Thompson Stresses Need For March of Dimes Drive

At a meeting at the home of H. Lee Sarokin, chairman of the Springfield drive, the captains were introduced to Robert Thompson, the Executive Director of the National Foundation

Presbyterian Men List Annual Breakfast Speaker

Pick Olympic Champion

Horace Ashenfelter, former Olympic Champion and World Record holder in Track events, will be the main speaker at the Seventh Annual Washington's Birthday Breakfast, for Presbyterian Men being held at Springfield Presbyterian Church on February 22nd. The breakfast is sponsored by Elizabeth Presbytery Council of United Presbyterian Men. Elizabeth Presbytery is composed of 48 Presbyterian Churches in Union, Somerset, Middlesex and Hunterdon Counties.

Mr. Ashenfelter, familiarly called "Ash," held 14 National Championships in distance running events over a 10 year competitive career. When he won the Olympic Gold Medal in the grueling 3000 Meter Steeplechase event at Helsinki in 1952, "Ash" outran the best of European competition. No American citizen before or since has accomplished this feat. Because of this notable victory, "Ash" was awarded the Sullivan Award as the outstanding amateur athlete of America.

A graduate of Pennsylvania State University, where he won numerous Collegiate Championships in Track, "Ash" continued his competition with New York Athletic Club. He set World Records at distances from 2 miles to Cross Country distances of over 6 miles.

Upon graduating from college, Mr. Ashenfelter became a Special Agent of the Federal Bureau of Investigation. He continued to serve as an agent of the F.B.I. for 10 years. In 1959, he left Government Service for private industry. He and his

wife and 4 sons now reside in Glen Ridge, N.J.

The title of his remarks before the Presbyterian Men's group is "Faith Will Help." Mr. Ashenfelter will recount anecdotes about his career in athletics and in law enforcement. He is currently active in affairs of the church, Boy Scouts and local government.

Springfield Presbyterian Church is one of the oldest and most famous of New Jersey's churches. It was founded prior to 1750, and during the Battle of Springfield, on June 23, 1780, the tide of battle reached the doors of the church before General George Washington's Army finally repelled the British invaders. It is particularly fitting that the Washington's Birthday Breakfast should be held in a place where a turning point in Washington's career took place.

Edward M. Mertz, Vice President of the Presbytery Council will be General Chairman of the affair. J. DeWitt McGarrath of Springfield Church is in charge of the breakfast. Harry C. Ellison of Elizabeth, Council President, will preside. Ticket sales are in charge of Lincoln J. Stokes of Edison, N.J.

An attendance of approximately 350 men is expected. The breakfast will be served at 9 A.M. in the Church School Building and the Meeting will be held in the church sanctuary at 10 A.M.

A graduate of Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Mr. Schramm attended Northwestern University, Rutgers University, the Dale Carnegie Institute, and Union Junior College. Navy, participating in the European, Asiatic, and Pacific Theaters.

Educators Honor HS Principal

During the past few months the field of education has bestowed four honors on Dr. R. T. Jacobsen, principal of the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School in Springfield.

On November 21, 22, and 23, Dr. Jacobsen served as chairman of the Committee of Evaluation appointed by the Middle States Association of Secondary Schools and Colleges to evaluate, for accreditation, the Saint Anthony's High School in Washington, D.C. This was the sixth time that Dr. Jacobsen has served as Chairman of an Evaluation Committee. The Jonathan Dayton Regional High School will be evaluated by the Middle States Association on March 8, 9, and 10, 1961. All secondary schools within the jurisdiction of the Association are evaluated every 10 years. The Jonathan Dayton School was last evaluated in March 1951.

At the recent meeting of the Middle States Association in Atlantic City on November 25th, Dr. Jacobsen was appointed recorder of the important discussion group which considered the problem of college admissions policies.

In addition to these recognitions of leadership in the field of education, Dr. Jacobsen was recently elected to the Board of Governors of the New Jersey Schoolmaster's Club and also to the Advisory Board of the Union Junior College of Cranford.

