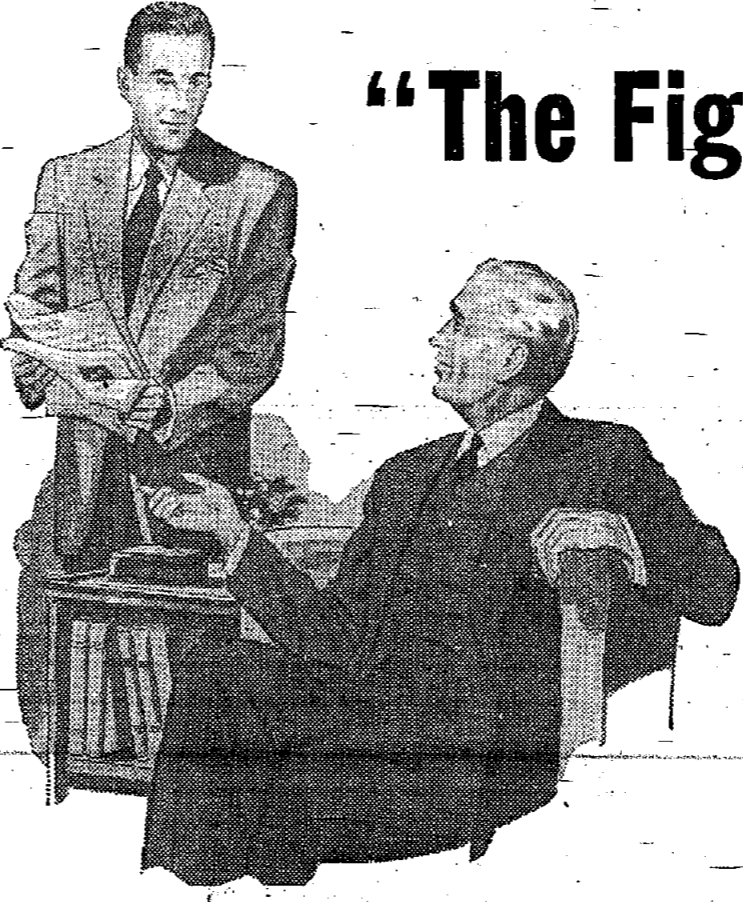

Cape May Republican Seeks Gubernatorial Nomination

State Senator Charles W. Sandman, (R. Cape May), announced he would seek the Republican nomination for Governor in the April, 1961 primary election.

Sen. Sandman's announcement came as the climax in a \$100-a-plate dinner sponsored Friday by friends of Sen. Sandman who have urged the Senator to seek the GOP nomination. More than 400 persons attended the dinner, which was held at Ed Zaberer's Anglesa Inn, in North Wildwood.

The Republican Senator who was elected five years ago and who is now serving his second term in the Senate, told the enthusiastic audience he had given the opportunity to seek the GOP nomination careful consideration and would wage an active campaign for a successful election in April.

"I know if we put our shoulders to the wheel we will again be able to do what others say cannot be done. I promise you a campaign the likes of which this state has never seen and consent that the Cape May County Republican chairman (Mayor Nathaniel C. Smith, of Ocean City) present my name to the people to be the next governor of New Jersey," Sen. Sandman said.

In announcing his candidacy, Senator Sandman took a firm stand against a state income tax, called for utilization of the State's geographical location as a corridor state for development for greater revenue and more tax abatements, asserted his belief in pay-as-you-go programs when the ready cash was available and bond issue financing in situations where the ready cash was not on hand; urged support for the clearance of slums in the larger cities; suggested that he would favor a referendum calling for a sales tax only if the referendum made it mandatory for the money to be dedicated for additional aid to education; and said he would wage an active campaign for the GOP nomination.

The Senator also hit at what he termed "an illegal, unconstitutional and unbalanced budget" submitted for this year by Governor Robert B. Meyner, charged that the state would end up with a deficit of ten million dollars this year and said "reliable sources have indicated that the state's budget would go up some \$35,000,000 next year."

Sen. Sandman said a prospective candidate must decide for himself if he or she is the best candidate for the welfare and advancement of the state where he or she would be the chief executive.

