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## Board Awards Contract for Sprinklers to Linden Firm

The Springfield Board of Education awarded Tuesday night to the Guardian Sprinkler Company of Linden the contract for the Sprinkler Systems to be installed at the James Caldwell and Raymond Chisholm schools. The Linden Company bid \$18,210; work will start as soon as school recesses for the summer. The Board, however, will check the work included in the bid to make sure the company has covered all facets of the job.

The other bidders were Industrial Sprinkler Company of West Orange, \$25,875; and Automatic Sprinkler Corp. of America of Kenilworth, \$24,520.

The Board will advertise and take bids for a school bus plus an alternate bid for safety seat belts. The Board has inquired of various schools using this device and feels that even though buses travel slowly and do not travel on highways, the belts would be beneficial if and when a bus has an inoperative object.

Two janitors were hired at an annual salary of \$3800. They are Lucius Wilson of Linden and Fred Hermanns of Newark. Thomas Perkins, Scotch Plains, and Edward Mueller, Springfield, resigned their posts as janitors.

## SANE Plans Easter March

A call to Springfield residents to join in an Easter Week march for "security through world disarmament," was sounded by the Springfield-Summit Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy today.

The New Jersey-to-New York march, corresponding to the annual Aldermaston March in Britain, which last year brought out a quarter of a million people, is expected to draw thousands of Americans from along the Eastern seaboard.

The 100-mile walk will be launched March 25 at McGuire Air Force Base in Wrightstown, New Jersey. It will culminate April 1, Easter Saturday, in a rally at United Nations Plaza, New York. Other rallies will be held at frequent intervals along the route, it was said. It will pass through Fairwood, Scotch Plains and Springfield, March 28.

A number of prominent U.S. figures will participate in the March or address rallies. These include clergymen, academicians, scientists and others.

The Easter March is sponsored by the National Committee for a Sane Nuclear Policy, with Norman Cousins, editor of the Saturday Review, its SANE's national co-chairman.

Other Americans will also hold Easter Week marches under National SANE's banners in New England, Chicago, San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Washington, D.C.

## Mayor Proclaims Tag Week For Local Asthma League

Drive Runs From March 27 to April 9

The annual tag week drive sponsored by the Springfield League, Children's Asthma Research Institute and Hospital of the Jewish National Home for Asthmatic Children at Denver, will begin Monday March 27th and continue through Sunday April 9th.

Mayor Vincent J. Bonadies has proclaimed the tag week drive March 27th to April 9th and urges all Springfield residents to contribute to this fund raising drive, and enable the Home in Denver to expand their facilities to care for more children who are on a waiting list.

Members and volunteers will solicit funds in behalf of the Denver Home and the Research Institute. Mrs. Jack Hager, of 17 Archbridge Lane, Springfield, will serve as chairman for the second successive year. Mrs. Raymond Efrus is president of the local chapter, one of eleven chapters in New Jersey.

At present, one hundred and fifty intractable asthmatic children are receiving expert medical care and housing facilities at the non-sectarian Denver Home without cost to the parents. After a period of two years the children are discharged and able to return to their homes.

## Springfield Had Urged Adoption

Ratable Decrease Due In Town

Wilbert Laving, Secretary of the Board of Tax Assessors for Springfield, announces that Springfield has been in accordance with the newly established 40 per cent ratable ratio since 1957. The Union County Board of Taxation has just established 40 per cent as the fixed ratio to be used by assessors in all county municipalities in determining real estate valuations upon which taxes will be based beginning in 1962.

Since the famous Switz vs. Middletown Township decision which decreed that all homes were to be assessed in the same manner, the state had moved that all home were to be assessed at 100 per cent. The state Legislature adopted Chapter 51 adopting uniform procedures.

Springfield's ratio assessed to true value has been 40-19, which is almost equal to the new standard one. The Township had urged the county board to adopt the 40 per cent ratio. Plainfield had asked several other communities to join within seeking a 55 per cent ratio. Ratables will be decreased only in Springfield and Winfield. Winfield now uses a ratio of 44.5 per cent.

The 40 per cent ratio will increase the amount of ratables in 19 of the county 21 municipalities which have had ratios ranging from 17.38 per cent in Clark to 34.99 per cent in Plainfield.