Participates In Science Project

Stephen Ceppegly, Physics teacher at the Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield, is currently participating in the History of Science Cases Instruction Project, a nationwide effort to evaluate a new science teaching method. This Project is being conducted by a group at Harvard University, in cooperation with the U.S. Office of Education.

One of the Physics classes taught by Mr. Ceppegly is participating in the Control Group of the Project. A class in the Control Group does not use the new teaching method during the experimental period, which runs from about October 15, 1960 through March 10, 1961. However, comparable classes in other schools, which make up the Experimental Group, will use the new method during this time. At the end of the experimental period, students in both the Control and Experimental Groups will be tested and their scores will be compared statistically.

The new teaching method involved the use of the "History of Science Cases for High Schools," a series of specially-prepared booklets designed to provide students with a clearer understanding of science and scientists. Units of study are developed around these "Cases." These units will be available to the local class later in the Spring during the second phase of the History of Science Cases Instruction Project.

New Church Building To Be Ready In May

Dr. West Censures "Skeleton Records"

Dr. William H. West, Union County School Superintendent, has found fault with the bookkeeping methods of the Springfield Board of Education, and the criticism may affect the voting on the new budget and the candidates to the School Board in the coming school election, February 11.

The censure against "keeping such skeleton records . . . for a school district spending over one and a quarter million dollars a year" came in a letter from Dr. West to the local Board of Education.

Dr. West wrote the Springfield School Board that "when I protested that a district spending over a quarter of a million dollars shouldn't be keeping such skeleton records, I was informed that the practice has been approved by the Board of Education and is satisfactory to the Board."

The letter was received by the Springfield Board of Education at its last regular meeting and news of the criticism by the County Superintendent has added considerable interest to the February 11 school elections when four board members are to be named by the voters.

Dr. West, in his letter, stated that "it is the recommendation of the County Superintendent that you establish a more detailed set of records, particularly for those areas in which you should be interested in knowing more facts than can be found from those presently being kept."

Dr. West then gives examples of "more detailed set" of records as including Account Numbers 214, 20, 250, 646, 650, 660, 720, 820 and 1240.

Information has been received that these account numbers are under the following categories:

- No. 214 - Salaries and other Instruction Staff.
- No. 230 - School Library and Audio Visual Materials.
- No. 250 - Other-Expenses for Instruction.
- No. 640 - Utilities, except heat.
- No. 650 - Supplies for operation of plant, except utilities.
- No. 660 - Other Expenses for Plant Operation.
- No. 720 - Contracted Services for Maintenance of School Plant.
- No. 820 - Insurance, etc.
- No. 1210 - equipment.

Mexican Girl Adopted by JDRHS Spanish Students

Spanish students at Jonathan Dayton Regional High School, Springfield, together with their teacher, Miss Julie Good, have become the foster parents of a ten year old Mexican girl named Marta Gonzalez. The adoption was arranged through the Christian Children's Fund which operates homes in thirty-nine foreign countries as well as the United States.

Dropping their pennies, nickels and dimes into Pete, the Mexican piggy bank, the students collect each month the ten dollars necessary for the child's support. This adoption made possible her move into the Vera Cruz Children's home where she lives with twenty-five other boys and girls. The children who are either orphaned or from destitute families live and attend school at the home which is under the direction of Senor and Senora Ramirez, members of the Salvation Army.

Besides contributing toward Marta's support the students are also able to correspond with their adopted daughter. Since she writes and reads only Spanish it is an excellent opportunity for them to practice their Spanish as they are learning it.

For Christmas the students sent Spanish Christmas cards and gifts for Marta and also provided money for a party for the entire home.

Replacement of blood is sorely needed! Any blood may be given regardless of blood type. Anyone interested in giving an assist to Mr. Williams may do so by donating blood to the Essex County Blood Bank, 45 South Grove Street, East Orange. Be sure to identify the fact that you are giving the blood for Mr. Williams, a patient at the Presbyterian Hospital Broadway, New York City.

The Blood Bank in East Orange requires that you call ahead for an appointment. Hours for blood donors are as follows: Monday, Wednesday, Friday 2-4 p.m., Tuesday, Thursday 3:30-8:30 p.m., and Saturday 9:30-12:30 a.m.

