## Jaycees Seek More Members

The final organizational meeting of the new Springfield Junior Chamber of Commerce took place last Wednesday evening at the Blue Star Inn, Route 22. The major item of business was a discussion of methods by which the new organization could enlist the last few remaining members required for state and national petition.

To the several prospective members present at the meeting, Membership Committee Chairman Richard Bishop stated "Membership in the Springfield Junior Chamber of Commerce is open to all young men between the ages of 21 and 35 regardless of occupational or professional classification. ## Smith Starts 5th Term as Education Board President

### Board Exercises Option On Baltusrol Property

Howard Smith was re-elected president of the Springfield Board of Education and Joseph Bender was chosen vice president at the Board's meeting Tuesday night. Both were elected by unanimous vote. Starting his 16th year on the Board, Mr. Smith is also beginning his fifth term as Board president. Mr. Bender is starting his second year on the board. Both men were re-elected to their board position for 3-year terms in last week's election.

Mr. Smith welcomed John Gacos to the Board. Mr. Gacos is the only newcomer; he was elected to the post last week.

The Board moved to exercise its option on the Baltusrol property. They are buying 30 acres of land from the Baltusrol Golf Club at \$2,500 an acre. Springfield voters approved a \$25,000 bond referendum last June 28 which allowed the Board to issue \$25,000 in bonds so that they can purchase the land for future expansion purposes. The vote was 162 in favor and 95 against. The Board will borrow the necessary money on bond anticipation. The payment will be picked up on the regular budget.

The land to be purchased is located near the top of the mountain, near the Sayre House. The land is inexpensive since it is in the middle of undeveloped land. South Mountain Nurseries in Millburn will do the tree planting and planting at the new Thelma Sandmeier School. Their bid is \$1825 for 114 pieces of shrub-

bery and 15 trees. The breakdown is \$1448 for shrubbery; \$477 for trees. The Nursery gives a one year guarantee for the shrubs and trees.

The other price received by the Board was from Cardinal Nurseries in Springfield. Their bid was \$1801 which included 102 pieces of shrubbery for \$348 and \$1453 for 14 trees. This bid was \$124 less than the Millburn nursery, but Joseph Bender brought out the Millburn nursery to provide 11 different tree varieties while Cardinal's would give only 5 varieties.

The quotations were received November 29.

The Board moved to again invite the Township Committee to attend the Board meetings for a closer coordination between the two groups. The invitation was issued last year, but the Board said the Committee did not attend regularly. By a 6-3 vote the Board voted to notify its members of committee meetings.

Mrs. Patricia Stevens, Mrs. Carole Katz and Miss Marilyn Strand were placed on the official substitute list by a Board motion.

Mrs. Frances Skiba, a teacher in the Raymond Chisholm school submitted her resignation effective March 30 due to maternity reasons.

Superintendent of Schools Benjamin Newswanger reported the school PTA's are willing to cooperate in developing a plan to help the schools on snow storm days. The Police Station has been flooded with calls by parents wishing to know if their children had school on snowy mornings. The Board had investigated the possibility of installing an answering system with Bell Telephone, but it was found to be too expensive.

## Dr. Kayser Will Address Beth Ahm Adult Institute

"Judaism and Christianity as mirrored in church and synagogue architecture" will be the topic when Dr. Stephen S. Kayser speaks to Temple Beth Ams Adult Institute Sunday evening, February 26th.

This will be the second in a series of lectures sponsored by the temple.

Dr. Kayser has been curator of the Jewish Museum since its founding in 1947, and is associate

Professor at the Jewish Theological Seminary under whose auspices the museum operates.

He has had a board career as a lecturer, writer, art critic and historian in Germany, Central Europe and the United States. He has been associated with Columbia University, was lecturer at the University of California at Berkeley, and Professor of History of Art at San Jose State College.

Dr. Kayser is the author of "Jewish Ceremonial Art" and "The Book of Books in Art". His travels have taken him through many countries. He was recently responsible for the bringing over and the reconstruction at the museum of an entire wall from a 16th Century Persian Synagogue.

All are welcome to attend the lecture. The cost to attend lecture is \$1.00 per person.

## McCarren Penalized \$2750

Don McCarren and Son of Elizabeth, contractors for the Thelma L. Sandmeier School in Springfield, will be penalized \$2,750 under a penalty clause in their contract with the Springfield Board of Education. The Board is also withholding \$2,500 from the balance to be paid. The Board owes the contractor \$34,000.

McCarren had contracted to complete the building by August 15, any additional time spent on the building would result in a \$50-a-day penalty. The building was completed October 31, 1960, 54 days after the specified time, hence the \$2,750. The Sandmeier School was occupied the second week of November.

The \$34,000 debt is decreased to \$31,250 due to the penalty clause.

The \$2,500 is to be withheld until the check-list is completed. The items dealt with the exterior of the school.