The county board's unanimous action was taken under a law passed by the Legislature last year. Under the law, each county must set its own ratio of assessed value to true value but must equalize the rate for every town within a county.

In adapting the 40 per cent ratio, Union County joins Bergen, Cumberland, and Hunterdon counties. Essex, Morris, Somerset, Ocean and Warren have picked 50 per cent ratio, while Cape May will assess at 100 per cent. Gloucester County has chosen a 30 per cent ratio.

If counties fail to adopt a standard ratio by April 1, the N.J. Board of Taxation automatically will set the ratio at 50 per cent. Taxes to be paid by county property owners will be determined by both the assessed valuation and by the municipal tax rate which is expected to drop substantially in a number of towns.

The current average assessing ratio in the county is about 27.7 per cent.

The uniform ratio will affect veterans' exemptions, set by state law at \$600. Veterans' groups, including Union County Veterans of Foreign Wars, argued that a ratio above the present county average would make the exemptions meaningless by increasing the assessed valuations.

Many organizations throughout the state have been pressing for an increase in the exemptions. There was sentiment among municipal tax assessors through the county for a 30 percent ratio, but tax board members felt this figure would send tax rates soaring according to Thomas Mahon, president of the board. There are some counties using a 20 percent ratio, but board members "because of several factors" decided on the in-between figure.

Mahon pointed out that the ratio must stand for at least three years, but that there may be some change in the future as municipalities carry out revaluation programs.

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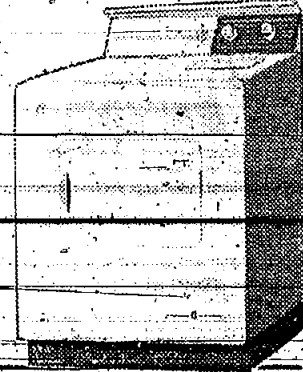
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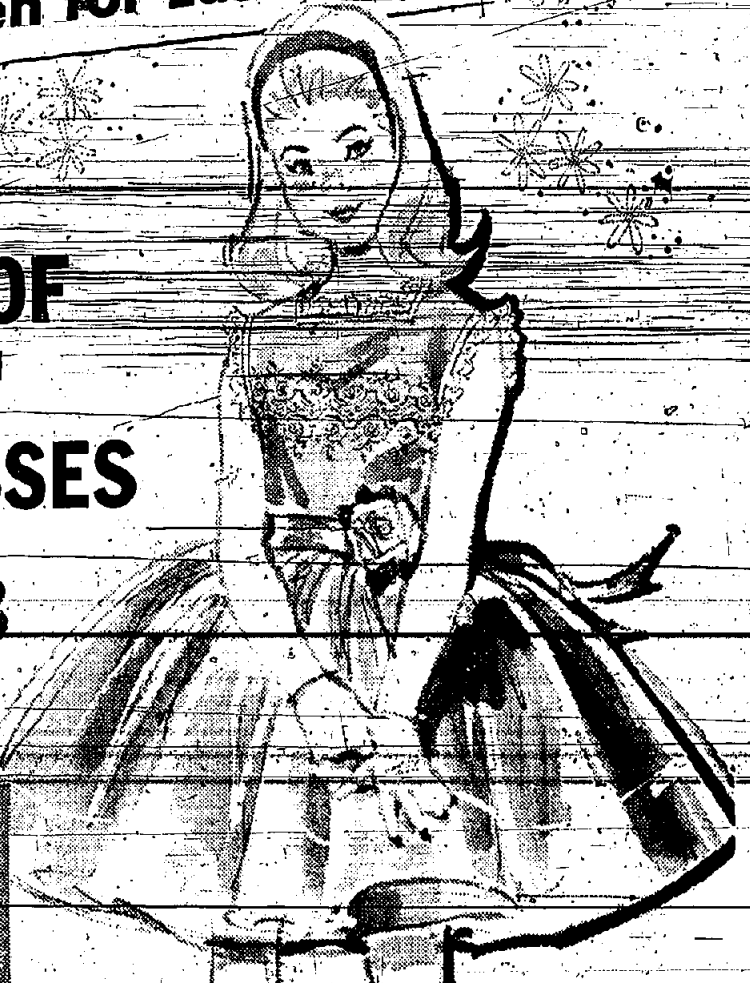

Plans are being made for the annual Donor Dinner of the Suburban Deborah League of Deborah Hospital. The affair is scheduled for Monday evening, March 27 at The Goldman in West Orange.