It is also important that the donor does not eat at least four hours before giving blood. Black coffee, tea, juices and toast and jelly are the only permitted foods.

 Following is Dr. West's letter in full:

"When your budget was submitted recently I requested a detailed copy for examination and was told that the books are not kept in any more detail than was revealed in the report received. When I protested that a district spending over one and a quarter million dollars a year just shouldn't be keeping such skeleton records, I was informed that the practice has been that as approved by the Board of Education and is satisfactory to the Board.

"It is the recommendation of the County Superintendent that you establish a more detailed set of records, particularly for those areas in which you should be interested in knowing more facts than can be found from those presently being kept.

"Examples would include: account numbers 214, 230, 250, 610, 650, 680, 720, 820, 1240.

"The intent of the minimum set of records was for the very small districts to have something reasonable for their purposes. However, when a district exceeds 2,000 pupils, it is not logically classed as a small district. This increase of detail should not materially increase the work in bookkeeping."

Salamone, professor in chemical engineering.

The eight teachers will attend a seminar on statistical methods in the collection and analysis of research data, under Professor Herbert Barkan, of the department of Mathematics.

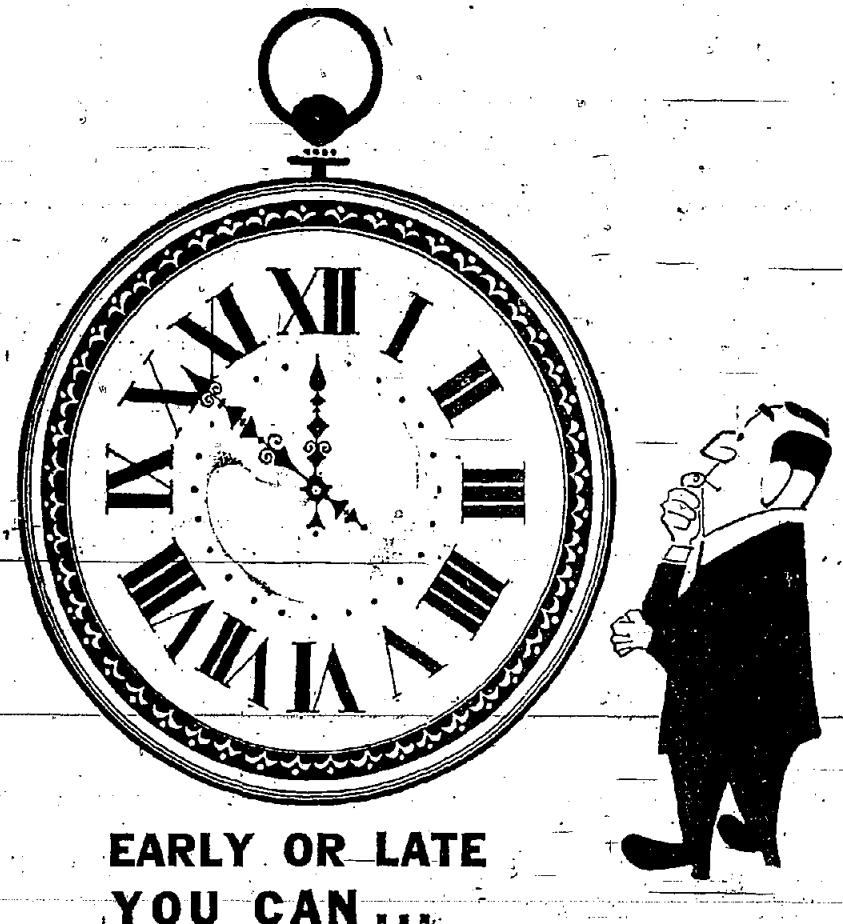

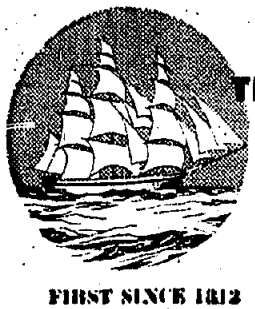

New Nike-Zeus Computer Sent to Ascension Island

A new U. S. Army Nike-Zeus digital computer, the first computer ever built for complete information furnished by another computer, has been shipped to Ascension Island in the South Atlantic, it was revealed today.

