August Caprio, Coordinator of Foreign Languages in the Union County Regional High School District, has been selected as a consultant by the New Jersey Modern Language Teachers Association and the State Department of Education for their Modern Language Workshop. The Workshop will be held at Montclair State College on Saturday, March 18.

Sewer Line Is Almost Finished

Springfield Township Engineer Albert E. Swensen has announced the sanitary sewer line across Baltusrol Top is almost finished, with only one more line down the southeast side of the 150-foot mountain to be completed.

When finally completed, the thru-mountain sewer line is expected to open up a large area south of Route 22 for manufacturing and other industrial use. Plants locating there are expected to bring in an estimated \$20 million in new rentals.

Work on the \$265,000 project has not been hampered too much by the rigors of the current winter, Swensen said. What remains to be installed is the gravity line down the mountain side to connect eventually with the trunk line alongside the Highway River.

Pumping Station

He reported that the pumping station, at the foot of the north-west side of the mountain, is practically completed by Kenneth Brem & Sons of Summit. The Cruz Construction Co. of Union is laying the pipe, and has finished most of the "force main" that will bring the flow to the mountain top, and the 3,500 feet of line from the mountain to the existing electrical work is contracted to the Lesser Electric Co. of Elizabeth. An old pumping station in the Briar Hills area will be eliminated.

Assisting the township in payment of the project is a \$70,000 grant from the Public Health Service. Additional contributions are anticipated through assessment of benefiting property owners.

Budget Set at \$1,699,318; Big Improvements Planned

Cardinal Tax Rate Up 42 Points; Municipal Decision Postponed

Springfield's 1961 municipal budget of \$1,699,318 was introduced Tuesday night at the Township Committee meeting. This figure is an increase of \$46,261 over last year. The budget call for a 42 point tax rate increase, but Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies emphasized the municipal purpose tax is down 45% since 1959. The total cost for municipal operations for 1961 is \$896,641—an increase of \$57,210 over the 1960 figure of \$839,431. The amount to be raised by taxation totals \$28,233. The budget also calls for a capital expenditure of \$53,000.

The Springfield Board of Adjustment held over for decision at its next meeting an application to erect a garden center in the neighborhood of \$55,000 for sale of gardening supplies, on property owned by Edward Cardinal located at 280 Milltown Rd. There are several wooden buildings on the property from which sales are made at present. The proposal is to erect a permanent structure. The building was constructed in 1910; ordinances were passed in 1936 and 1955 zoning the land for residential use. Mr. Cardinal's building is a non-conforming one since the passing of the ordinance.

33% DECREASE
The municipal tax rate for 1961 is 5.85. In 1960 it was 5.33, and in 1959 it was 5.33. The municipal purpose tax rate for 1961 is 1.11; for 1960, 1.28; for 1959, 1.72. These figures show a decrease of 51 points and a 33% decrease since 1959.

The combined increase for local and regional schools totals 17 per cent. The tax rate for local schools for 1961 is 2.33; for 1960, 2.34; for 1959, 1.94. The tax rate has increased 23% since 1959.

The regional high school tax rate for 1961 is 1.44; for 1960, 1.22; for 1959, 1.08, which is an increase of 26% over the 1959 figures.

The estimated county tax rate for 1961 is .87; for 1960, .73; for 1959, .61. The county tax rate has increased 40% since 1959. The County tax increase represents 30% of the tax rate increase in this year's budget.

Regional Officials Chart Plans for Fourth High School

School Site Set for Kenilworth

The Union County Regional Board of Education has started planning for a fourth high school in Kenilworth. It will probably be built in time to open in the fall of 1964 or certainly by September of 1965, according to Regional officials.

Dr. Warren M. Davis, superintendent of schools, said enrollment in the present three high schools (Clark, Springfield, and Berkeley Heights) would exceed capacity by 1964. It is hoped, he said, that the new facility would be completed by that time with provision ultimately for 1800 students.

Certain factors would affect the date, he said, among them the residential growth of Berkeley Heights, the proposed relocation of Route 22, and the possibility of two parochial high schools being constructed in the region.

The first stage of construction will be a building to house 900 students. The structure will be built with central facilities adequate for 1500 students and expansion to that capacity will follow. The expansion will be determined by the Union County Park Commission for their part.

mission is needed for use of nearby Black Brook Park for athletic facilities.

Dr. Davis said the regional school board owns 17 acres in Kenilworth. The land lies to the rear of Harding School, on the Boulevard between 14th and 15th Streets. He also recommended the purchase of additional land in Kenilworth, in anticipation of a large school there. Dr. Minor C. Jones, a board member, said 100 acres in Orange Avenue, Cranford, should not be overlooked as an alternate site. The area, he said, has been proposed for a high school by the Cranford Board of Education, but twice was rejected by voters. No action was taken on either suggestion.

Everett A. Pay, board president, appointed a committee to confer with Kenilworth officials regarding early drainage and fill of the boarded-up property. Avey W. Ward was named chairman; assisting are Karl G. Forch of Kenilworth; Dr. Eric C. J. Jones of Mountainside and John Hoppling of Springfield.

The board increased the bed-side instruction rate from \$3.30 to \$4.50 an hour and authorized hand directors to be paid \$100 for nine Saturdays during the football season.

"Flaming Youth" Caused Town's School Growth Says McMullen

The Springfield school system has a "flaming youth," former Magistrate Henry C. McMullen told a PTA Founders' Day audience last February 21 in Caldwell School.