Chief White retired Nov. 1, 1955, after serving 25 years in almost every division of the police department. He joined the Bureau in 1935 and served as first commander of the Inspection Division in 1951.

Born in County Meath, Ireland, he came to Newark 15 years ago. He bought a home in Glen Gardner and had lived there from the time of his retirement until he moved here a year ago.

He was appointed to the Police Department Oct. 26, 1920, and had served in the First Precinct and the Traffic Division before he was promoted to sergeant in 1928. He then went to the second precinct.

When the Emergency Bureau was established in 1935, Chief White was sent to New York to study the equipment and procedures of the emergency police units there. Many of his suggestions were later adopted by the Newark squad.

In 1941, he was transferred to the Fourth Precinct, and two years later he was promoted to lieutenant. After service in the Second Precinct and the Detective Division, he became a captain in November, 1946, and took charge of the Night Detective Bureau.

In May, 1948, he was appointed commander of the First Precinct. In February, 1951, he became an inspector in charge of all uniformed personnel. Seven months later he was advanced to deputy chief, and named head of the new Investigation Division.

Promoted to shakeup, the division, which was given major responsibility for the enforcement of gambling, liquor, narcotics and vice laws, was organized in the wake of a Senate Crime Investigating Committee inquiry into an alleged lottery in Newark. Chief White's promotion was part of a top-level shakeup.

John B. Keenan, then director of public safety, said of Chief White at the time: "His reputation in public and private life is without blemish."

Chief White at the same time took charge of the Special Services Division, which included the Youth Aid Bureau, and the precinct plainclothes squads. In 1954 he was transferred to his final assignment, commander of the uniformed and radio unit.

Chief White helped organize the Newark Police Athletic League. He also worked to improve relations among the various policemen's and firemen's organizations. He was a past president of the Superior Officers Association, and an honorary member of the Special Officers Union. He also belonged to the Police Anchor Club and PBA Local 3, both of Newark.

In 1949, he was selected as the outstanding Irishman in New Jersey by 49 Irish-American organizations. At the same time, he was named grand marshal of the 1949 St. Patrick's Day parade in Newark.

In 1947, he received a round-trip ship ticket to Ireland as a gift of the Independent Irish Society. He was active in the United Irish Societies.

He was a 4th Degree Knight of the Newark Council of the Knights of Columbus. He leaves his wife, Mrs. Della Daly White; three daughters, the Misses C. Joan and Nora A. White, both at home, and Mrs. Lauren Stichel of Newark, and two grandchildren.

The funeral was held last Thursday from the John P. Murphy Funeral Home, 480 Sanford Ave., Newark, with a mass at 8:15 a.m. in Sacred Heart Church, Newark.

All proceeds of the show will be donated to the Children's Country House at Mountainside.