The computer, built here by Western Electric, Nike-Zeus prime contractor, was developed by Bell Telephone Laboratories in Whippany, N. J., for special tracking tests of incoming ballistic missiles launched from Cape Canaveral.

Used with the Nike-Zeus target track radar, the computer will collect and process data concerning the radar characteristics of incoming missiles.

The new computer was designed with a general purpose scientific computer utilizing an automatic process called "Blades", a system devised by Bell Laboratories engineers.

While computers have been used before as an aid in the design of new computers, the Blade System marks the first time that a computer has been built from complete assembly information, with information and parts lists furnished by another computer.

Blades will shorten the time interval usually required to put a new system into production by eliminating time-consuming

design and drafting work, the process is expected to considerably lower development cost.

The Blade System converts basic design data, originated by Bell Laboratories engineers, into manufacturing information which can in turn control automatic machinery for producing subassemblies of data-processing equipment.

Engineers at Bell Laboratories say that with the Blade System, manufacturing information for each unit can now be automatically produced in 20 to 25 minutes. Conventional methods of drafting formerly required four weeks of effort. The self-checking capability of the Blade System also eliminates costly human errors inevitable in the use of manual methods on complex equipment.

The Blade process starts with engineers determining a "logic network" that will perform the necessary data-processing operations.

The network is then converted into a set of equations a language the computer comprehends. From here, the computer takes the equations (in the form of punched cards or tape), redetermines the placement of components and specifies wiring interconnections which must be made to implement the network. The computer automatically seeks wiring paths

to minimize wire length. This is important in high speed digital computers where excessive length wires would tend to slow the circuits down. The final output provides the parts lists, assembly information and wiring information for Western Electric, the manufacturing organization. In subsequent models the output will also be used to control automatic machines designed to perform the actual wiring of the units.

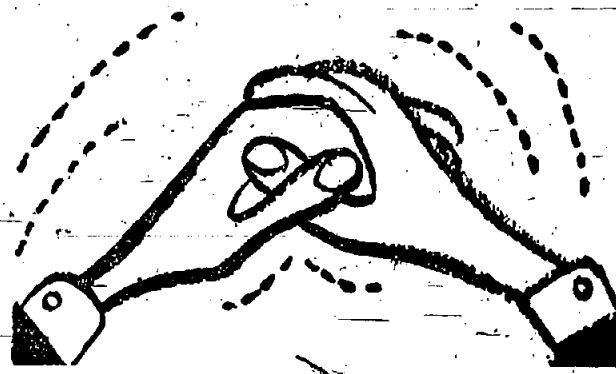

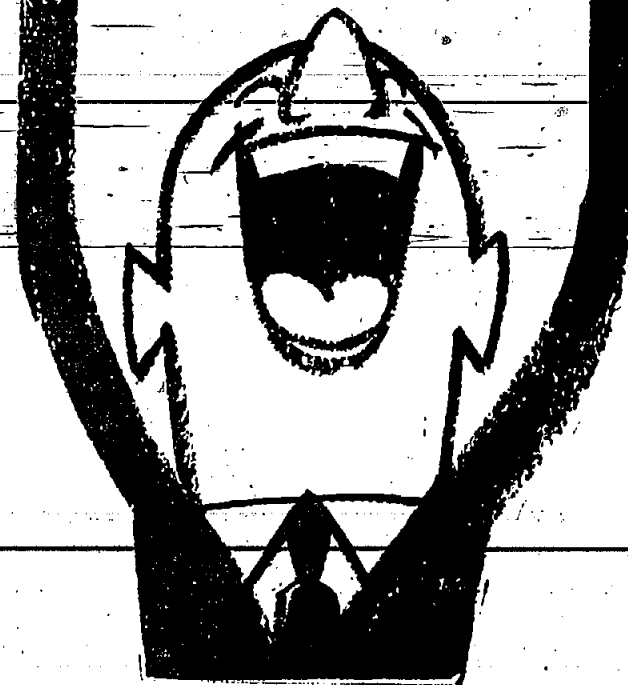
