## Lack of Facilities; More English for HS Students Stresses Rutgers Prexie

Springfield was delighted to welcome Dr. Mason Gross, president of Rutgers University, on April 18, at the Jonathan Day Forum, through the concerted efforts of the League of Women Voters, Springfield Women's Club, Springfield Chapter of Hadassah, and the Junior Chamber of Commerce. Mayor Vincent Bonadies introduced Dr. Gross to an appreciative audience.

Dr. Gross stressed the point of physical inadequacies to meet the present rush of high school graduates towards a college education. He emphasized that one subject the majority of high school graduates needed more application to is "English."

Dr. Gross also stated that estimated figures taken by an engineering firm for the state of New Jersey only a few years ago on high school students entering college have proven far off as the actual figures for this year are higher by 20 percent, than those predicted for the year of 1965.

It is hoped that this will be precedent-making since this is the first time that unassociated organizations worked together for a common effort: inviting a well known educator to address the citizens of Springfield to inform them of the conditions of higher education in New Jersey.

Such a plan is possible only when the real estate brokers are organized through a central bureau operating under definite rules. It is possible only where brokers have established the practice of cooperative rather than competitive selling. And it

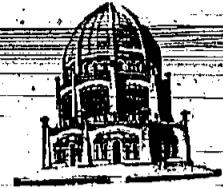
**Robin Hood Opens At Mill Playhouse**

# Prince's Farms Stands Alone Amid Sea of Industry, Homes

## Grow & Sell Varied Farm Produce

Unlike most other farms which have long since disappeared from this area, Prince's Farms stands alone amid a sea of industry and homes. The farm, comprising 100 acres scattered in South Springfield Avenue and off Route 22, will open its 1967 season

Now operated as a family partnership between husband and wife and only son and daughter-in-law, this modern farm, which grew from a six and one quarter acre beginning, continues to flourish despite modern homes and buildings and busy highways logging it boundaries.

### MUST FACE REALITY

Paul F. Prince Jr., 46, who has full charge of the growing end of the business since the retirement of his 72-year-old father, declares, "we will continue to do what we're doing." He is however the first to say, "Let's face it, eventually the farm will have to go." He goes on to explain that the township has now rezoned a large part of the farm, near the highway for industry. "Assuming things continue as they have been going, some of the land will be sold in a period of a few years," he said. He added however that he has no intention of selling the land "in bulk." This might mean that he would be obliged to acquire new lands for farming in surrounding areas which are still available, he is quoted. He knows he is presently paying the price of living in a highly residential area by paying a higher tax rate than farmers living in a rural community.

The farm today, to which hundreds of automobiles stream during corn season, includes the 35-acre plot at 647 South Springfield Avenue, which contains the sugar corn farm, farm buildings, "Moe Prince's Stand," and the land devoted to the growing of variety vegetables. The 65 other acres are located off Route 22 near Howard Johnson, Restaurant Lawrence Construction Co. and are devoted to the growing of corn. Until recently it also included ten acres at the corner of Hillside Avenue and South Springfield Avenue, now occupied by garden apartments. The home of Mr. and Mrs. Prince Jr. is on farm property at 40 Hillside Avenue.

### COMPLETELY IRRIGATED

"At the present time all of the farm acreage has an irrigation system, which was started on the homestead almost 30 years ago. Good soil is maintained by 'cover cropping' and a fertilization program. Products requiring it are related. Corn, being a grass, doesn't require rotation and can grow in the same place year after year. Mr. Prince pointed out. Several varieties of corn are grown on the 65 acres. An acre can yield up to 10,000 ears of corn, but not all of these ears will be salable, he said.

During the busy season, the Princes are assisted by some 30 others, 15 of whom work at the stand and the other 15 in the fields. Mrs. Anna Prince, now 68, still supervises the stand with the assistance of her daughter-in-law, Mrs. Norma Prince, 42. The season is opened with asparagus, rhubarb, spinach, scallions and bedding plants. Strawberry berries follow. The corn lasts until the middle of October. Followed by pumpkins, zucchini and fall vegetables. The stand stays open until Christmas just over for the first time in the Princes' lives and decoration for sale. White and blue spruce trees grown on the farm were sold, balled and burlapped. Mr. and Mrs. Prince Sr. spend three of the winter months at Coconut Grove, Fla. and Mr. and Mrs. Prince Jr. usually go to Coral Gables, Fla. for four to six weeks.

