Municipal Pool Is Proposed By Mayor Bonadies

Springfield may have its own municipal swimming pool, with a complete recreational program and further development of park areas within the township. This was related by Mayor Bonadies in a message to the people on January 2nd.

The Mayor indicated that a comprehensive study will be made of the plan, specifically checking the success of other such programs in Livingston and the one proposed for Millburn.

"If the pool idea develops properly," said Mayor Bonadies, "it is possible that it could be a operation at no additional cost to the taxpayers, and, at the same time, offer to the community a welcome addition to the ever-expanding recreational facilities in the town."

While the Mayor indicated no immediate plans in this direction, he did feel that a concrete proposal might be available in the spring.

which included 30 recommendations for changes on the thoroughfare, several of which the township is reluctant to complete.

The town will eventually widen South Springfield Avenue, but the traffic light will be installed as soon as the proper negotiations are completed with county. County, South Springfield Avenue is a County road. South Springfield Avenue is a north-south link between Route 22 and Morris Avenue. Hillside Avenue traffic, governed now by a stop sign at Springfield Avenue, also connects with Route 22 in an East-West direction.

A traffic light in this area is imperative because the area is used frequently by pupils of the new Thelma Sandmeyer School.

The committee authorized Irwin Weinberg, township attorney, to draw up resolutions establishing the positions of deputy tax collector and finance administrator. Before the next meeting, Mr. Weinberg is to present to the committeemen a written opinion on the legality of the posts and to cite the State statute upon which it is founded.

The committee accepted the resignation of Emmett E. Lin-

dauer, a member of the Planning Board.

The town entered into a contract with Ensley R. Bennett, traffic consultants, for 1961 at \$2,000 with an amendment stating that for the next two years the township can exercise an option at the same price. This option is to be exercised in October.

The committee designated \$500 to be given to the Chamber of Commerce for Christmas lights.

New Restaurant Opening in Millburn; Decorated With Colonial Mementos

Saw Mill Inn Features Recipes From Past

Historic Millburn's newest fine restaurant, the Saw Mill Inn, whose Colonial decor was developed in co-operation with the New Jersey and Millburn Historical Societies, will open at 11:30 A.M. Monday, Jan. 16.

Located at Main and Fryer Streets, in the center of "Old Millburn," the Saw Mill Inn is about 100 yards east of the site of a saw mill that had supplied early settlers with lumber for their homes. Above the bar is a copy of the mural in the Millburn Post Office which depicts the defense of Little's Bridge on Vaux Hall Road by Lighthorse Harry Lee and his dragoons against British troops during the Revolutionary War. The battle was viewed, according to local legend, by General George Washington from his lookout atop South Mountain to the North.

Descendants of the area's earliest settlers have loaned historical documents, family mementoes and pictures to the Saw Mill Inn for wall decorations. In many instances, these documents were photographed or copied by designer Dorothy Miller of Zaria Studios to emphasize the Colonial character of the decor.

Knotty pine paneling, stained a pale green, lines the walls and provides the background for the coral banquettes and coral accents. Along the Southern wall of the dining room is a floor-to-ceiling red brick open hearth grill where prime steaks and Maine lobsters, the Saw Mill specialties, will be broiled to order by chef Al Robinson, formerly of Harvey's, Atlantic City, in full view of the diners. Electronic controls plus Robinson's experience, will regulate the broiling of steaks to the precise rare, medium or well-done preference of patrons.

In addition to the research that preceded the accurate re-creation of Colonial styling, including

the satin knee breeches for the bartenders and his boys and the full-length Betsy Ross dresses of the waitresses, innkeepers J. Robert Price and Fred Champ Black have obtained from historians recipes for drinks, desserts and side-dishes savored by New Jersey settlers when the state was a colony.

The Saw Mill Inn will be open daily from 11:30 A.M. and will feature daily specials in addition to steaks and lobsters. A menu that offers a limited variety of main courses, in the opinion and experience of innkeeper Price, assures diners of quality food expertly prepared. New Jersey produce and fruits in season will be served.

As result of a survey made during the past two months, the Saw Mill Inn will serve Sunday Brunch starting at 10 A.M. Brunch will be served buffet style with family-size individual pots-of coffee and warmers for each table.