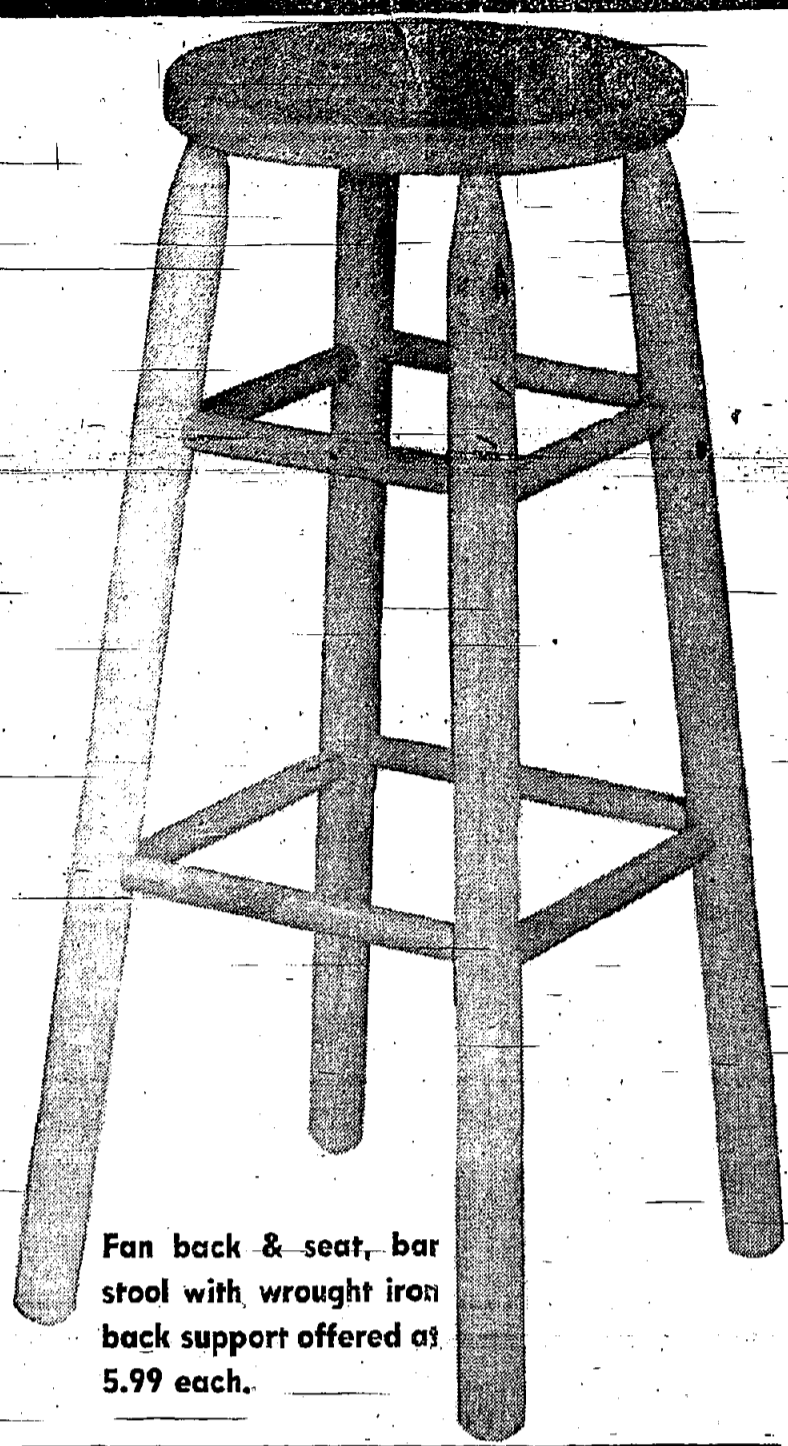

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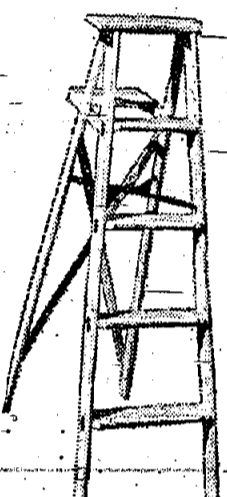
