Participates In Science Project

Stephen Cepreghy, Physics teacher at the Jonathan Dayton field, is currently participating in the History of Science Cases Instruction Project, a nationwide effort to evaluate a new science teaching method. This Project is being conducted by a group at Harvard University, in co-opera tion with the U.S. Office of Ed-

One of the Physics classes aught by Mr. Cepreghty is participating in the Control Group of the Project. A class in the Control Group does not use the new leaching method during the experimental period, which runs from about October 15, 1960. through March 10, 1961. However, comparable classes in other schools, which make in the Experimental Group, will use the new method during this At the end of the exper menta period, students in both the Control and Experimental Groups will be tested and their scores will be compared statistically.

The new teaching method in voved the use of the "History of Science Cases for High Schools, a series of specially-prepared beoklets designed to provide students with a clearer understanding of science and scientists. Units of study are developed around these 'Cases.' These units will be available to the local class later in the Spring during the second phase of the Hostory of Science Cases Instruction

Educators Dr. West Censures Honor HS "Skeleton Records"

Dr. William H. West, Union County School Superintendent, has found fault with the bookkeeping methods of the Springfield Board of-Education, and the criticism may affect the voting on the new budget and the candidates to the School Board in the coming

school election, February 14. The censure against "keeping New Assistant such skeleton records . . . for a school district spending over one and a quarter million dollars a Veep Named at year" came in a letter from Dr. West to the local Board of Education.

Dr. West wrote the Springfield School Board that "when I protested that a district spending over a quarter of million dollars shouldn't be keeping such skeleton records, I was informed that the practice has been as approved by the Board of Education and is satisfactory to the Board."

The letter was received by the Springfield Board of Education at its last regular meeting and news_of_the_criticism_by_the County Superintendent has add ed considerable interest to the February 14 school elections when four board members are to be named by the voters. Dr. West, in his letter, stated