Enhancing the cozy, intimate atmosphere of the Saw Mill Inn will be a day-long program of high-fidelity music broadcast via the FM Concert Network.

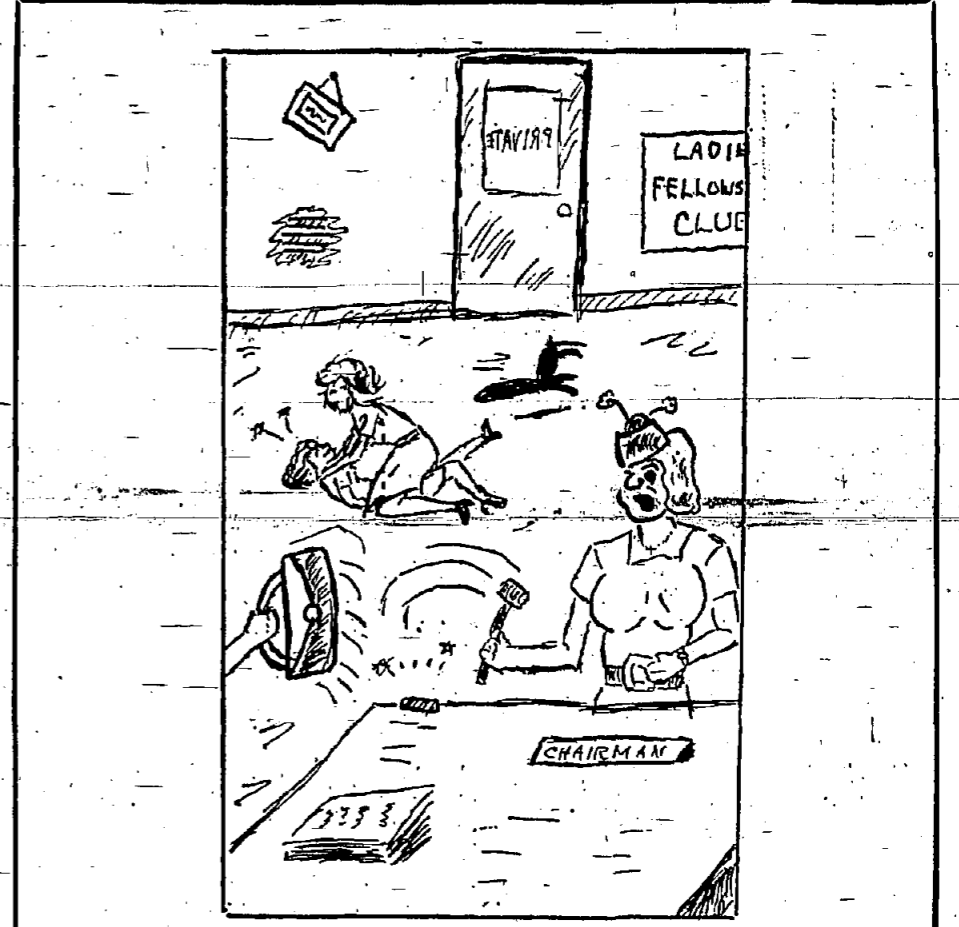

A graduate of East Orange High School and Columbia University, Mr. Hopping is Assistant Vice President of the Carteret Savings and Loan Association in Newark. He is past chairman of the Springfield Planning Board and the Board of Adjustment and a past master of East Orange Lodge No. 208 F & A.M.

Mr. Hopping has been a resident of Springfield for 20 years. Dr. Minor C. K. Jones, a resident of Far View Drive, Mountainside since 1941, has filed for his fifth term as Mountainside's

representative on the Board of Education of the Union County Regional High School system.

He received his S.B. degree from John Hopkins University and was connected with the public utilities there, in charge of chemical control of gas manufacture, and with the faculty of the School of Engineering at Johns Hopkins. Since 1937, when he was awarded his Ph.D. degree from the Johns Hopkins School of Engineering, he has been with the Esso Research & Engineering Co., the central technical, research and engineering organization for the

Standard Oil Co. (New Jersey). Dr. Jones has served for many years on the national governing boards of Sigma Xi and the Scientific Research Society of America. He is a Registered Professional Chemical Engineer, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. He has published a number of technical papers and has been awarded patents in the gas and chemical engineering field. His text on the "Chemical Control of Gas Manufacture" was published in 1930.