The first school was established in Springfield in 1700 and there is no record of what happened to it, he said. The Springfield Union Academy was built in 1800. It burned down in 1858. Another school was built on Academy Green, near the Methodist Church.

That burned down in 1901 and James Caldwell School was built. That was damaged by fire in 1937, but was repaired and enlarged. The large growth in schools, he said, since World War II, McMullen went on to say, without fires to spur construction.

The ex-magistrate also recited the history of the man for whom the Caldwell School was named. He was pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, Elizabeth, and was deputy quartermaster general for George Washington during the American Revolution.

His wife was killed by the British during the looting of Union. Rev. Caldwell sounded the battle cry "Give 'em Watts" during the battle of Springfield when he handed out Watts Hymnal as "wadding" for the muskets of the Revolutionary soldiers, the speaker related.

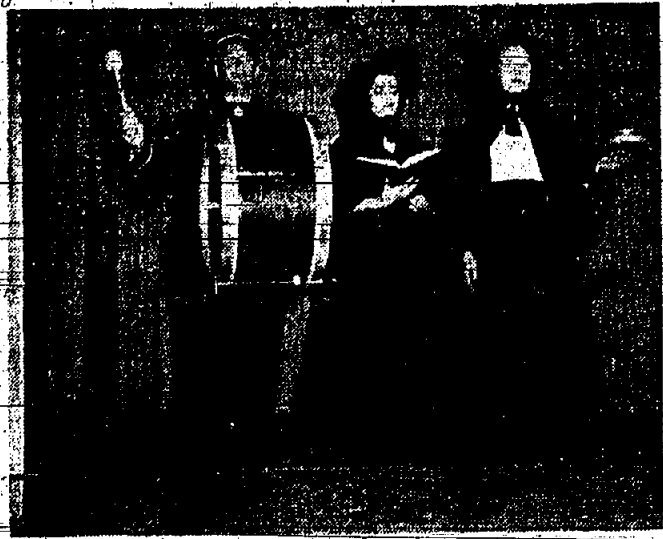

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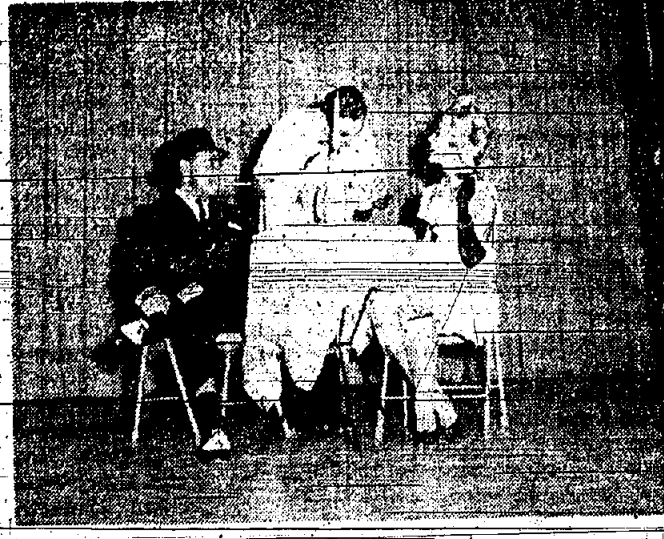

The bride wore a silk organza gown and a tulle veil tipped with pearls. Her flowers were orchids.

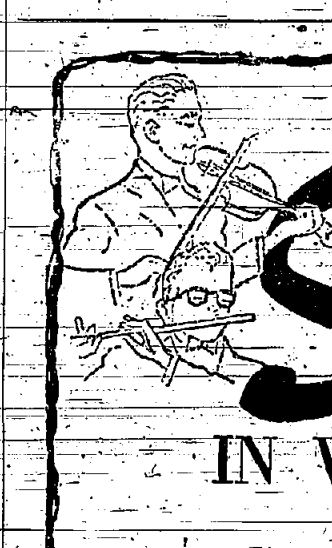

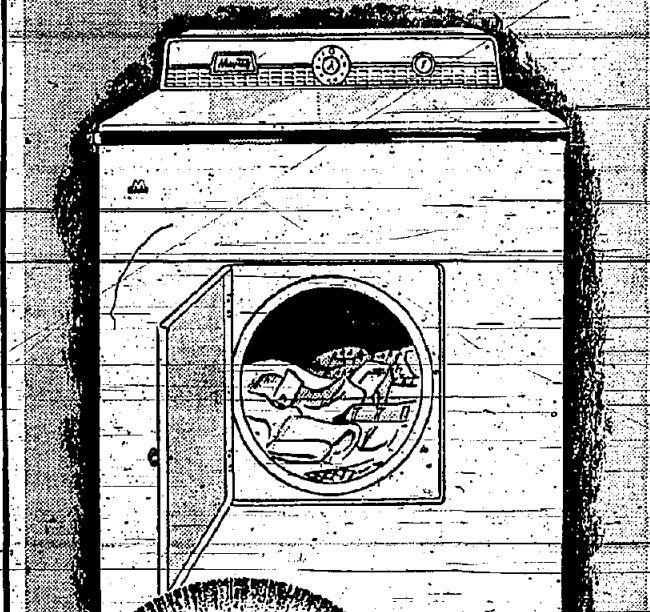