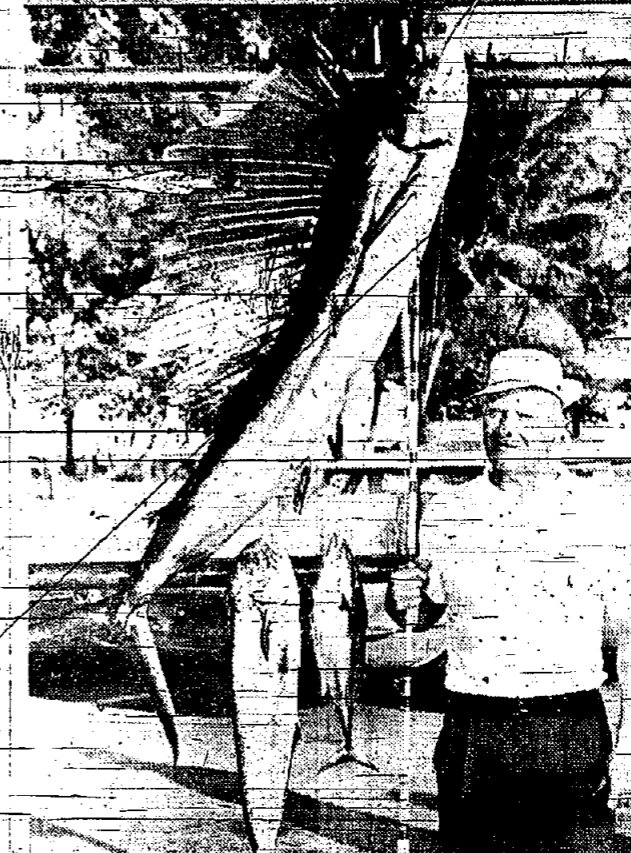
### Brothers Meet After 48 Years

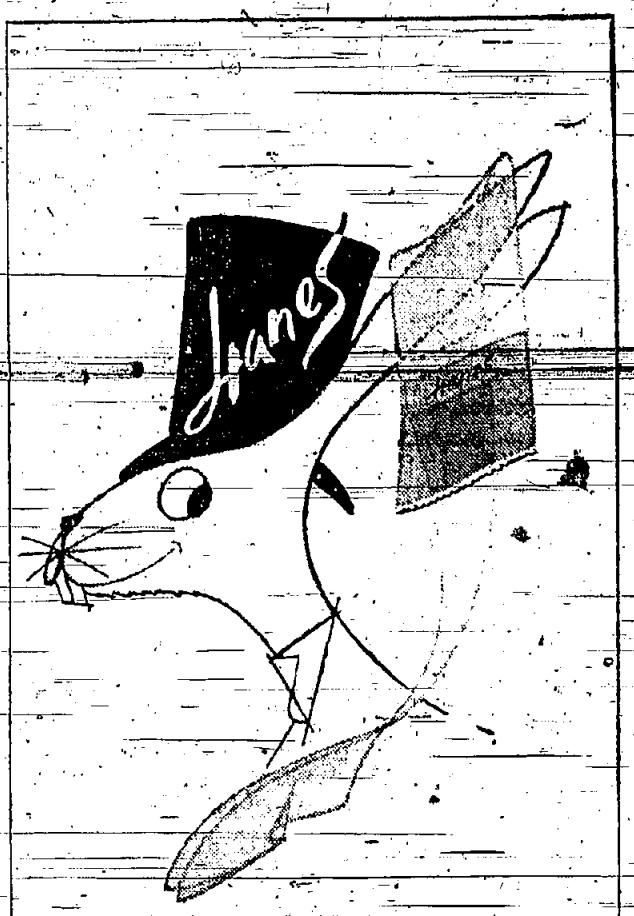

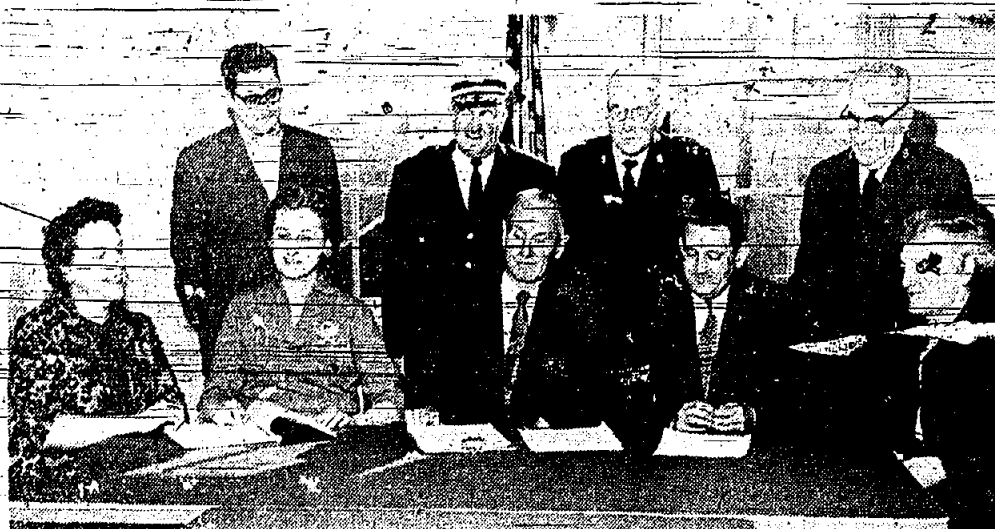