In 1958 Dr. Jones was the recipient of the "Award of Merit" from the American Gas Association in recognition of his contribution to the gas industry through his years of service to the gas industry and to the American public.

In addition to his duties as Administrative Assistant in the Process Research Division, Dr. Jones serves as a technical consultant in the field of chemical treating and finishing of gas-

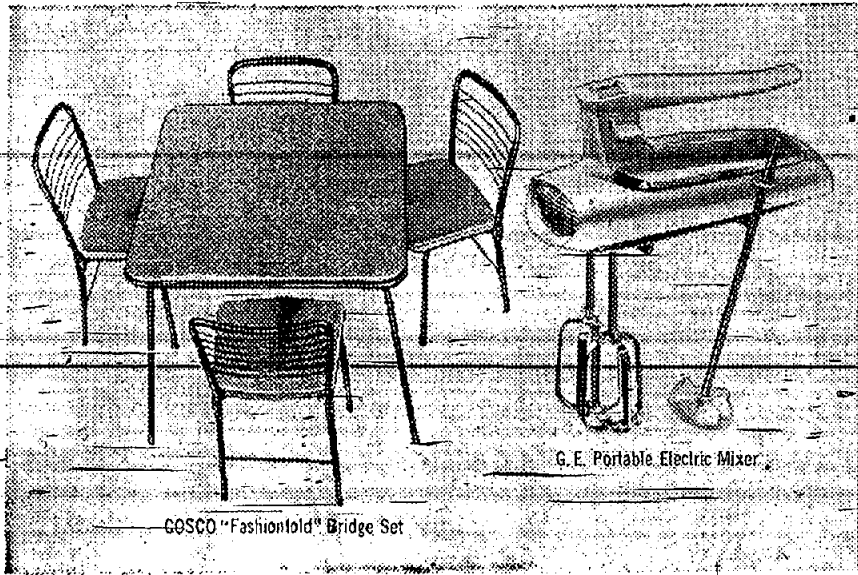

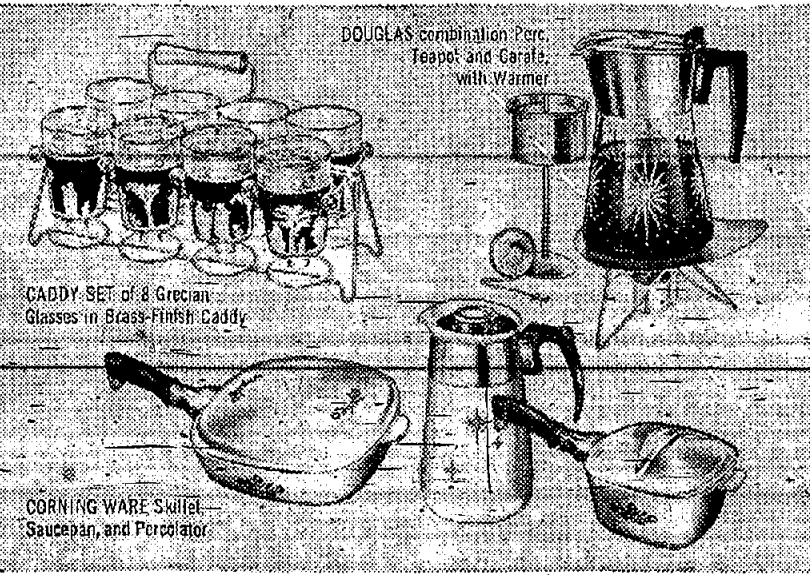

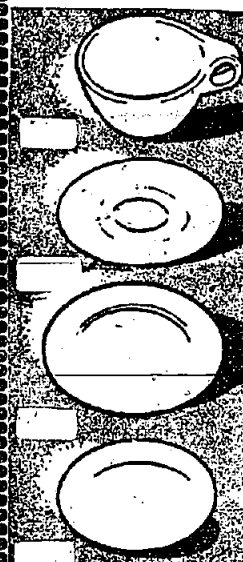