### STARTED IN 1915

The original six-acre farm was started by Mr. Prince Sr. in 1915. He had learned to love the land as a boy when he worked on the Hilton strawberry farms in what is now called Irvington. His father, before him, was a button manufacturer so that young Mr. Prince had to learn the farming business from "scratch." He built the present farmhouse himself with the aid of a carpenter. He also began a steady process of acquiring land up until 1941. Part of this project included the clearing of woodlands. At the same time Mrs. Prince opened a stand and began selling the produce.

Today some 50 products are sold in the peak season, most of which are grown on the local farm with the exception of potatoes, fruit and dried onion. The potatoes, rather than purchased in market, are grown by a Pennsylvania farmer expressly for the Princes. Because he opening

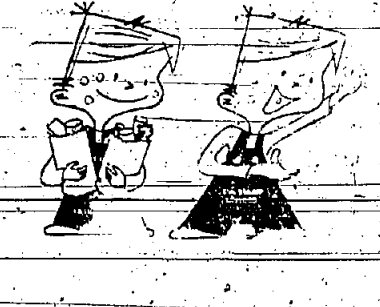

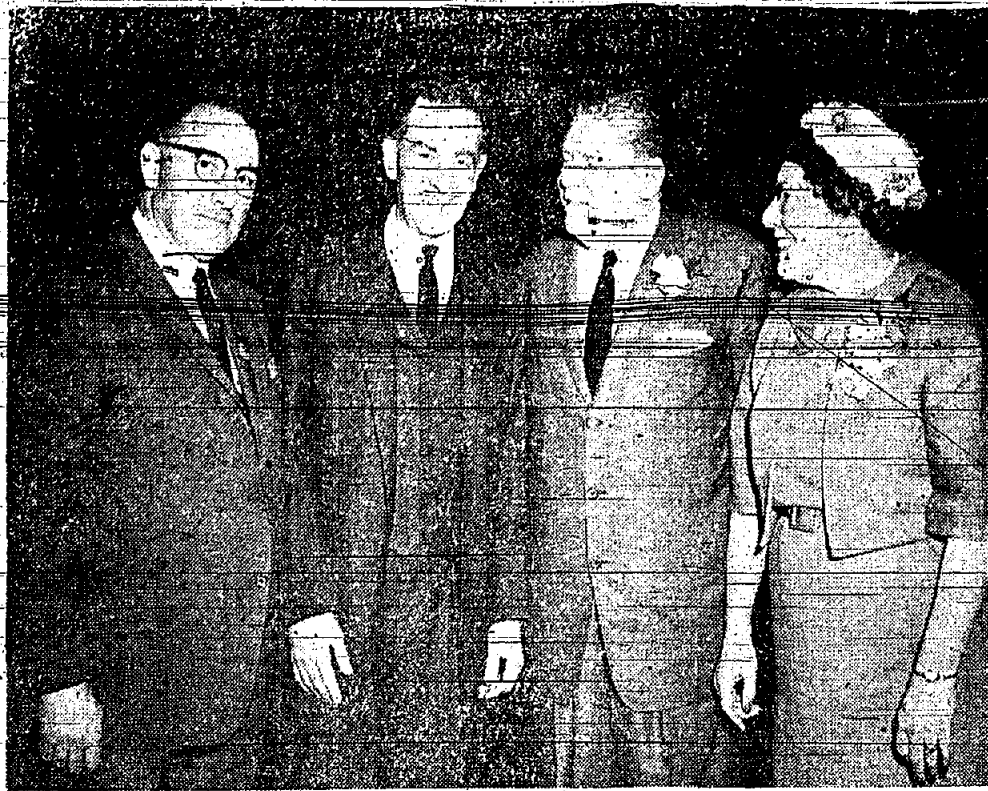

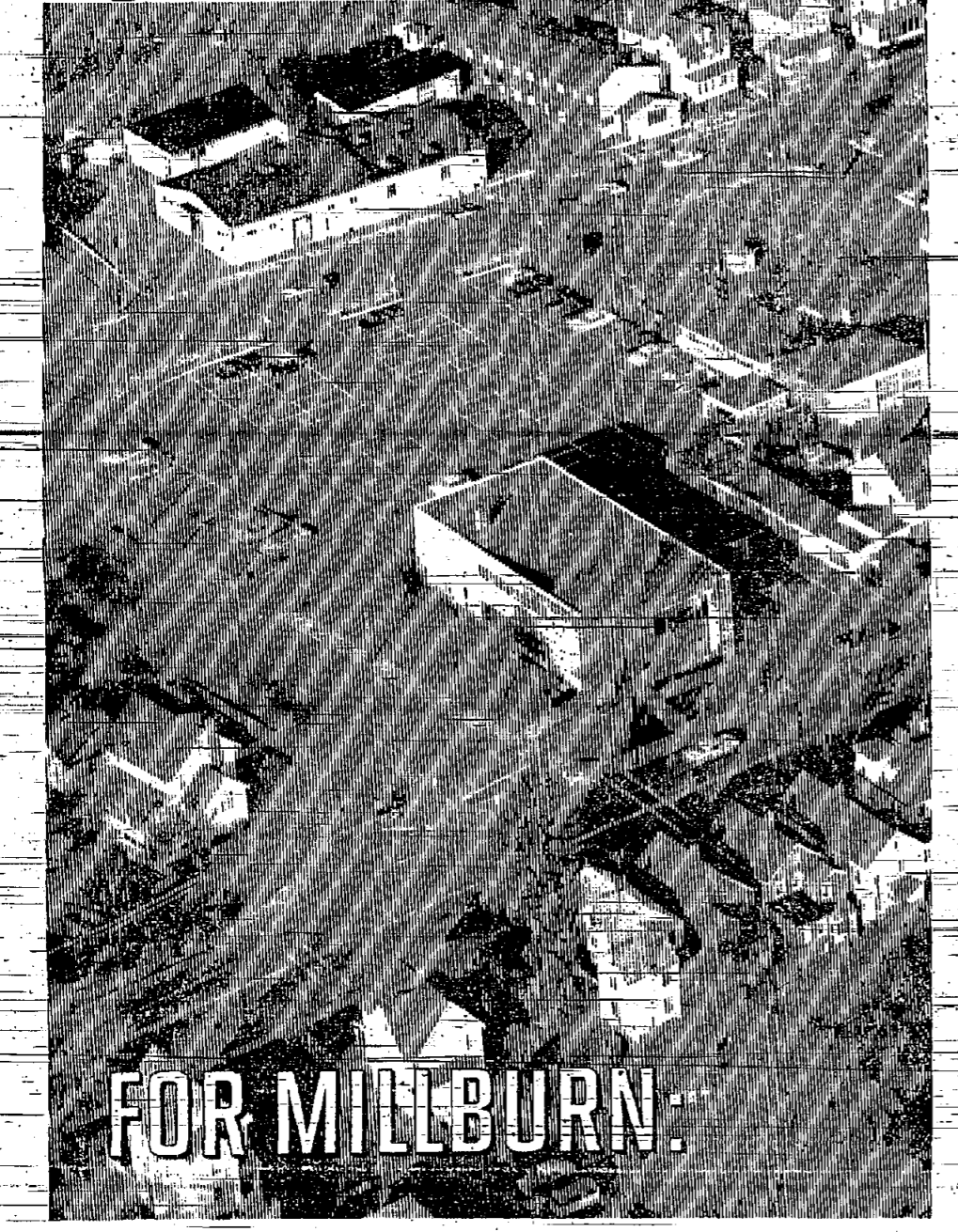
